IDAHO JUDGES THROW OUT 19 INDICTMENTS

Four District Jurists Join In Dismissing Remaining Charges Against Former State, Highway Officials

BOISE, March 14 (AP)—Remaining indictments brought in by an Ada county grand jury that spent six months investigating Idaho government officials were tossed overnight today.

A dozen former state officials and highway contractors were named in the 19 charges disclosed last week.

Four district judges joined in granting the motions. They were Guy Stevens of Blackfoot, Doran H. Struven of Gooding, Isaac McCosh of Pocatello and Charles F. Koenig of Boise.

They dismissed all remaining indictments voted by the grand jury that convened January 1918.

The only conviction still standing was obtained in the case of Tony Flethen, former state penitentiary chief clerk, who is serving a term for embezzlement.

It was the climax to a development that came less than a week ago when Attorney General C. W. Taylor, who directed the grand jury's work, announced he was withdrawing from the prosecutive officials.

McKeeves, highway contractor, R. L. Ball and Max L. Koney, also were named.

They were indicted for misuse of public funds, falsification of claims on state vouchers or perjury.

Trial of an action against Steiner, Johnson and McKeeves was postponed until March 22.

Dismissal of the indictments resulted in vacating of the trial date.

President's \$150,000,000 Request Stirs Up Storm

Democrat Denounces Roosevelt's Demand for Additional WPA Appropriation as 'Melodrama and Emotionalism'

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—President Roosevelt's demand for \$150,000,000 for WPA relief, he said, raised 5,000,000 people long the source of their livelihood.

His appeal went to the core of the consistency-impairing issue of government spending and led to predictions of a battle even more strenuous than that which attended the refusal of congress, earlier in the year, to grant the very same appropriation proposed today.

In preparation for that struggle, administration forces deposed Representative Woodruff (D-Iowa), majority leader of the house economy bloc, as acting chairman of the sub-committee in charge of the investigation of WPA's determination of need.

It was said by Chairman Woodruff, Co-Chief of the appropriations committee, who introduced a bill to carry out the president's message.

Defense Ministry Orders Populace Not to Resist; Church Bells Toll as Government Crumbles

Adolf Hitler in a swift coup at dawn today wiped out the last vestige of the Czechoslovak republic.

He marched his goose-stepping Nazi army into the ancient Czech provinces of Bohemia and Moravia and announced unilaterally that "had taken the Czech people under the protection of the German Reich."

The Czech defense ministry announced shortly beforehand that the German troops were coming, and asked the Czech people not to resist. Church bells tolled throughout Bohemia as the dramatic, stark announcements were read.

In the 24 preceding hours hasty-moving events piled one atop the other in stunning swiftness, each move apparently directed with precision from Berlin.

Slovakia declared itself independent of the Prague federal government; Hungary demanded Prague withdraw troops from Carpatho-Ukraine.

Hungarian troops marched to the border, and proceeded northward to Poland's border; Germany marched troops eastward through northern Slovakia toward Carpatho-Ukraine.

At the end of the day only the ancient Czech homeland of Bohemia-Moravia remained—nominally at least—of the Czech Republic.
