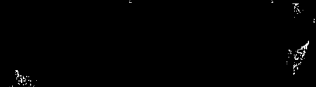

BOLOGNA, Italy, Oct. 24 (UP)—Premier Benito Mussolini, in an address to the Italian Fascists today said "I send a message of peace to the world."

Mussolini spoke in the public square at Bologna during a tour through the countryside. He recalled that Italy had not been at peace for 19 years, when an attempt was made on his life.
"The world," he said, "has always changed before us." "No one was answered with a roar." "No one was answered with a roar."
The prime minister continued, saying that Italy was now dominated by the same spirit which inspired Julius Caesar's 10th legion which founded the first Roman empire.
Mussolini said the past 19 years had been divided into three periods. ACTION FLOUTS LEAGUE

Hints Solidarity of Hitler and Mussolini; Clans Arrives For Conference

ROMA, Oct. 24 (UP)—Italy today, in a gesture of friendship that constituted also a warning to all Europe, recognized formally Mussolini's conquest of Ethiopia today.
Fascist Adolf Hitler, in conference at Berchtesgarden in Bavaria with Count Galeazzo Ciano, Italian foreign minister and Premier Benito Mussolini's confidant, announced the recognition, flouting the League of Nations and those great powers which opposed so long and so valiantly Duce's war on Italy's fellow League member, Ethiopia.
Arrives for Paris
"Hitler's action was announced in Berchtesgarden in Bavaria at Berchtesgarden across the Alps."
Mussolini was touring the provinces when the announcement was made, visiting two small towns on his way to Bologna, where he met a carefully staged demonstration. There Mussolini addressed a peace bid to troubled Europe and expressed his joy over Italy's triumph.
Today's recognition by Germany of Italy's conquest of Ethiopia was the first formal one by any government. It was not a surprise because Germany recently reduced the League of Nations to the status of a debating society.
"It was welcome because of the strategic importance of the 14th day of October as any government that Austria and Hungary would follow Germany soon in recognizing Italy's action places obligations," including "the United States," he elaborated.

Madrid Waits For Merciless Aerial Attack

MADRID, Oct. 24 (UP)—Madrid waited all day today for a merciless air raid. All railroad service was suspended. Normal activity was all but paralyzed. The capital's million-odd people, gazed anxiously at the sky, and attuned their ears for the dreaded sound of planes.
For many hours yesterday, those people who could serve themselves to watch any spectacle of terrible beauty as nationalist airplanes flew over the helpless city on what was believed to be but a forlorn hope of what was to come. It seemed to have no intention of doing so.
Prepares for Raid
Instead, the capital made itself ready for the raid. Redoubt and regular traffic was held to a minimum. Thousands remained in their homes or stood in the streets watching for a plane. Crews of the city's scant supply of anti-aircraft guns stood by on unloading watches. "Stand fast!" "Well wait!" "We guns will" "I am and you are not" shouts about at street meetings.
But there was no pretense that beautiful, gay Madrid was not lying low now in constant fear after the raid yesterday.
Under a clear blue sky a great fleet of nationalist planes flew over the city today in a demonstration of their power. As the anti-aircraft and machine guns, popped, the great bombers and fighters hurtled planes dipped and swooped contemptuously. Occasionally would come the terrific explosion of an airplane bomb, but shattering or the alacato burst of a machine gun.
The nationalist force, Dominguera, dropped in the section adjacent to the north railroad station, at the northwest side of the city, labeled "Irraca." Several bombs fell in the great Casca Campa park on the west side. Many people were wounded, principally by machine gun bullets. Most of those wounded were in the suburb.
Many people stood outside to watch. But thousands crowded in the city was tense and anxious. (Continued on Page 2, Column 7)

Portugal Severs Madrid Relations

Fascist Vs. Communist Hate At Danger Point

LONDON, Oct. 24 (UP)—Fast growing hatred between the Nazi-Fascist countries of Europe and those which lean toward the left wing in politics reached the danger point today, Fascist Portugal abruptly broke relations with the left-wing Madrid government.
Nazi Germany recognized Fascist Portugal's conquest of Ethiopia. It was announced officially in Rome.
Communist Russia seemed ready to speed arms to Madrid after recognizing the non-intervention agreement. In the Spanish civil war "an empty form scrap of paper" and that Russia no longer considered herself "bound by the agreement to any greater extent than any of the remaining participants"—meaning the United States.
Will Fight on Russians
Spanish nationalists made it known they would fire on any Russian arms ship which entered Spanish waters.
Paris reported that Fascist Italy and Nazi Germany not only intervened in the Spanish civil war, but that they had already been selected to recognize the rebels' "new government."

That was a richly retrospect in the story of the greatest airplane flight in aviation history.

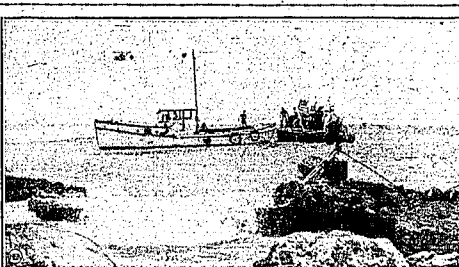

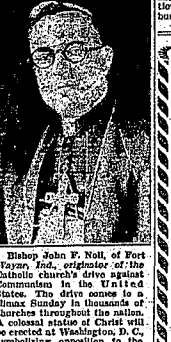

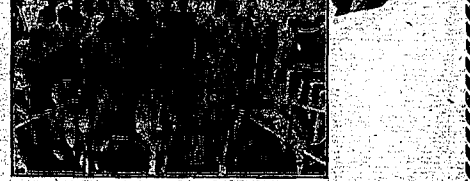
