Legislation Proposed for Removal of Bridge Toll

House Bill Would Permit Purchase of Twin Falls-Jerome Bridge for Not More Than \$500,000

BOISE, Feb. 18.—The state of Idaho would be empowered to purchase the Twin Falls-Jerome intercity toll bridge for not more than \$500,000 under terms of a bill introduced in the house of representatives today.

The structure, once one of the highest traffic spans in North America, has been privately owned and operated for many months by those who favor removal of toll charges.

Today's bill was sponsored by the revenue and taxation committee and introduced by A. L. Taylor, U. S. representative from Twin Falls.

The bill provided: 1. Creation of a toll bridge committee to be headed by Governor G. A. Hofmann and composed of the chief executive and four citizens.

2. Obtaining of toll bridge through condemnation proceedings and agreement with owners.

3. Authorization and sale of treasury notes not to exceed \$500,000 at 3 percent interest.

4. Payment of the purchase price in full per gallon on all motor fuels stored, sold, distributed or used for propulsion in Idaho and collection of the same as well as to a fund for the payment of such taxes.

5. Permitting reduction of such tax from income taxes.

REVISION URGED OF LIQUOR LAWS

Idaho House Bills Would Permit Licensing of Locker Clubs

BOISE, Feb. 10.—Three bills in the Idaho House of Representatives today would repeal Idaho's 1925 liquor law and permit sale of wine to restaurants and creation of locker clubs.

They were introduced by the house state affairs committee, of which Representative Ed Gaffney (R-Coeur d'Alene) is administration leader, chairman, and sponsor.

The bill that would repeal the 1925 law and set a license system maintained virtually along the same lines as the existing act.

1. Creation of a state dispensary to import and sell alcoholic liquor through state liquor stores or dispensaries in the original package, the same as at present.

2. Control of the setup by a three-man non-administration board and a secretary and manager, as now to be paid \$3,000 and paid a \$25,000 bond.

3. Revision of the present 21-year-of-age limit for obtaining a liquor permit, as to be done now.

4. Revenue would be distributed as follows: 20 per cent to the commonwealth fund for the purpose of 50 per cent to incorporated and specially chartered cities and villages as to the amount that part of the revenue goes to the public school income fund.

5. Conviction of a crime would revoke individual permits; they also could be revoked by the board after hearing on evidence of drunkenness, desertion or non-support of dependents, or in cases where the licensee is convicted upon public assistance, this was a new provision.

6. Advertising would be limited to that allowed by federal law, instead of the present matter of no restriction of the board, as it is now.

7. Enforcement would be up to the county attorneys and sheriffs, and the attorney general of the state would be charged with supervisory duties.

8. Manufacture would be required to have bonds and licenses and under authority, the revised act would be expanded to permit the sale of wine to restaurants for the purpose of wine and resale of it.

9. Permits would be required to post a \$500 bond.

10. Restaurant owners would be included in the definition of a restaurant.

11. A third bill would further expand the revised act to permit the state dispensary to license locker clubs to serve liquor in club or locker.

12. The bill would require that liquor be purchased by the member of the locker, for each club would be \$25 and each club would be required to post \$1,000 bonds.

13. Another measure, also introduced by state affairs committee, would amend the 1925 law to provide that two-person adult-advertising alcoholic liquor in any form or through any medium.

14. Newspaper and magazine advertising, now so penalized under the provision of the board.

15. Twenty-two appropriation measures for state departments in various situations were introduced. The bills were prepared by the joint house and senate finance committee, which has been working for weeks.

16. Other measures introduced provided:

By revenue and taxation committee authorizing the state to acquire toll bridges through issuance of treasury notes—\$500,000 which would be repaid by a tax of one mill per gallon on all motor fuels stored, sold, distributed or used for consumption in Idaho.

By state affairs committee—Permitting the appointment of deputy state purchasing agents and creating an advisory board for the office of state purchasing agent.
