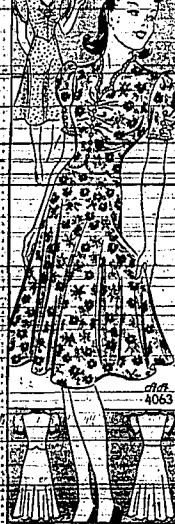

The tea set used was brought around the Horn in 1810 from China by Captain Lewis, whose later relics are held at Mrs. Powell's home.

Land Bank Officials at Twin Falls Conference Optimistic

Reduced mortgage debt of farms in the four northwestern states and fewer foreclosures on farms indicate a "healthy condition" for both the Federal Land bank and farmers.

Upwards of 175 directors and secretary-members of National Farm Loan Association in 32 southern Idaho counties gathered at the annual "two-day" conference for the first sessions of a two-day gathering in Twin Falls.

At the close of the day, the land bank had \$103,000,000 outstanding in first mortgage loans in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

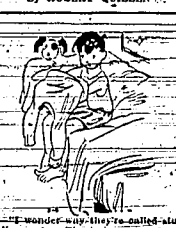
There was a slight reduction from 1937, but delinquencies and line extension requests were also reduced by \$2,000,000, he said.
