CHARGES FLY IN DISPUTE OVER VETO

Secretary of State Accuses State Administration of Staging 'Sit-Down' Strike; Draws Bristling Reply

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, March 27.—Gripping increased tonight in Idaho's verbal warfare over whether the State Administration should veto on 15, 1939 legislative acts were valid.

Secretary of State George Curtis, Oxford-trained and a Democrat, accused the Republican administration today of "staging a sit-down strike" and "forcing a quick action" for "quick settlement of the controversy."

The link had more than dried on Curtis' statement, however, that in his own Democratic campaign he had told the press Curtis' statement was "an effort to avoid the veto of the 15 days."

When's 10 Days? Veto bills must be filed in the secretary of state's office no longer than 10 days after adjournment of the legislature on counting Sunday.

The time was fixed by resolution at 10 p. m. March 2 for adjournment of the legislature, but actually adjournment was not until 12:30 a. m. March 3.

So the question is: When is it due? Curtis said today: "The administration appears to be playing a bit down strike in the veto controversy."


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
