# COLD-RESISTING THEORY OFFERED

Professor Says 'Bound Water' May Explain Why Some Areas 'Chilly'

MINNEAPOLIS (UP)—How the north westerly winds can freeze with bareness, cars and throats—in the winter while their budding-up city brethren suffer treated cars and noses is believed to have been explained by Ross A. Gortner, professor of agricultural biochemistry at the University of Minnesota.

Gortner explained that "bound water," a little known substance that exists in plant and animal life, may be the reason. It is the same factor that causes butyric coconut to freeze at over 100 degrees winter while wheat is hardiness.

Advies That Is Lacking

"It can think of no other reasonable explanation for the ability of some people to stand the cold," Gortner said. "We know that many persons can step out of an office building and get their cars frozen in a short time. Yet others seem able to stand almost anything. There is no positive proof, but there may be a relation between bound water and that ability."

Gortner said that bound water is water that becomes an integral part of the solid matter of the plant or animal and will not evaporate.

Beccomes Solid Matter

"All water in living organisms is not just plain ordinary water," he said. "Under conditions of low temperature, a portion of the water ties itself up with the solid material in the cell and is changed from the fluid into the solid state."

"If it does freeze does not disturb the life of the cell."

In the same way, Gortner continued, bound water would be able to freeze in a portion of the body of the body to freezing weather and to allow without mitters or car mats.

# HISTORIAN SAYS TEACHER CAGGED

**NEW YORK (UP)**—Freedom of speech, zealously guarded heritage of American government, does not exist for lower school teachers in the United States, except in isolated instances, Howard K. Beale concludes in a study just published.

That many Americans are not interested in freedom of speech and indeed exert strong group pressure to suppress that constitutional right, is a contention which Dr. Beale found after extensive and meticulous research on this controversial subject.

The book is "Are American Teachers Free?" published by Scribner's at a price of 16 volume. It is a survey of social studies for the American Historical Association.

Dr. Beale offers evidence that teachers are gagged by public opinion. He mentions groups such as the D. A. R. and American Legion, newspapers, business, politicians and school systems themselves. But the author places no blame on schoolmen as on outsiders for the condition he finds. The survey is the result of four years research into the question of freedom of speech in lower schools since 1918. Cases are presented.

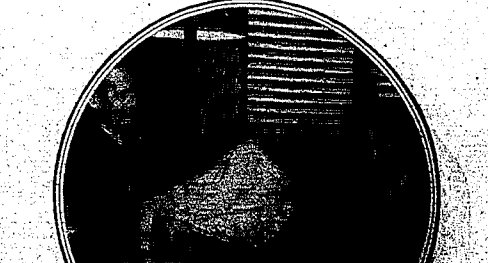

# U. S. AND BRITAIN AIR PACT URGED

### Accord Between Big Powers And Australia Advised as Defensive Measure

By HENRY WOOD  
SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—An aerial alliance between the United States, England and Australia for the defense of the Pacific is being advocated by Capt. G. E. Toovey of the Royal Air Force, chief technical officer of the Handley-Page firm of British airplane manufacturers.

Toovey is on his way home to Australia after a year of consultation in England with officials of the British war office. He is a veteran of the Egyptian Gallipoli and several front campaigns of the World war.

"World peace depends on peace in the Pacific," says Toovey, "and that depends in turn on the United States, England and Australia speeding up their air defenses and aerial communications."

Advocates Peace at Sea  
"It is absolutely necessary that air communications be established between the United States, Australia and New Zealand. The future of the Pacific is in the hands of these nations, and it is time they got together for further defense of the Pacific."

"War in Europe is imminent at any time. America, Great Britain and Australia should combine in an English-speaking union to preserve the peace of the Pacific and let Europe take care of itself."

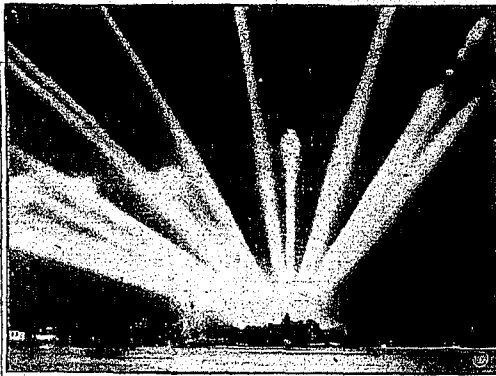
Toovey expressed great satisfaction at the progress being made in the building up of Pacific air lines. In addition to the Pan-American Airways from San Francisco via Honolulu, Midway, Wake, Guam to the Philippines, and the lines of the Imperial Airways and the Dutch Air Lines that connect Australia with London and all European centers, Toovey declared that at least two other fundamental lines are now under consideration.

British Lines Considered  
One of these is an English line from Honolulu to Brisbane by way of Christmas, Perth, Samoa and the Fiji Islands, and the other an American line from Honolulu either by way of Hawaii and Baker Islands or Jarvis, Palmyra and Tutuila Islands to New Zealand.

The last leg of this line from New Zealand to Australia, it is understood probably would run in the hands of an Australian company.

"These Pacific airways," declared Toovey, "constitute the first step in the building of an adequate aerial defense in the Pacific."

Compulsory increases that ranged from 25 to 50 cents were imposed on householders, while voluntary increased payments were made by the gas, electricity, chemical, brewing, confectionery, iron and steel and other trades of 25 cents a ton.

From both sources the industry received an average of 17 1/2 cents a ton more for its coal than before the miners' wage question was settled.

# NATIVES DEMAND WHITES' DIGNITY

### New Guinea Tribesmen Force Scientist to Shave and Keep Up 'Front'

SYDNEY (UP)—Contrary to the ethics of adult colonies who insist that all inmates shall go nude, New Guinea natives object to the extreme degree of having white people among them go "nude."

So strongly is this objection entrenched in the native tribes that L. P. Ledoux, American anthropologist, was obliged during his five months stay with New Guinea tribes, to keep clean shaved and maintain the standard of living in conformity to the dignity of a white man.

Ledoux, who is conducting an anthropological research work under the direction of the department of anthropology of the American Museum of Natural History, has returned from his five months work on the island of New Guinea. He spent the entire time in the village of Knapp.

Built Own House  
"I built my own house," Ledoux said, "and dressed myself in a shirt, shorts and a white hat. But the natives insisted that I should keep my own place as a white man and also a matter of respect to their own high standard of living insisted I should shave and keep my hair combed."

"While I took a large amount of canned food with me, yet I ate little of it as I retained the manner of vegetables and game was plentiful."

"I found the natives on the whole very intellectual, some of them even being able to read and write in three languages."

Studies Trading Complex  
"The objective of my work was to coordinate itself which had been done by other scientists in an endeavor to trace and find a reason for the 'trading complex' of the natives. They trade extensively in shells and pigs and what is more strange in dollars."

"Although they are not allowed to perform many of their dances, which deal mainly with activities of life, they manage to sell them to tribes along the coast, and in some cases they translate the

Registration figures showed the Democrats leading the Republicans by a weighty margin—figures which will be complete until registration closes at 6 p. m. Oct. 31.

Sees Record Vote  
Secretary of State Franklin Q. Kuhn predicted today that Idaho voters will flock to the polls Tuesday to vote on national, state and county candidates and register their opinions by ballot on two constitutional amendments.

Idaho occupies a unique position in the nation in that it is the only state to be holding a general election throughout the nation. National, state and county candidates will be voted on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

Because it appears the Democrats will be victorious in the election, it is generally conceded there is facing the steepest decline in the state. Union candidates voting into electoral high gear two weeks ago.

Nation Watches Idaho  
Idaho occupies a unique position in the nation in that it is the only state to be holding a general election throughout the nation. National, state and county candidates will be voted on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

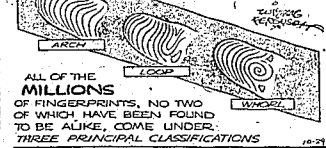
