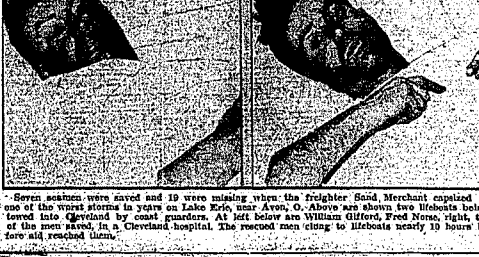

STATE CHAMBER FAVORS CHANGES

Urges Voters to Approve Two Proposed Amendments to State Constitution

Idaho State Chamber of Commerce in an appeal to local chambers of commerce throughout the state is urging adoption of the two proposed amendments to the state constitution, they being on the ballot in the Nov. 3 election.

"Statistical of the two amendments will be found in the following: 'Will you kindly call for the ratification of the amendments to the two constitutional amendments to be voted upon at the general election and the ratification of the amendments for the two questions submitted here:—

"Shall section 9 of Article 5 of the constitution of the state of Idaho be amended so as to provide that the supreme court shall have original and appellate jurisdiction from officers of the industrial accident board and that such appeal be limited to questions of law."

"The primary objective of this amendment is to:

"To hasten final decision on the most important question in the findings of the industrial accident board.

"To minimize expense in obtaining final decision in contested cases.

"To hasten final decision in contested cases to the advantage of the injured employee who is in need of funds while in distress.

"To amend section 8 of Article 5 of the constitution of the state of Idaho so as to provide that the legislature have power to authorize the state board of land commissioners to exchange granted lands of the state for other lands owned by the state within the United States."

"When Idaho was admitted to the Union, the federal government granted to the state surveyed townships for common school purposes, many thousands of acres for the schools and many thousands of acres were selected from the unappropriated public domain.

"These sections were made up in tracts ranging in size from a fraction to 40 acres in size and Idaho today at the owner of many thousands of acres of land in all sections of the state.

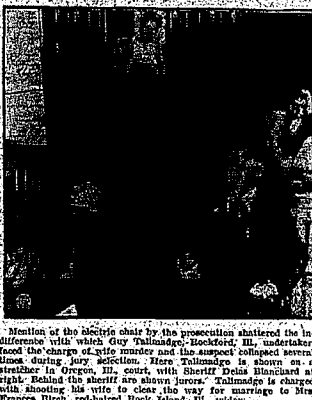
"The primary object of this amendment is to permit the state to exchange lands with the federal government and to hold the lands in units of sufficient size so that they can be administered, sold and developed to their greatest economic value."

"Lands now owned by the state are chiefly valuable for their timber and grazing resources. Owing to their scattered condition it is impossible to locate them and prevent a great amount of trespassing."

"The passage of this amendment will permit the state through exchange with the federal government and the department of interior to block the holdings of timber lands into larger units, thereby increasing the value thereof and to obtain larger units of grazing land, thus increasing the opportunity to sell same or produce a greater income from grazing lands."

"We urge that you bring this matter to the attention of the electors and urge them to vote 'yes' on each question."

Whenever a suit has been agreed upon by a ruff, for example, a bid of a new suit at the level of four-odd is an asking bid. Assume that the bidding has been South 1 spade; North, a spade; South 2 clubs; the asking bid is 1 No. Notch has the ace of clubs (or a club void) in his hand, with a singleton in the king of clubs and an outside ace, he bids the ace (asking bid). If it happens to be the ace of trumps, but with two or more

small clubs he signs off by re-bidding to four spades.

In today's hand, any player who held fourth cards would certainly mind aim ambitious upon obtaining a double raise. It would. The asking bid it would be impossible for him to find out that his partner has exactly the cards needed for the slam—the ace of diamonds and the king or a singleton club.

In the Contract System, however, South's four club bid asks specifically for the king of clubs or its short suit equivalent, a singleton. North also must yield information about his ace.

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WILDLIFE GROUPS SHOW INCREASE

Growth of Interest Is Shown in Directory Issued by Biological Survey

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (Special)—Growth of interest in wildlife conservation is reflected in the continuing increase in the number of organizations concerned with wildlife protection, says the U. S. biological survey in announcing publication of its 90th annual directory of national and state-wide organizations and their officials.

The 18-page list this year includes more organizations of this type than ever before, although, as in previous years, it does not include purely local organizations.

Compiled by Frank G. Orin, of the survey's division of public relations, the new list has been issued by the U. S. department of agriculture as Miscellaneous Publication No. 244, under the title, "Officials and Organizations Concerned with Wildlife Protection, 1936."

This directory is for officials charged with administration and enforcement of game laws and for the convenience of persons desiring to communicate with officials and organizations concerning wildlife conditions in United States, Canada, Newfoundland, Mexico.

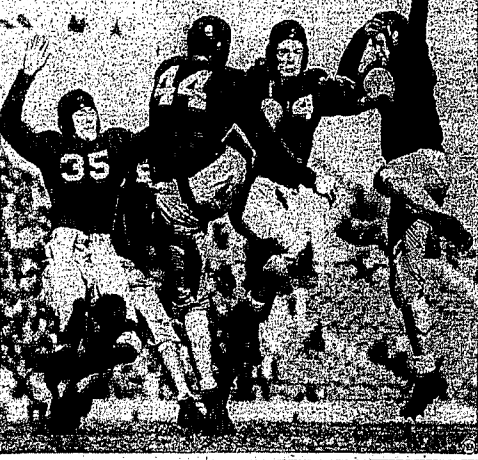

Social Security Benefits In Idaho Extended to 61,970, Says State Director

Approximately 11,870 needy men, women and children and 50,000 indigent and dependent workers in Idaho are now covered by the public assistance and unemployment compensation provisions of the social security act, these figures were announced by W. T. Lockwood, state director for the National Emergency Council for Idaho, and are based upon a report of the social security board summarizing the progress made under the act in the eight months since it became operative.

Idaho is now participating in every feature of the social security act administered by the social security board. It has set up an unemployment compensation system which will protect 60,000 workers against loss of income during temporary periods of unemployment. The social security board pays the costs of administering this system.

Provision is made for the state to establish public assistance plans for aid to the needy aged, the needy blind, and dependent children, which, with federal funds, provide for aid to come to individuals unable to provide for themselves. In September an estimated 7,400 aged, 240 blind, and 3,880 dependent children received assistance under these plans at a total cost of \$28,760. Approximately one-half the cost of this aid to the aged and the blind and one-third the cost of aid to dependent children was paid by the Social Security board.

Since the state began cooperation with the federal government under the terms of the social security act, a total of \$1,070,570 in federal funds has come to Idaho to aid it in providing these benefits.

State Receipts

It has received \$4,174 for administration of its unemployment compensation system, \$25,000 for fee for aid to the needy aged, \$23,910 for aid to the needy blind, and \$116,820 for aid to dependent children in their own homes. Federal aid has made it possible for Idaho to provide much more aid than would be possible out of state and local funds alone.

In addition to these cooperative federal-state features of the social security act, Idaho citizens also come under the federal age benefit system provided by the act.

He mentioned that the supreme court is all caught up with its work and that the justices would go to northern Idaho Nov. 9 to conduct a periodic session.

"The senator was quoted as emphasizing 'the participation' of Herbert Hoover and other reactionary Republicans and Democratic leaders in the Landon campaign, and in forming this support evidence of the character of Mr. Landon's candidacy."

"I am no hypocrite, but I would be one if I associated myself with these men in support of Governor Landon against President Roosevelt," Senator Borah was quoted as saying.

"It is very clear to me there is only one choice, and it is not on the side of those discredited and reactionary spokesmen."
