

# Roosevelt Links Neutrality Act With War

## Spain's Left Wing Battles in Madrid Against New Regime

### National Defense Council's Declaration That Situation is Under Control Punctuated by Fighting

(By The Associated Press)  
MADRID, March 7 (Wednesday)—Machine gun and rifle fire flashed and crackled in the darkness of Madrid's streets early today as communists fought against the new republican regime of General Jose Miaja and his peace program.

The national defense council, headed by Miaja, sought to reassure the "labor element" and to find the situation under control.

Bombers Attack  
The fighting was a continuation of yesterday's activities when the Miaja regime ordered republican airplanes to bomb the communists in a northern and eastern parts of the city in the afternoon.

Natives received in Paris from the Spanish border said tanks also had been employed in charges against the republican government.

The communique praised the aviation leaders for their part in endeavoring to wipe out the "little civil war within the civil war."

PARIS, March 7 (AP)—Street battles raged and republican warplanes bombed communists against the two-day-old government of General Jose Miaja fought to keep power long enough to make a "peace treaty" with Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

Way to Surrender  
Informed sources here reported that Miaja was trying to arrange a "peace treaty" with Franco. The nationalists, however, boasted that "we can take Madrid in a few days." The nationalists' dispatches hinted that Franco might choose a moment when the republicans would be unable to sweep down on the city, which would reduce the "endless economic toll" of the fighting.

Miaja's Republican troops battled communists in the Madrid area, according to Premier Juan Negrin's administration, ousted Sunday by followers of the "defense of Madrid." It was a civil war within a civil war.

A Nationalist radio station at Oviedo said that only when Franco would accept was "unconditional surrender," which Negrin had refused.

Madrid radio stations "bustily" broadcast appeals to Communists to abandon their fight against the Miaja regime.

Communist communiques warned Madrid residents that the army planes would bomb Communist headquarters in the capital.

"There is no reason for alarm," it declared. "It is the Republic which is being defended by the national council which fights for Madrid-Salvador the cities."


