## Hunted Wyoming Outlaw Escapes While Possemen Bring Up Trench Mortar

Bloodhounds Put on Fugitive Killer's Trail

By The Associated Press

CODY, Wyo., March 23—Advancing posse officers found tonight Earl Durand, 26-year-old slayer of four, escaped from his canyon stronghold while a wartime howitzer and trench mortars were being runched at him.

Moving on the raw, meat-eating fugitive's shoulder fort to recover the bodies of two slain comrades, Sheriff Frank Blackburn and a force of volunteers rushed the trail to find Durand vanished.

During the advance of divided posse forces, the cross fire caused the horse Durand was mounting to drop.

Under Cover of Darkness

Surprise attack by Durand and muskets sealed during last night the steep ridge wall behind his fortress. Under cover of darkness, he probably reached the plains and crossed the state line into the Sunlight Valley country, Sheriff Blackburn said.

On an open slope 50 yards in front of the ridge wall, Durand stood off 100 riflemen.

Sheriff Blackburn's force found the bodies of Orville Luberry, George Arthur Argensio of Metcalfa, Wyo.

Both were shot through the spinal column, fallen with his shoulders to the ground, dead.

Dead Men Talk

Sheriff Blackburn said Durand had taken his share of his picks and spades and started his boy who hated to be "cooped up" in school into a canyon.

Desperately, the boy had outlawed 100 besieging posse men pursuing him for the killings of four comrades and neighbors.

Always aloof and solitary, the 26-year-old fugitive ranged from boyhood as a "hunter" in his home mountain country, the rugged Bear Tooth range, east of Yellowstone national park.

By his living in the wilds, surviving on the run, man of whom he killed with his guns, Durand's instinct of self-preservation was developed to an uncanny degree.

He was impelled, however, to join an outfit of desperadoes who planned his ride to find he had killed the last of his crew.

After he left his desolate school room after one year of high school, Durand set out with a horse for Mexico. That was in 1927.

Then, a civil action was instituted in district court here by P. O. Malley, Peccotello lawyer, Jan. 10, against Earl Durand, the state and taxpayers.

O'Malley was formerly manager of the influence fund.

Court Gives Instructions

At the trial, the court directed the jury that if it reached a verdict tonight it should be seated and returned in open court at 10 a.m. tomorrow.

Malley's attorney, the Associated Indemnity Corporation and the Auto Casualty and Surety companies, asked that the \$5,000 bond for Durand be set aside.

## OFFICIALS SCAN NEW STATE POST

Attorney General, Auditor  
Question Validity of  
Comptroller Law

**HOUSE**, March 23—(UPI)—Constitutionality of certain provisions of an amendment to the constitution of the state, proposed by the state comptroller, was questioned today by Attorney General J. W. Taylor, who is investigating the proposal by Senator Calvin Wright.

"It is my opinion that Senate Bill 67, insofar as it attempts to limit the powers and duties of the auditor, is unconstitutional," Taylor wrote.

Constitutional Measures

Republican administration forces sponsored the bill in the 25th legislature and overruled a veto by the state-appointed former State Senator Donald Callahan of Wallace to assume the post April 1.

Controller and transfers to that office the bureau of accounts, and, in general, most of the powers and duties of the auditor by the state auditor, Taylor wrote.

The fundamental question involved is whether such powers can be transferred from the state board of auditor to an office created by the legislature.

The constitutional officers involved in the proposed transfer of said auditor, and for the purpose of determining just what powers the new office will have, were called to the office. It was necessary to determine what were the duties of the office at the time the constitution was enacted.

Constitutional Powers

Chapter 7, of the 1887 statutes, the law in force at the time of the adoption of the constitution, gives the powers and duties of the state auditor, or comptroller, as he was called. Thereupon, therefore, the question was, what were the powers and duties of the state auditor?

Without telling "the audience" exactly what he had in mind, he stated, "I am convinced that powers and duties I created in any public service commission cannot be claimed by the constitution cannot be claimed after, in whole or in part, by a legislative act."




