PHILIPPINE GALES LEAVE TOO DEAD, HUGE CROP LOSS

Hundreds More Missing After Typhoons Sweep Northern Island Provinces

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 12 (UP)—Fragrant reports are pouring in tonight indicating that the northern Philippine provinces, battered and scorched by typhoons, suffered one of the most devastating natural disasters in recent Philippine history.

Conservative estimates placed the total dead at more than 200, and Red Cross workers reported that there were several hundred missing.

Huge Farm Losses Communications in at least 10 northern provinces were totally or partially disrupted, enabling community officials to gather only fragmentary details of widespread suffering, inundations of villages and huge agricultural losses.

Thousands of persons were made homeless by the hurricanes, and the driving rains which swept away the fragile crops of the rural districts.

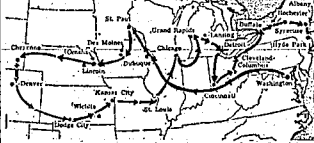

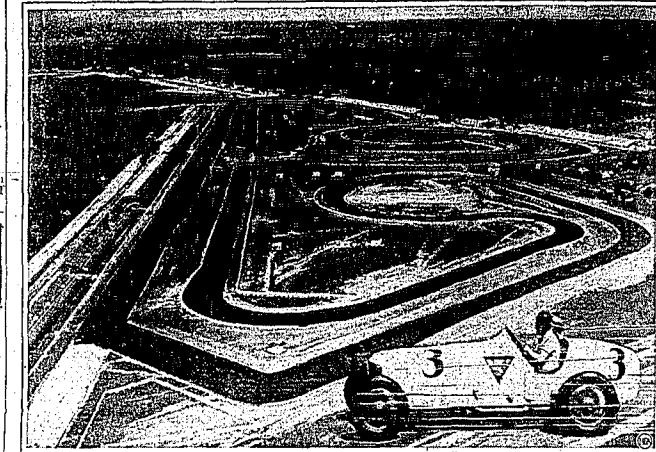

he remarked, "are sufficient to redeem every dollar of our currency and more than to redeem every dollar of our currency and yet people for partisan party are willing to let the government be a scapegoat for fear that our currency is not on a sound foundation."

Defending his broad emergency program, the president said in the complete statement of business of mines and of farms, there is only one emergency capable of starting things going again—government—not local government. He said that the federal government is the only one that has reached the point where it can begin to do what is necessary. But the federal government is not.

"Those of you who now see business moving upward in this country and stores and factories know that your president's policy for the first time—that the wheels of your industry and business begin to turn for the first time—only after the government had begun to spend money and had provided employment for millions of people on all 'welfare' projects."

Observing that states and localities originated the projects, he declared that "today it is a pitiful spectacle to see federal agencies call this great program waste and extravagance for they are the same kinders who were their own state or county or town involved, were they not to Washington pleading for federal aid."

Mr. Roosevelt took 24 hours of rest at Cheyenne following his farm speech at Grand Rapids, Minn., last night. There he helped celebrate the 10th birthday of Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt.

The president again set forth his philosophy of the good neighbor and reaffirmed the purpose of his administration, "to be an example of peace to a war-weary world."

Peace Ideal Gaining  
"I am proud to say," he said, "that the ideal of the good neighbor is gaining acceptance among other neighbors to the north and to the south of us and throughout the world. There is no war on this continent from the north pole to the south pole. There is no war in this hemisphere in Missouri and Illinois, making a major speech in Chicago Wednesday night."

# INTERSTATE CURB URGED ON CRIME

### Forty-Three Legislators Will Be Asked to Help Battle "Commuters"

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Forty-three state legislatures convening in 1937 will be urged by the interstate commission on crime to start a legal war against "commuting criminals."

The council of state government will present a four-point program designed to simplify the procedure of extraditing criminals, facilitate the summoning of out-of-state witnesses, permit officers to cross state lines to arrest fleeing suspects, and permit interstate state agencies for supervision of persons on parole.

The American Legion has pledged itself to back the commission program. New York, New Jersey have adopted the four-point interstate extradition bill. It had adopted three, and Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota and Virginia each have approved one.
