# Kimberly Boasts Air Mail Record

KIMBERLY, Oct. 7 (Special) —Since the first day of July of the current year a daily check of air mail pieces has been made at the postoffice, showing 158 pieces mailed during that month. Two hundred fifty-seven pieces or an increase of 63.05 per cent were mailed during August. Six hundred and seven pieces were mailed during September.

This is the report of Clyde Urban, postmaster, who says: "The first piece mailed for a single day was on Sept. 11 when 83 pieces were mailed. Five of these were dispatched to St. Louis, Bluff train 672 and 78 were cancelled for dispatch by the Union Pacific stage, leaving Kimberly at 8:41 p. m. for Salt Lake City. For the first three days of October 305 air mail parcels have been dispatched. A daily count of these pieces may be seen in the south window of the postoffice."

Suggestions Made —Patrons are asked to see that letters, cards, etc., are in some way properly marked. Via Air Mail a sticker obtained at the stamp window or a distinctive mark placed on the letter by the postal employee will aid the clerks on the railway postoffice in their sorting of the air mail pieces.

To give some idea of the value of the service rendered by the air mail letter, mailed in San Pedro, Calif., bearing the postmark at 10 a. m., reached the Kimberly postoffice in time for delivery on the rural route the following morning."

## CHILDREN'S HOME SHARES IN CHEST

### Representative Voices Thank For Finances and Aids. Continued Help

With the help of the Twin Falls Community Chest, the Children's Home Finding and Aid society of Idaho has been able to render a great service to Twin Falls and the state of Idaho according to Miss Opal Hillington, former resident who visited here this week in behalf of the institution.

The Children's Home faces the problem of the care and maintenance of 200 children—a daily average in the receiving home—of 100 children and an average of 100 children placed in foster homes where close supervision is given, she says.

Babies and the little tots are usually adopted after they have been placed in foster homes for the children in foster homes are the other children who will never be adopted.

Many Problems

The first service rendered a child committed to the Children's Home is food, shelter, clothing and medical care. "The next, the individual problems of each child, such as physical problems and the proper adjustment. Children are given educational advantages and religious training. The Children's Home is non-sectarian and children attend the different churches.

Many have been saved from being permanently broken by the temporary aid given. Children are given free care from three to six months and returned to parents when their own homes are reliable. A number of children from tubercular parents are receiving care in the Children's Home and will be cared for until medical authorities see fit to have them returned to their parents.

Children taken away from parents who have failed to provide proper home environment and care are first given care in the receiving home and later placed in good foster homes.

Every Free Care from Three to Six Months

At the present time, the Children's Home is caring for 10 children from Twin Falls and vicinity either in the receiving home or under supervision in foster homes. The Children's Home is not a state institution. It is a charitable institution governed by a board of directors. It does, however, receive a small appropriation from the state and also some county aid, but 40 per cent of the income must be raised by charity. The Children's Home is non-political.

### SMUGGLING CURB DUE FOR HAWAII

#### Treasury Sends Strong Force Of Agents to Break Up Honolulu Influx

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—The treasury announced today a strong new force of federal agents has been dispatched to Honolulu to break up extensive smuggling from the Orient.

Recent law enforcement activities have shown that Hawaii is the center of large scale illicit operations of goods from China and Japan, particularly narcotics, officials said.

Named Director  
Disqualified by enforcement activities in that state, treasury officials have designated Commander Stanley V. Parker of the coast guard to take command of anti-smuggling activities there for an indefinite period. Parker will come from San Francisco Friday, and will have a strong force of men from the west coast to assist him. He will be in charge of customs, narcotics and alcohol tax law enforcement.

Meanwhile Honolulu Customs Collector Walter Doyle has been called to Washington for a conference and Chief Customs Inspector there, John Oliviera, has been demoted.

Successor Named  
Oliviera will be replaced by Carl F. Eilfer, customs inspector at Los Angeles.  
V. O. Buren of Baltimore, will go to Honolulu as customs agent. Additional agents and inspectors will be sent from the west coast, according to the department. The treasury is in charge of customs and the narcotics bureau.
