#### Al. Claims New Deal Ignored Parties Made in 1932

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—The New Deal's alleged repudiation of the 1932 platform is the ammunition Al Smith carries today in his battle with the Democratic party in the "out-of-power" state. He made it clear why he looks for "a walk" and why he broke his "no deal" speech last night before 4,000 persons, most of them dissatisfied Democrats who said they would follow the happy warrior "as long as he would walk, and in any direction he may choose to go."

Smith said he intends to take up the 1932 Democratic platform in a future speech, an attempt to show the Roosevelt administration that they were "winning" the war.

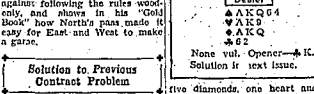

CONTRACT BRIDGE

PERMITS BID TO GAME
By William E. McKenney
(This is the second of a series of articles dealing with contract bridge in the Cullerton System as featured recently in Ely Cullerton's "Contract Bridge" column in the Gold Book of Bidding and Play.)

Today's auction's opening bid was a minimum, and North, fearing such a minimum, was technically correct. However, Cullerton's analysis explains following the rules would, and shows in his "Gold Book" how North's pass made it easy for East and West to make a game.



Solution to Previous Contract Problem
South leads one heart and at least four spades. He knows that five clubs not have only a four-card diamond suit, for if North had held four diamonds and an ace he would not have passed the opening bid. Therefore, in any case, South must have no fewer than three clubs. Likewise South must hold the queen of clubs, for North has not been named the holder of a bid with an ace and a queen. East therefore knew that, if he played the ace and king, the queen would not drop. Having lost three tricks, East tried to avoid the loss of the setting trick by use of the backward finesse. He led the jack of clubs, South covered with the queen and dummy took the ace. Now the nine of clubs was led from dummy, and when North played low, East finessed. The nine won the trick, and East made his contract. Copyright, 1936, N.E. Stiles, Inc.

South led three rounds of diamonds, East trumping the third. East then led hearts until North took the ace. North returned a spade. With three rounds of trumps drawn and all three spades cashed, East could count South's hand for him.

Police believe she deserted her love of horse back riding, but her career, that she was attempting to hike-like out of the state.

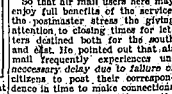

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AIR MAIL USE IS STRESSED HERE

Postmaster Strunk Points Out Fast Service Available To All Patrons
Twin Falls citizens may not realize it, but they now are only one-half business day from California cities, the nearest and the Atlantic seaboard, by means of fast and frequent air mail schedules, according to Postmaster M. A. Strunk.
So that air mail users here may enjoy full benefits of the service, the postmaster stress the growing attention to clearing these for letters destined both for the south and west. He pointed out that air mail frequently experiences unnecessary delay due to failure of clerks to post their correspondence in time to make connections with planes leaving the north-west.



Schedule Given
Those wishing to get air mail to California, the Midwest, and east in the fastest possible time should see that their letters reach the postoffice not later than 1:25 p. m. Air mail that pooled in California with reach points as far south as San Diego before the opening of business mail morning while that going to the east will arrive in Chicago in the early morning and in New York at the breakfast hour.
Postmaster Strunk called attention to the fact that air mail is less expensive and generally more efficient than special delivery regular mail; also that air mail special delivery frequently can be used to advantage for mail scheduled to reach its destination after regular delivery hours.
If air or special delivery letters should be placed in the drop marked "Special delivery and air."
