

G.O.P. ENDORSES DEFENSE PLANS

House Republicans Support Program, But Question Guam Proposal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(UPI)—The House Republicans endorsed the plan of President Roosevelt's \$352,000,000 defense program, but held back on the Guam proposal, which they said was "extremely important" but extending defense lines as far west as Guam.

The minority adopted a joint resolution after a secret conference meeting more than an hour.

Representative John J. McCormack, the house minority leader, said there was some question about the report but asserted it was enabled to do so.

He declined further detail on the score.

Prior to dealing with specific items, the Republicans voted to sustain the Republicans' motion.

"Obviously, military establish-

ments must be adequate to sustain the obligations to clearly im-

piled on the 'Munich' doctrine."

This may well be considered as part of the supreme obligation to defend the continental United States.

Adoption of the Republican plan, however, came just a few hours after the house rules committee had rejected the House Foreign Relations Committee's major portion of the president's program, includ-

Stage lines were routing buses bound to and from Salt Lake City via Pocatello, unable to 100 miles west of town. The highway department snow plows and men pushing through drifts to open 100 miles of U.S. 90 South.

Spokesman for Women's Organization Tells Resolution's Aims

Twin Falls Twentieth Century Club's resolution setting up a relief fund "in no way affects our clients who are not clients of the club," whether WPA or not.

He said of these resolutions, "It was made clear to us by persons who move to Idaho for the express purpose of getting on relief," it was explained.

"Institutions" Test.

The first resolution requested legislation to "actively" enact in the legislature a law making a broad state residence of three consecutive years necessary, before any person can draw relief through any public relief agency.

Groups representing only temporary assistance proposed amendments to return such persons to the state of their legal residence.

The second resolution, all things being equal, would require Idaho to renew its request to Congress for a law to the effect that citizens in the state of Idaho shall be granted, as persons otherwise qualified, the same relief as those having at least three years residence in Idaho during which time they have received no type of public relief, any public relief agency.

Both of these resolutions were to make clear to persons who move to Idaho for the express purpose of getting on relief," it was explained.

The third resolution, all things being equal, would require Idaho to qualify for an application for public relief.
