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Nazi Threat Now Levelled At Rumania

London and Paris Turn to Soviet Russia In Quick Effort to Halt German Drive Toward East

BRITAIN and France turned toward Soviet Russia Saturday night in a quick effort to block a reported move against Rumania by a Nazi Germany they no longer sought to appease.

High authoritative sources disclosed the attempt to form a triple front against Hitler's eastward course of empire amid the still-moving events.

The "big powers" denounced Germany's seizure of Czech-Slovakia in notes which Germany almost immediately rejected as lacking "every political, legal and moral basis."

Paris and London called home their Berlin ambassadors "for remarks" in a virtual German ultimatum demanded by summoning from London her own ambassador for the same stated purpose.

Premier Daladier won from the French chamber of deputies legislative powers to whip the nation's defenses into shape for an eventuality which might demand an emergency Sunday cabinet meeting to consider defense measures.

The United States treasury on the heels of America's demarcation of the Czech-Slovak coup ordered an extra 25 percent tariff on many products Germany sends to this country.

The economic blow to the reich was regarded as a forcible expression of the United States' displeasure at Germany's tactics.

Authoritative British sources said Rumania had received a new ultimatum from Germany ultimatum demanding sole access to the nation's rich oil and grain resources in exchange for German "protection" of Rumanian territory.

King Carol was urged to demand Paris and London for a reply within 48 hours on what steps they could take him against the Nazi demands and Britain and France in turn to have asked Moscow if the Soviet Union would join them in buying from Rumania to block Hitler.

Many now in the largest outlet for Rumanian exports, Moscow kept a close watch on the situation but official comment was lacking.

Hitler himself left Vienna and Berlin prepared a rousing reception Sunday.

Central European tension shadowed the German-Spanish civil war, which Rumania and the Madrid regime call its road to Republican resistance, the Madrid regime called its road to negotiate an "honorable peace" and asked for an immediate Nationalist reply.

The partitioned republic of Czech-Slovakia, object of the notes flying back and forth between Germany and France and England, at least 10,000 residents of Bohemia and Moravia were known to have been ordered to report for questioning by the new German government. The orders did not mean, however, that they would all be released, but numerous arrests are known to have been made.

Britain and France, acting almost in unison, urged Hitler to cease in cope with Germany and promised to give a memorandum of Czech-Slovakia and the threat to Rumania.

Cabinet in Session Prime Minister Chamberlain raved back from Birmingham and promised a 15-hour cabinet session — the first Saturday since last year's September crisis.

No official announcement followed the British cabinet meeting, but the session dealt with a request from Rumania for a proposed British position on the German-Rumanian situation.

IDAHO SENATORS FOR REFERENDUM

Borah and Clark Demand Consideration of Plan for War Vote

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP) — Washington reacted swiftly today to European developments, with Sen. Borah and Clark of Idaho calling for consideration of a war referendum agreement. Senator Pittman (D-Nev.) demands revision of neutrality legislation, and the treasury ordering an extra 25 percent tariff on many German products.

Supporters of the war referendum amendment won the backing of Borah who said, "In the present state of affairs, it is imperative that we have some revision of it."

Clark, who proposed the amendment, said it would require an acquiescent vote of the people before Congress could declare war.

Clark said that the amendment would require a two-thirds vote of the Senate to pass, and that it would require a majority of the House to pass.

Newspapers of the Bohemia-Moravia protectorate, brought under French control, published a statement by acting secretary of state A. Drexler, who said that the French and British notes calling the Munich pact null and void had been received by the British government.

Since he was crowned out of Europe by Hitler's successful dismemberment of the republic he sought to keep intact, Dr. Benes has been a great lecturer at the University of Chicago, the breaking up of his country in the very last, sleeping aside only when Hitler and France violated their treaty obligations in a final agreement to prevent a general European war. His engagement in Idaho will be the only one in this section.

Prior to the World War, Dr. Benes was a professor in various Czechoslovakian universities. Since the war he has been a key figure in the struggles of that country. In 1915, he went to Paris to work as a diplomat seeking the liberation of the Czechoslovakia. A leading figure in the creation of the Little Entente, he was minister of the country's foreign affairs from 1918 to 1925. He served as the country's premier in 1921 and 1922, holding this post in addition to being minister. He served as the country's minister of National Affairs from 1923 to 1927 and was league president in 1927.

Benes has written extensively on central European problems and since coming to the United States has been in great demand as a speaker. He probably is as well informed as any man in the world today regarding conditions in that troubled area.

Send-off for Livestock Exhibits Going to World's Fair Leads

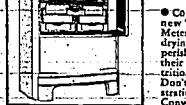

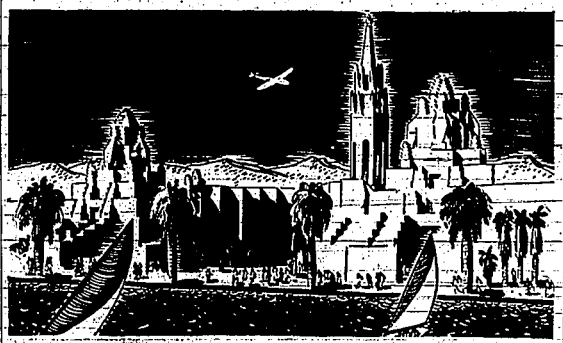

RAILROADS LOOK TO MANAGEMENT

New Plan Considered to Stave Off Nationalization

NEW YORK, March 18.—Some leading railroad executives and Wall Street bankers said today they were studying a new bold plan for railroad legislation—a "nationalization" in some form.

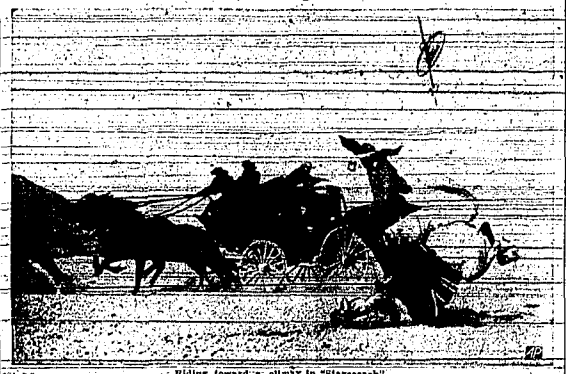

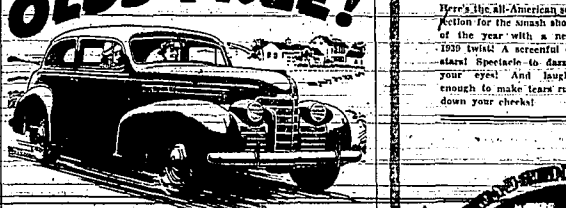

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LEWIS PROPOSAL TRACED TO REDS

AFL Official Charges CIO Labor-Unity Suggestion Communicistic

WASHINGTON, March 18.—An AFL official charged today to-night that the labor unity proposal advanced by John L. Lewis was that advocated by the Communist party.

In a statement, John P. Frey, president of the AFL's medical trades division, described as "identical" the Communist party's advanced two years ago.

He referred to the suggestion from Lewis, head of the CIO, that the AFL, CIO and railroad brotherhoods unite in a national labor federation.

Lewis made his proposal immediately after the first AFL-CIO conference held at the New York House recently.

AFL leaders already have rejected Lewis' suggestion, calling it "practical" and one which offered no possible solution of the problems existing between the labor unions, CIO and AFL.

Although Lewis proposal technically still is on the agenda of the AFL-CIO peace committee, the federal government has said it is not interested in the suggestion.

Lewis' plan is said to have been "leaked" to the press by a statement from the AFL negotiators which said "an agreement is being made" and "expressed" that the Lewis plan offered no solution.

Frederick W. Ruppert, vice president of the CIO, said the proposal "bears all the earmarks of the type of unionism which does not unite but divides."

Frey, who appeared before the labor committee investigating Communist activities last year and charged Communists had gained control in many CIO unions, said in his statement:

"One of the most serious problems presented by the CIO is the infiltration of Communism. Communist policy and Communist activities are being carried on in many labor unions and national organizations affiliated with the CIO. It will not make the problem only between the AFL and the CIO union, but will be a national problem, to solve which it is imperative that the entire labor movement be united. The only way to unite is to have a common front with Moscow's approval, two years ago."

HITLER FOLLOWS VEGETARIANISM

Fuehrer Consumes Chicken Broth, But Avoids Meat Dishes

By LOUIS P. LOCHNER
DERRIN—(Continued from the Associated Press)—Is Adolf Hitler a vegetarian?

The question is frequently asked, and hotly debated. The answer appears to be "yes" and "no."

Gen. Fritz Wiedemann, the newly appointed German consul-general in San Francisco and until recently Hitler's personal aide, answered shortly before he embarked for the United States that "the Fuehrer is a passionate believer in vegetarianism and tea-totals."

He was quite blunt in answering that Hitler does not believe in having any meat, but that he does eat chicken. The vegetarian movement which began in 1845, and which includes all animals, including fish, but even such products of animal life as eggs, milk, butter, and cream.

Men in Hitler's entourage admit that the Fuehrer consumes chicken broth from time to time. "This broth is of a concentrated strength not unlike the average chicken soup," said a spokesman.

It is now found that Hitler is very narrow as to call a man who occasionally consumes chicken broth a meat-eater. A "dinner associate" of Hitler's said, "then of course our Fuehrer is a carnivore."

As to the Fuehrer's own attitude—how he considers himself a possible vegetarian? "No," he said. "During the World War Hitler ate meat and drank beer. He became abstemious soon after he began his career as a soldier for Prussia. His better condition that he refrained from anything containing alcohol."

Even at state banquets, he proposes his toast by raising a glass which appears to be champagne, but which is really a non-alcoholic mixture of unfermented fruit juice and charged water.

As late as six years ago, Hitler still ate a favorite Bavarian dish of "chicken soup" or "chicken dumplings." Even "Hitler's restaurant" cannot call "Hitler's today," said a spokesman.

His kitchen chief is always on the alert for variations either in the composition of these salads or in the manner of cooking or steaming vegetables, fruits, and other edible plants.

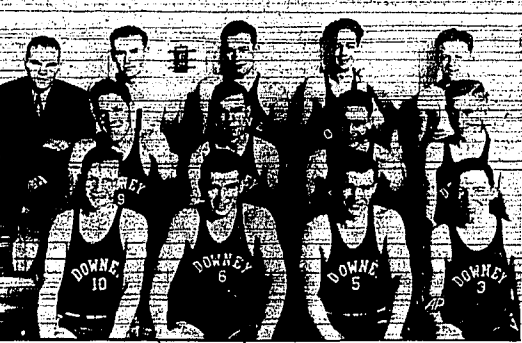
