Senator Pittman, Chairman of Foreign Relations Committee, Calls for Firm Stand in Defense of Rights

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Senator Pittman (D-Ore.), today declared tonight that Americans would die if necessary to preserve the rights of minorities throughout the world. "I am not concerned tonight that Americans would die if necessary to preserve the things they considered worth more than life."

Ridiculing the British policy of appeasement and the American isolationists, the chairman of the senate foreign affairs committee, said that a firm stand in defense of American rights throughout the universe.

Such a policy, he said, is a specter prepared for the Washington Star's radio forum, was the "most likely" to keep the Dictator States from attacking the United States.

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STATE HIGHWAY BILL INTRODUCED

Measure Would Permit Issuance of \$1,000,000 in Treasury Notes

BOISE, Feb. 20.—Administration leaders introduced today a bill to authorize the issuance of \$1,000,000 in treasury notes to provide funds with which the state could advance federal funds for road construction in 1939.

The bill was sponsored by the house state affairs committee, of which majority leader Ed Cuffey (R-Clearwater) is chairman, and provided for the issuance of not more than \$1,000,000 in treasury notes at interest not to exceed five per cent.

Under terms of the bill repayment would be made within three years and four months after Jan. 1, 1940. The notes could be sold on a secured basis at a rate of not less than six per cent.

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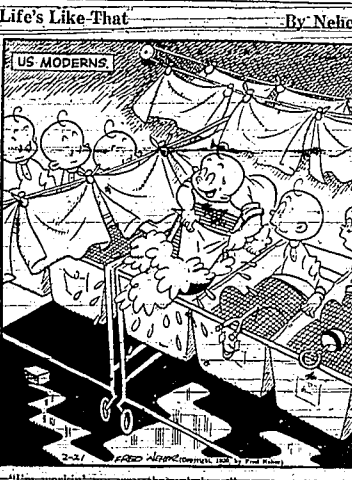
