





## LAWMAKERS ACT ON MANY BILLS

More Than Score of Pro-  
posed Laws Disposed of  
During Day

**BOISE.** Feb. 20 (AP)—The Idaho legislature disposed of more than a score of bills today.

The senate acted on these:

By house judiciary—Providing for the protection of workers incapacitated by certain occupational diseases and broadening in that respect the present workmen's compensation law so as to require employers to insure their employees against loss from disability and death through accidents. Passed, 38 to 0.

By house judiciary—To make affidavits prima facie evidence when filed to clear up "real property." Passed, 42 to 0.

By house judiciary—Providing that probate judges shall certify to the state auditor that any document filed in their courts without charge when such copies are prepared by the applicant for them. Passed, 42 to 0.

By house judiciary—Permitting mothers, when fathers of minors are dead or incapacitated, to consent to minor claims. Passed, 42 to 0.

By house judiciary—Providing for the protection of miners and employees of the state, who now are exempt. Passed, 42 to 0.

By house judiciary—To prohibit optometrists from using the title "doctor" in signs, advertisements or otherwise. Passed, 42 to 0. The bill was introduced, 17 to 10.

By Senate Select Cities—To create the department of industrial hygiene in the division of public health which would undertake further study of the question of occupational diseases. Passed, 42 to 0.

By Senate Select Cities—Amendments to the state workers' compensation law. Passed, 44 to 0.

By Sen. E. L. Batten—Amendment to the state nurses' law and substitute for it a law clarifying present statutes and specifying the powers of the state board of nursing. Passed, 42 to 0.

By Sen. E. L. Batten—Amendment to the state fish and game department law to provide for making levees to cover previous obligations incurred by emergency passes. Passed, 37 to 1.

The house considered these bills:

By Representative Jesse Anderson (D-Bonneville)—Permitting the state fish and game department to extend aid of the blind. Passed, 50 to 1.

By Sen. E. L. Batten—Amendment that persons who are employed at first-class stations sign payroll vouchers. Passed, 51 to 0.

By house fish and game—Authorizing the state fish and game department to comply with provisions of the federal wildlife restoration plan. Passed, 50 to 1.

By house fish and game—Authorizing the state fish and game department to comply with provisions of the federal wildlife restoration plan. Passed, 50 to 1.

By house fish and game—Amendment—described by Rep. Anderson as "a good one"—to permit the state insurance fund to loan \$25 to 21 counties.

By house agriculture—Regulating the sale of seed potatoes. Passed, 33 to 0.

By house municipalities—To require filing within 30 days of claims against municipalities. Passed, 35 to 10.

By house—To question the state retirement fund to be administered by the state insurance fund. Passed, 35 to 10.

By house agriculture—To provide notice to irrigation districts of impending tax rate by counties. Passed, 35 to 10.

By house corporations—to permit reinstatement of a foreign corporation which has failed to pay its corporate taxes for three years.

By house state affairs—To restrict plecting activities to bona fide employees of the first bank placed under state control.

By house library—Transferring control of the state traveling library to the state board of education. Passed, 35 to 10.

By house revenue and taxation—Permitting trustees of a school district to fix minimum tuition levels for general school purposes when authorized at the district's annual meeting. Passed, 34 to 15.

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## TOWNSEND PLAN CENTERS DEBATE

### Three Florida Legislators Back Age Pension at House Hearing

**WASHINGTON.** Feb. 20 (UPI)—The house ways and means committee heard strong endorsements of the Townsend old-age pension plan yesterday. The bill, which would delay Social Security benefits for five years, was introduced yesterday.

Rep. Francis E. Townsend, author of the bill, told the committee Dr. Francis E. Townsend's plan for \$300-a-month pensions to persons over 65 may be the best of all. "It is the most honest and healthiest plan I have ever seen," he said.

"There ought to be some kind of dividend for men who have paid taxes for 40 years and own a part of the government in the world," he said.

Representative Peterson (D-Pa.) said the Townsend plan not only relieved the government of a financial burden but also put money in circulation and stimulates business.

Representative Cannon (D-Calif.) said the Townsend plan would be justified because it would abolish the need for other relief programs.

"It is better to give people a chance than to take away their rights," he added.

Rep. Green (Pa.), a Los Angeles insurance agent who sold the former state senator's plan, told the committee he had no objection to the Townsend plan.

He also criticized the General Welfare—federal pension program, saying it would cost \$200 million and maximum benefit of \$200 and maximum benefit of \$100.

By listening to expostions of the Townsend plan, the committee was tending to add "opportunities" also were expanding, "which gives opportunity," he said.

Rep. Green (Pa.) said the Townsend plan, which would give a pension of \$300 a month to persons 65 and older, would not affect the state pension plan.

Community Chairman Carter (D-Tenn.) said the Townsend plan was a good one.

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## Governor Vetoes 30-Day Divorce

**HELENA.** Mont., Feb. 20 (UPI)—Governor Roy E. Ayer's veto of a bill to shorten the time limit for beginning divorce actions in Montana to 30 days.

The governor in his message said the bill was unconstitutional.

He said the legislature should have voted upon the unsuccessful and trouble-making bill when it was introduced.

Rep. O'Connor of Butte, moved that the bill become a law notwithstanding the veto.

The bill will be voted on at a special session of the legislature at 11 a.m. (MST) tomorrow.
