

POPE RESTORES OPEN AIR EVENT

Coronation of Pius XII to Take Place Out of Doors

VATICAN CITY, March 4 (UPI)—Pope Pius XII, whose election departed from many ancient traditions, today restored one by arranging a coronation "out of doors" instead of indoors.

The ceremony, next Sunday, March 12, will take place in St. Peter's Square and from adjacent streets in Rome, just outside of Vatican City.

Pius XII apparently followed this procedure until they became voluntary "prisoners of the Vatican" in protest against the papal state's acquisition of the Holy See's temporal possessions in 1870.

Pope Pius IX, who succeeded the Pope in 1846, had adopted the first step in the coronation of the last to observe the custom. The new pontiff's predecessor, Pope Pius XI, was crowned inside the Basilica of St. Peter's, and the cardinals, bishops and priests made their first appearance on the balcony in 1922 after the Lateran accord had been signed.

When the papal mass is finished, the holy father will carry from the Basilica on a portable altar to the Lateran the golden triple tiara from the hands of Cardinal Giacomo Della Chiesa, man of the order of deacons.

Soon after the coronation, probably on the following Sunday, March 10, the chief of the papal household, the papal sacristan, is expected to leave the Vatican for the first time since his accession to the papacy.

BURGOS, Spain, March 4 (UPI)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco directed batteries of loudspeakers against the Republican line on the Madrid front, appearing to demand the unconditional surrender without further bloodshed.

Amplifiers carried the words of the Spanish general, who advanced to within 10 miles of Madrid.

"Surround Our Troops can't

SENATE GUARDS COUNTY COFFERS

Repeated Attempts to Permit Increased Levies Beaten Down

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, March 4.—The Senate of the 42nd Legislature of the state has established itself as a guardian of the coffers of the 44 counties.

Repeated attempts to permit increases in local taxes by commissioners for various purposes were beaten down in the senate.

Two bills to impose additional levies for school purposes, even though no emergency existed,

2. A bill to authorize a levy for boy scouts.

House Jokes

The house joined with the senate in going even further, and relieved the counties from making contributions to the state-federal fund for education, blind and dependent children.

The state shifted, however, to the counties the duty of keeping each of the 44 counties in the state up to \$10,000 per month, the past, but it reduced rolls by passing a law requiring each county to keep its residents of Idaho three years instead of only one.

The legislature, however, authorized an ad valorem levy to assist in the educational program.

Two bills to increase the state's \$12,000,000 mark—including relief and schools, but Senator K. C. Hartow, (R-Cassel), chairman of the state's revenue finance committee observed:

"We are expecting to get a budget, so much by what was appropriated, but not by what we voted, but it reduces the amount available for advertising.

"Other departments are going to be forced to go into an arrangement with the legislature for their appropriations."

Comptroller Bill

Among the most discussed measures adopted by both houses is the bill to consolidate all county offices.

It would consolidate the bureaus of public accounts, the state auditor and claim examiner offices.

The law becomes effective April 1.

It was designed to improve state accounting methods, improve budgeting, eliminate duplicate losses through false claims.

The most popular bill, however, is the \$3 automobile license measure.

Last year's automobile owners paid an average of \$14.28 for their license. There was more than 12,000 of them.

Most of the major measures have not been transmitted to the governor, but virtually all of them are administrative measures and are expected to be signed.

Under the present system, unless the producer is continually advertising, he cannot compete with the advertising campaign of the manufacturer.
