

Congress Balks on Relief Fund

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—The dispute over President Roosevelt's appeal for an additional \$150,000,000 relief appropriation added another touch to a question of cutting \$2,000,000 off that figure, or not.

Memel is another of those territories Hitler has annexed to Germany, because World War peace-makers took it from the Führer. It did not come under Lithuania's control until 1920, when the tiny territory, which came from Russia after the war, grabbed it by 1921, the Germans. After that, the Lithuanians, led by Memel, won the Lithuanian rule, but granted her a large measure of autonomy. All went well until Nazis sprung up after Hitler took power.

Neumann has been steeping along, smugly, in late 1935 the Lithuanians lost it to the Nazis for 2 years in prison for subversive activities. But last February, when they celebrated their 20 anniversary of independence, he was freed. The Nazi structure was formed to fit Memel and Moravia as a Nazi province.

SEED POTATOES BUYERS WARNED

Idaho Agriculture Commissioner Points to New Legislation

BOISE, March 21 (AP)—Idaho farmers were warned today against "kype" seed potato peddlers.

E. N. Pettygrove, state commissioner of agriculture, who introduced legislation passed by the 1933 session provided that all potato sellers must sell seed which is certified or non-certified—must be accompanied by state department of agriculture inspection certificates.

"The certificates show the name of the grower, the quality and quantity of potatoes and their origin, and every buyer has a right to see such certificates before he buys potato seed for his specific purpose," Pettygrove declared.

"Seed potatoes come in from other states, and we cannot inspect them by inspection certificates."

"The recent legislature passed the law in an attempt to put the sale of potatoes by some truckers and others on an even keel that are not doing a legitimate business," Pettygrove said.

"There are approximately 45 inspectors in the state, and each is entitled to a reasonable salary," Pettygrove added.

"The law was one of two directly pertaining to the potato industry."

The other was a bill placing restrictions upon rail potato shipments in an attempt to bolster the market for higher grade tubers.

FEDERAL AID FOR SAFETY DEVICES

Idaho Public Works Chief Lists Allocations of Funds
