Nazi Threat Now Levelled At Rumania

London and Paris Turn to Soviet Russia In Quick Effort to Halt German Drive Toward East

BRITAIN and France turned toward Soviet Russia Saturday night in a quick effort to block a reported move against Rumania by a Nazi Germany they no longer sought to appease.

High authoritative sources disclosed the attempt to form a triple front against Hitler's eastward course of empire amid the still-moving events.

The "big powers" denounced Germany's seizure of Czech-Slovakia in notes which Germany almost immediately rejected as lacking "every political, legal and moral basis."

Paris and London called home their Berlin ambassadors "for talks" in a double effort which Germany countered by summoning from London her own ambassador for the same stated purpose.

Premier Daladier won from the French chamber of deputies legislative powers to whip the nation's defenses into shape for an eventuality which might demand an emergency Sunday cabinet meeting to consider defense measures.

The United States treasury on the heels of America's demarcation of the Czech-Slovak coup ordered an extra 25 percent tariff on many products Germany sends to this country.

The economic blow to the reich was regarded as a forcible expression of the United States' displeasure at Germany's tactics.

Authoritative British sources said Rumania had received a new ultimatum from Germany ultimatum demanding sole access to the nation's rich oil and grain resources in exchange for German "protection" of Rumanian territory.

King Carol was urged to demand Paris and London for a reply within 48 hours on what steps they could take him against the Nazi demands and Britain and France in turn to have asked Moscow if the Soviet Union would join them in buying from Rumania to block Hitler.

Many now in the largest outlet for Rumanian exports, Moscow kept a close watch on the situation but official comment was lacking.

Hitler himself left Vienna and Berlin prepared a rousing reception Sunday.

Central European tension approached the German-Spanish civil war, which Rumania and the Madrid regime had its readiness to negotiate an "honorable peace" and asked for an immediate Nationalist reply.

Dale. Dr. Benes is the only one of the university's illustrious alumni who has been a president of the republic of his native country. He was elected to the office in 1918, and served until 1938. 

WPA HELPS WITH IDAHO AIRPORTS

Records Show Expenditure of \$482,106 of Federal Relief Funds

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The works program administration reported today it has spent \$482,106 for developing aviation grounds and airports in Idaho since WPA was established in 1933.

Colonel P. C. Harrington, WPA administrator, said the money was spent largely for wages of men from rural areas who worked on 12 projects at five sites in the state.


It was part of WPA's \$112,000,000 program in the three and a half years to bring ground facilities up to requirements for modern air transportation with a view to their usefulness in any national defense emergency which might arise, Harrington said.

This expenditure of federal money includes building and equipping 1,029,000 airports and improved 403 others. As of the end of 1938, 37,986 men were at work on additional improvements at 164 sites.

Harrington in addition reported developments at city, county, state and military airports; the WPA has built 10 aviation landing fields and placed 10,000 markers in a program which eventually will locate fields for more than 15 miles apart all over the United States.

In addition to the airports and looking to expansion of commercial aviation, the 403 airports have been built where there are no airports at all.

LOG CABIN COMMUNITY SUCCESSION FARM PLAN

MAYFIELD, Ga., March 18.—This is the story of another project—a farm project—but there are no government officials involved, no political organizations in charge, no federal benefits asked.

It is a homey tale which starts shortly after the Civil War when three Negro slaves finding themselves free and dependent upon a landowner agreed to work for their own contentment and the contentment of their families and neighbors.

The story is told today as "Log Cabin Community," a section in Hancock county in east-central Georgia, where more than 100 Negro families number 37,000 Negroes and where they live hard working, Christian lives, send their children to school and maintain peace and contentment of their own making.

To tell the tale completely one must start at the beginning, which was in 1868 when Zach, Floyd and David Hubert crossed the sluggish Okechobe river from Warren to Hancock county in quest of a home.

A white man, advised that the area was free, bought them a place of their own, directed them to this section of the state and made arrangements by which they would buy 165 acres of land at \$10 per acre.

The young Negroes had no money, but their promise to pay in three years they had paid up every dollar of the debt, and the deeds were in their names.

But Zach, Floyd and David were not satisfied. They had purchased a place of their own, but they wanted those children to have some of the opportunities denied their parents. So they built a schoolhouse and a church.

They gave their land, they began to prosper. While accidents around them recognized the true character of their children and endeavored to take the children of the brothers to go to school. Today the 12 young people stay to college than any similar rural community in the South.

The present development, sometimes called Springfield community, was not yet a schoolhouse until 1922, when Zach Hubert, and his wife, Camilla, died.

Before their death, they had gathered the children together and upon some money, gotten together over 400 acres of land from which every child in the family had a plot of land.

The Hubert children decided that one of them, Benjamin P. Hubert, would continue the school and college for Negroes at Savannah should take it over, and Benjamin made his father's land serve members of his race.

He realized that his people need some sort of cooperative economic activity, recreation, improvement of health and development of culture and church.

The Log Cabin community center was the first part of the answer.

ARTIST MAKES STUDY OF BUMS

Maxo Vanka Paints Every Stratum of Life in America

NEW YORK, March 18.—Maxo Vanka used to be a court painter in Yugoslavia, but he likes stumblingbums better.

He once made stumblingbums quite likely than any artist in America.

Vanka has only been three working years in America, but he has painted every stratum of American life, and for good measure, has thrown in the most famous set of western church murals in the country.

These are the 13 brilliant murals in St. Nicholas church in Pittsburg, a fantastically suburb of Pittsburg. The church is a yellow brick affair of no architectural pretensions, stuck on the side of a typical western town.

And the artist, a Negro, and a court painter Vanka paint them.

Since they were finished in eight weeks the church has been a mecca for tourists, already 24,000 post cards of the murals have been sold to visitors, and they didn't stop selling for months after the work was done.

Vanka loves to talk about his painting. He has a show in one of the 5th street galleries in New York. It is titled "The Stratum of Life." It is a drawing of some bums sleeping in a abandoned subway station recalls how he creeps into their refuge through a secret entrance.

"I work in a subway, and I know how they sit in the cold ways, waiting to catch a newspaper.

A remarkable painting on a pool room interior in Harlem suggests the ease with which he made friends with the tough boys there.

Vanka is a smallish man with a little ape-shaped beard and a kind of active as a fox, quiet and clever. He has a way of looking at you that makes you feel that he has been looking at you for a long time.

The artist, by members, was of real help to him. He modeled for hands, postures, even for parts of the now famous star.

JAPAN PAYS BIG PRICE FOR WAR

Human, Economic, Political Losses Mounting Invasion of China

TOKYO, (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Japan holds its breath at this stage of her military drive against China as a study in survival.

Nearly all entries are dead. Incubation still is in the operation phase.

Nearly all resources of the nation have been drawn upon. Japan is in the red so deeply that other-minded Japanese economists are talking of selling the island in ten years of 100 to 1000, rather than of one or five.

War accounting would show:

- Human losses between 5,000 and 100,000 Japanese youth killed, 700,000 times the number killed in the last tanked with the mailed, the land (for making no mention of China's standing losses—estimated at 500,000 men—100,000 lives—or the inflation cost in human grief and misery.
- \$50,000,000 a Day—Economic losses Japan has appropriated for the war machine for the maintenance of her land and sea forces to the value of about 80,000,000 a day. Since the conflict began July 7, 1937, recently the Army and Navy budgets had appropriations at approximately the same rate would be added up to more than 100 billion yen. The operations no longer are on the same scale through the first 18 months of the war.
- "There is no certainty that all funds devoted to the war actually have been expended on that adventure. Some informed observers believe much has gone for munitions, Soviet Russia or into a secret war chest for such a conflict.
- This in the face of a foreign trade decline of 25 per cent, a decline in the loss of markets since the onset of the war and the crippling of industrial life in Japan.
- Political losses—She has increased China's war against her, but she has increased her own fear and distrust in the United States and in other nations.
- And a host of smaller nations, indirectly, she has drawn on her own resources of trust, loyalty and faith.
- China—These still are largely to the charge of expanding into the most countable in the world's money market. But Japan has occupied much of eastern China with its military, financial and communications






