national choice had to be made. You could do one of two things. Some people who are not as far-sighted as I am, urged me to let nature take its course and continue a policy of doing nothing. I rejected that advice. Nature was in an angry mood.

Humanity, First
"To balance our budget in 1933 and 1934 or 1935 would have meant a crisis against the American people. To do so would either have had to make a capital levy that would have been confiscatory, or we would have had to act our face against human suffering with callous indifference. When Americans suffered we refused to pass by on the other side. Humanity came first.

Mr. Roosevelt gave this review of his administration:
"In 1933 we reversed the policy of the previous administration. For the first time since the depression we had a congress and an administration in Washington which had the courage to provide the necessary resources which private interests no longer had or no longer dared to provide.

Now let us look at the cost. Since we could not get the money by taxes we borrowed it, and it increased the public debt.

Hoover Hoisted Debt
"President Hoover's administration increased the national debt in the net amount of over three billion dollars. In three depression years and there was little to show for it. My administration has created the national debt in the net amount of about eight billion dollars and there is much to show for it.

Courts' "These expenditures and what we got for them with certain other expenditures of the American people in the years between 1920 and 1930. "And now a word as to this boogie fear about the crushing load the debt will impose upon future generations. I think that Mr. Roosevelt continues to mislead.

Court Decrees Time Deposit in Hollister Bank Is An Investment

Dismissed in district court on order of Judge A. B. Barclay is the suit of the Salmon River Canal company against the Hollister Bank from seven Salmon tract ranchers who signed an indemnity bond to guarantee payment of the canal company's deposit in the Bank of Hollister, failure of which would place Feb. 15, 1932.

At the time the bank failed the canal company alleged it had in the bank \$4,000, and that it owed the bank \$1,037. It sought to recover the balance of \$2,963 from the bank's bondsmen.

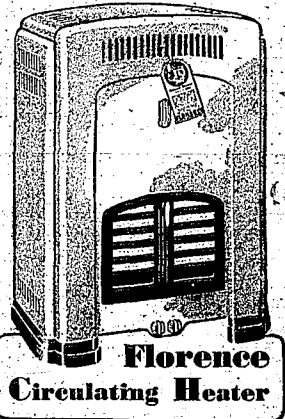

RFC-DISTRIBUTES NEARLY MILLION

In Six South Central Counties of Idaho Sum \$1,000,000 Amounts to \$901,306

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation during the period Feb. 23, 1935 to June 30, 1936 distributed the sum of \$901,306 in the counties of south central Idaho according to information received by W. T. Lockwood, state director for the national emergency council for Idaho.

Disbursements in Idaho aggregated \$10,487,270, not including amounts paid to various government agencies or grants to the state of Idaho as authorized by the federal emergency relief act of 1933.

The principal purpose for which the money was disbursed was to allow loans to banks and trust companies, including receivers, liquidating agents and conservators. \$2,023,145, subscriptions to preferred stock of banks and trust companies, \$17,000,000; loans to drainage and irrigation districts, \$800,744; and an additional amount of \$2,200,070 to mortgage loan companies.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation gave assistance to industrial and commercial businesses in Idaho totaling \$71,000.

Agriculture helped \$4,038,957 was furnished to finance agricultural commodities and livestock, while the state received a disbursement of \$1,000,000 for relief and work relief.

Total disbursements made in the United States during the same period not including amounts disbursed in the form of relief grants to states amounted to \$6,012,771, 340.

Co-ops Making Good Husbands or Fine Bachelors of Idaho U. Men

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 2 (UPI)—Male students who live in cooperative boarding houses at the University of Idaho are either going to be good husbands or excellent bachelors.

Superintendent of Public Institutions John W. Condit doesn't know which.

With the increase in student cooperatives, men undergraduates are becoming demoralized—interested in culinary arts, house management, budgets.

Like this:
"The 'Co-ops' work like this: A group of students bands together in an association. They live together, much like fraternal men. But instead of having the usual make-up of their house done for them, the practical students share the burden, decrease the cost.

"They have set work schedules. Each man does his share. One week he waxes dishes. The following week he may set tables. The third he is on the dining room janitor crew.

"The 'Co-ops' select their own cook. The men choose a 'house manager' who parcels out the weekly purchases of food, supervises the co-operative. The cost of living in a cooperative averages \$22.50 a month for board and room. Fraternal men pay an average of \$40 each month.

Condit believes the cooperative, seriously threaten the future of fraternities and societies on the Idaho campus.

They live almost as well as fraternal students. Condit said. "They also have their exchange dinners and parties. Either fraternity and sorority costs will have to be decreased or some will be forced to close up."

Condit is enthusiastic about the cooperatives. "They teach students practical living," he said. "They're better equipped for married life when they graduate. They know food costs and food values; they had contact with home management and problems."

Fin Husbands!
"They make fine husbands if they marry but their co-ops might cause an increase in the number of bachelors. By kitchen associations they are learning to cook. Each cooperative has a laundry room and many of the men do all their own laundry. Even from their shirts. They make their own beds and clean their own rooms."

STUDENT TOTAL GROWS AT IDAHO

Registration of 2,900 Is Now Predicted by Frac. Neale At State U.

MOSCOW (Special)—First official tabulation of student registration at the University of Idaho, the registrar's office reveals 2,900 students at the University of Idaho campus at the end of the first week of college.

This figure represents an increase of 274 or approximately 12 per cent over the 2,624 students enrolled at the corresponding time last fall. Late registrations added 100 to the total, and the majority of the graduate students have yet to register.

President M. C. Neale of the university figures that a total of 1930-37 enrollment of 2,900 is a conservative forecast. "This is the third year in succession an university has established a new all-time high in student numbers."

All classes recorded substantial increases, the freshman taking honors with an increase of 112. At the end of the first week there were 190 first-year students on the campus, compared to 787 at the end of the first week last fall. Seniors numbered 410 against 399 last year, indicating that the next graduating class will not see other record numbers numbered 647 against 610 last year while sophomores totaled 653 against 622.

Seven divisions reported increased enrollment and two about the same student numbers of last year. With a total of 477 the school of education showed the largest increase, a gain of 61 from the 416 enrolled at the end of the first week last fall.

Other enrollments are as follows:
Letters and science, 257—increased 28 over the 229 enrolled a year ago; agriculture, 221—increased 47 over 294 a year ago; engineering, 319—increased 28 over 291 a year ago; forestry, 338—increased 41 over a year ago; education, 474—increased 61 over 413 a year ago; business administration, 122—increased 37 over 85 a year ago; junior college, 100—increased 20 over a year ago.

Of the 2,628 students on the campus at the end of the first week, 1,848 were men and 780 were women. Last year the division of the 2,204 students enrolled at the same time was 1,399 men and 805 women. Thus, of the 274 increase over a year ago, 228 are men and 46 are women.

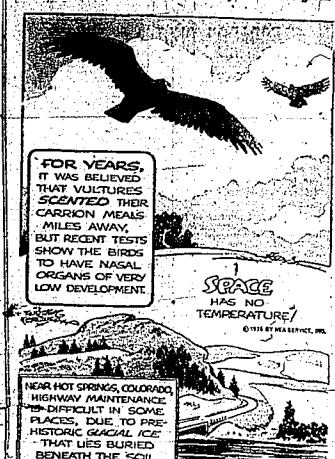

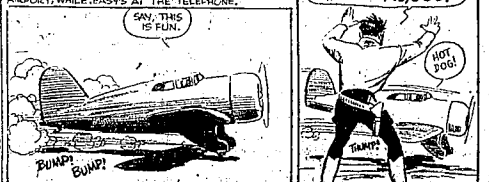

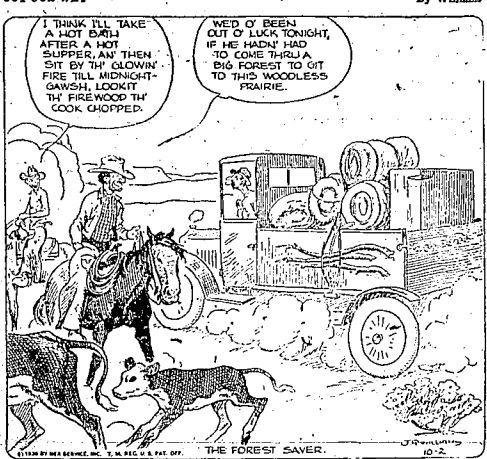

GIANT DIRIGIBLE PASSES STORMS

'Hindenburg' More Than Half Way to Its Destination, Frankfurt

ABOARD AIRSHIP HINDENBURG, Oct. 2 (Special)—The great airship Hindenburg, carrying three New York newspaper writers on an air race around the world, was more than half way to its destination—Frankfurt, Germany—last night, it today.

Senator William Edgar Borah is undoubtedly the most controversial public man in Idaho to interview.

Daily conferences with "Idaho's Grand Old Man" are an acute pleasure, not a privilege to the Journalist's heart.

He talks freely about all things, from the minutiae of the New Deal politics, foreign affairs, to the minutiae of the minutiae. Today, but it is always "off the record" with the gentle reminder that it is not for publication.

His comments are a constant reminder that you must be best for the door before he can say: "That's not for publication, of course."

Despite numerous statements from political big-wigs that Borah is not a friend of the Republican party and Nonic Lee, I am the correspondent opinion that Borah will never reveal his opinions for public publication.

His statements will continue to carry his campaign just as he goes—without comment.

He is the only Republican candidate who is not from the state on a concerted, planned tour of the nation by state, G. P. Headquarters.

I won't blot the party; I'll tell you what I think of it as I see it.

Urging him to advise his campaign position for the three days of the race, he said he would wisely across the desk. But if you can't get it, you can't get it confidentially, he's willing.

Contrary to popular opinion, Borah is not piqued because he failed to get the Republican nomination for the presidency.

"I didn't expect to get it," he said. "I was sure I would get it. I wanted to get in a position where I could dictate certain things to the party."

He won't be quoted as to what he thinks of the party's interpretation of his favorite policies.

G. P. National headquarters are giving word of Borah's coming out in support of London. They've promised him a large audience, but you may doubt in your mind if you'll only have a conference with him.

"I'm not interested in what London or Roosevelt or any other political candidate tells me," Borah says. "What I'm interested in is what the people and how they keep their promises."

Borah reminiscences delightfully about the years in the United States senate. He chuckles "quickly" as he tells how hard he and his constituents in the United States—worked to keep the United States out of the League of Nations following the World war.

"No, I'm not going to write my memoirs," he says. "At least not for publication now. If I do, I'm not going to let them be published until 50 years after my death. They might hurt certain people's feelings if they're printed now."

First Quarter Deficit Is \$507,679,769 Less Than Last Similar Period

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (Special)—The federal government closed its first quarter of the new fiscal year with a deficit of \$507,679,769 less than that at the end of the first three months of the last fiscal year, the treasury reported.

The treasury's monthly statement for Sept. 30 showed a sharp rise in receipts and a slight drop in expenditures compared with the same period of July, August and September last year.

The statement showed that the government has spent \$1,020,199,764 for running regular activities and emergency undertakings this year as compared with \$1,530,492,311 at this point last year.
