# Hunting Army Awaits Start of Pheasant Season Thursday

## Outside Groups Augment Idaho Nimrod Forces

South central nimruds of all ages and sexes—augmented by a greatly contingent of hunters from Nevada, the Pacific coast and the east—will take to the fields in search of pheasants Thursday morning.

Open season in southern Idaho arrives at 9:01 a. m. Thursday, and will continue until Nov. 15 inclusive.

The Twin Falls and Jerome tracts—"the best pheasant hunting region in the world," according to Deputy Game Warden Grover C. Davis—will receive the bulk of the south Idaho pheasant-seeking army and practically all of the big business sportsmen from outside the state. Five other south central counties, however, are ranked as touch pheasant country and will draw their full quotas of hunters.

The open season starting Thursday morning for a full month includes Ada, Adams, Blaine, Canyon, Coeur d'Alene, Elmore, Fremont, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, Owyhee, Payette, Twin Falls and Washington counties.

The season, according to state game wardens, includes all pheasant neck, mutant and McMillan pheasants.

Hotels are expected to be jammed with hunting groups on the basis of reservations already made.

Some reservations at Jerome, it was understood, were made a full year in advance by enthusiastic outside hunters. Reservations in hotels or private homes in Twin Falls will be extremely scarce because of the fact that the opening season will be extended to include the entire month of November.

Supply "fairly good." The pheasant hunting period in general popularity, will see a larger number of devotees than in years past, but never before, Davis predicted. The supply of birds is said to be "fairly good."

Big limit, the warden pointed out, is 100 birds, but the possession limit is also four. Successful hunters may ship four birds out of the state on a special permit, available at 50 cents each, at warden's Idaho hunting permit.

Davis warned against shooting from motor highways and from motor cars.

Nuvolari Trims Yankee. Poorly Equipped and Not Used to Road Tests.

By LESLIE AVERY. NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—The Italian driver, Giuseppe Nuvolari, extended his reign to the United States today with capture of the first "revvy" of the Vanderbilt cup race—300 miles around the 100-turning track, which George H. Roberts announced this afternoon.

Equipped with a 100-horsepower American driver, Nuvolari, who had won 83 out of 107 continental races before his Vanderbilt cup triumph, drove his powerful Alfa Romeo around the four-mile prize-lap layout 77 times in 44 minutes and 44.94 seconds for an average of 68.98 miles an hour. Hitting the top of the race at 100 m.p.h. on the straightaway in front of the grandstand, he finished with the exception of the 27th when he was held up by a crowd.





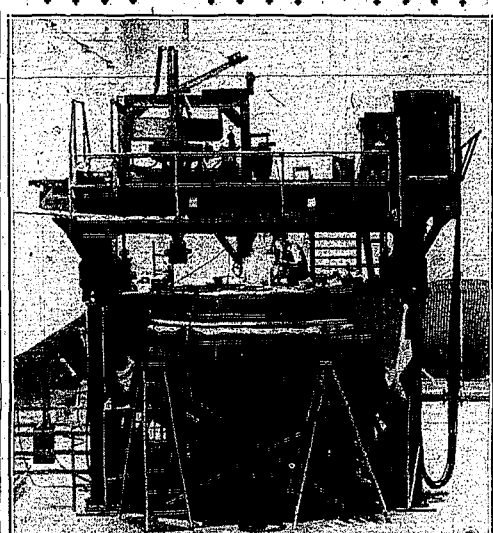

A million dollars' worth of buildings to house auxiliary apparatus and instruments have already been built at California.

Already the telescope mounting, which will weigh 800 tons, is being built at Philadelphia. That includes the 12-foot latticed metal tube inside of which an operator will sit while in a cage while the telescope is in use.

The money, somewhere between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000, is coming from the various Rockefeller foundations for this month during all man's attempt to peer into the unknown.
