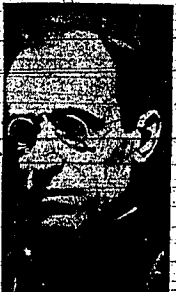

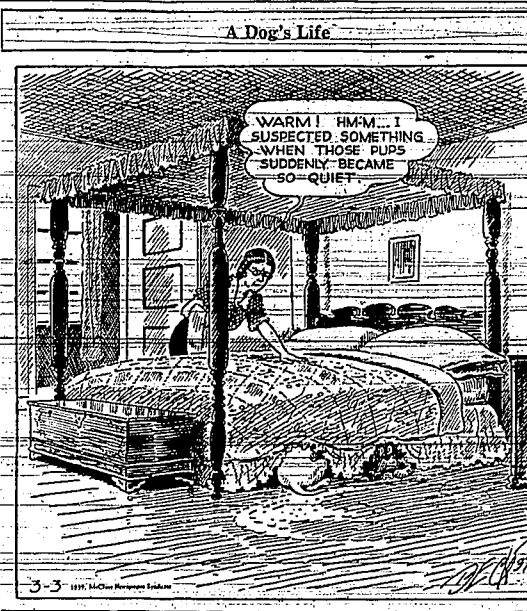

# LABOR SECRETARY TARGET OF DRIVE

## Coalition in Congress Seen Aiming to Restrict Powers

**By KIRK J. SIMPSON**  
 WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Another coalition movement of anti-new deal Democrats and Republicans in congress is underfoot and this time the first woman member of a presidential cabinet, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins appears to be the target.

Whether the movement will succeed or result in a further cabinet change beyond prediction, Frances Roosevelt has shown a determination to stand firmly behind his chief new deal ally against every attack by party dissenters. Yet he promoted former Kellogg Administrator, Hopwood to cabinet rank at the expense of Perkins who was the focal point of intra-party criticism over "politics-in-reality" charges. That look forward to the direct-line of political maneuvering which has been the historical analysis is a question whether some shift in the duties for Mrs. Perkins might result—similar to that there was a widespread desire among congressional Democrats for a labor-department change.

Significant Move

The circumstances of the vote in the house concerning in senate action stripping the labor secretary of any "budgetary control" of funds for enforcement of the Wagner act appear to be more significant than the Republican-sponsored impeachment of Perkins. Mrs. Perkins was repudiated by the senate in the carrying of the representative Cochran, Missouri Democrat. He based his claim entirely on an entry of the work of the hour administrator Andrew.

Yet Majority Leader, Mayburn and Representative Woodruff, Virginia Democrat, warned their party colleague that the vote would be considered as aimed at Mrs. Perkins.

Representative Cox, Georgia Democrat and critic of the administration, demanded to know whether it would be possible to have a vote of lack of confidence in the labor secretary. Woodruff replied it would be considered as aimed at Mrs. Perkins.

House Votes

"Has the gentleman any doubt but that that would reflect the true attitude of the membership of the house?" Cox asked.

"I would not wish to say that," Woodruff replied. "But the house voted first by standing, vote 222 to 179, then by roll call, 174 to 128, and then by a vote of 200 to 150, and gave Andrews exclusive control of wage-hour funds."

# SURVEY LISTS SCORE OF NEW MAJOR LAWS

**BOISE, March 2 (AP)—**The 25th Idaho legislature enacted into law more than a score of major measures which called for: (All will be effective on or before May 2, 1939).

1. Creation of the office of comptroller and placing in it the duties of auditing all state departments and institutions, formulating the budget and examining claims against the state funds.
2. Centralization of excise tax collection functions in a state tax commissioner.
3. Reduction of automobile and farm trucks licenses to a flat \$5.
4. Consolidation of the departments of public welfare and public assistance and placing them under direction of a non-political five-man board.
5. Settling up of a state police organization.
6. Establishment of junior college districts and maintenance by them of such institutions by a majority vote of the affected districts.
7. Eliminating contributions by counties to the state federal fund for the aged, blind and dependent children, and providing administrative relief for such entirely in the department of public assistance.
8. Transfer to the counties responsibility for caring for direct-riparian lands, providing such lands, homes, and requiring three years residence, instead of one year, before such lands can obtain aid.

# THREAT SIGHTED IN TRUCK-BILLS

## Idaho Interests Affected by Pending Nevada Legislation

**CARSON CITY, Nev., March 2 (AP)—**Nevada legislators today introduced legislation which would increase the taxes on trucks and buses operating on the state highways.

Adding taxes on trucks and buses operating on the state highways would limit truck loads to 12,000 pounds—between "routinized" trucks and "routinized" trucks—over such agricultural produce, over such trucks and buses operating on the state highway which is aimed in part at opening up California markets to Idaho's produce.

Leading legislators declined to predict the outcome of the measure, but indicated opinion that they do not believe it would be enacted.

The bill limiting truck loads to 12,000 pounds provides that this apply to all trucks and buses operating on the state highways between points now being served by railroads.

## Marshal Henry Petain to Represent France as Ambassador

**PARIS, March 2 (AP)—**Marshal Henri Philippe Petain, 82, who fought in the Franco-Prussian war and the Franco-British war, was named ambassador to the Nationalist Spain today in the hope of ending the fighting.

The appointment of the leader of the defense of Verdun coincided with a new French effort to bring the Spanish civil war to an end with unconditional surrender of the Spanish Republicans.

Cooperation with the Nationalist to close French ports to shipments of all supplies to Republican territory was one of the first evidence of pressure on the Madrid regime.

The French action served to illustrate a declaration by Chamberlain that France and Great Britain were working to give Nationalist Spain a quick victory while Italy seemed to desire continuation of hostilities.

The explanation of this paradoxical situation was advanced by official spokesmen—that the Fascists wished to keep their troops in Spain as a threat to France while the two western democracies were assured by the Nationalists that the Italian would leave immediately the conflict ended.
