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LAWYERS SCORE 'ONE AMENDMENT'

Secretary of State Chamber Lists Arguments Against Idaho Change

L. F. Parsons, secretary of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, today issued a statement calling upon the Chamber of Commerce to give immediate study to the proposed changes in the state constitution, voting which will take place Tuesday.

Parsons says that since his recent statement asking support for both the proposed constitutional amendments, a number of attorneys have stated to him that it is undesirable to amend our constitution as contemplated in the following question:

"That section 9 of Article 5 of the constitution of the state of Idaho be amended in so to provide that the supreme court shall have original and appellate jurisdiction from certain of the inferior accident board and that such appeal be limited to questions of law."

Lists Objections

"The basis of the objection to the amendment is that under the constitution of Idaho every person is entitled to have his controversy presented to and decided by a court of competent jurisdiction on both questions of fact and law; that to amend the constitution as proposed will be a denial of the above right and will rest exclusively in the industrial accident board (an administrative commission) the power to determine the facts and to deprive the courts of their right, which is guaranteed to all litigants under the constitution."

"The present workers' compensation law provides that an appeal from an industrial accident board shall be only on questions of law. This provision has been upheld by our supreme court. Nevertheless, many members of the legal profession are of the opinion that provision which denies courts the power to determine the facts in any controversy is unconstitutional at any rate, this matter is now subject to the will of the legislature. To remove the power of review as amended as suggested, then the legislature would have no further jurisdiction over it."

Further Argument

"It is their position that by the opponents of this amendment that they would feel that they can be delegated to the industrial accident board (an administrative body) and thereby our system of state government consisting of three separate legislative, executive, legislative and judicial will be broken down."

"This is an important question and I request you immediately appoint a committee to carefully consider the matter and advise me at once as to the attitude of the people of your community."

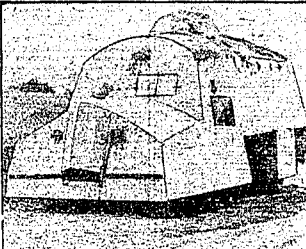

The car is pictured as it thundered along a country road en route to Madrid, once a gay and romantic city, but now a place of fear and death. Even while these armored cars rolled into it, rebel airplanes flew repeatedly over Madrid, singly and in formation.

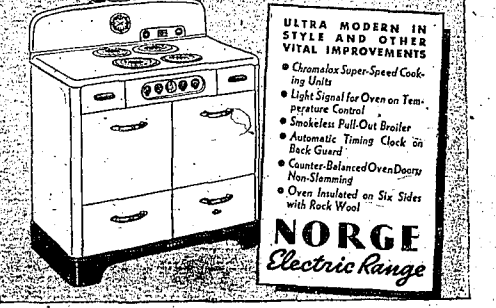

LONDON (Special) — King Edward VIII is crowned on next May 12, British who are often are pleased to call Americans "dollar-chasers," will give their quotas from the U. S. 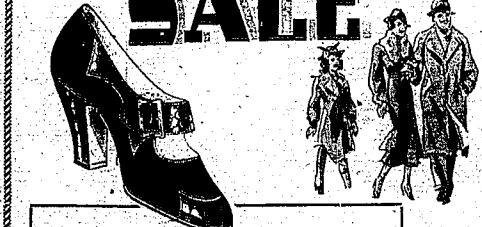
