Blandford, Cavanagh and Rasmussen Outline Objectives

A three-fold objective for Twin Falls has been announced by a group of citizens for municipal election candidates. J. E. Blandford, candidate for mayor, and Dan J. Cavanagh and J. O. Rasmussen, candidates for city commissioners.

Temperatures during February were very little extreme weather, Ross continued.

Precipitation was reported "slight below normal" in the southwest and "normal" and "above normal" in the north.

Most ranges were covered by snow March 1.

Prospects are excellent for early

spring grass in practically all areas of the state, the report related.

"Early lambing was almost completed by March 1 in the southwest and central sections and good results were reported with lambing light up to the first of the month."

Ross estimated this year's early lamb crop was slightly smaller than that of last year.
