MOSCOW RECORD

492 Seniors Apply for Degrees at University of Idaho

MOSCOW, Idaho, April 1.—Judging from the number of applications filed, the university's senior class will observe its semi-sentimental year by conferring, at the 44th annual commencement, degrees on the largest graduating group in its history.

Four hundred and ninety-two seniors have filed applications for degrees. These groups, plus one candidate for a professional degree, constitute the largest senior class in the history of the state, which exceeded by 28 the graduating class of 1938, which included 463 students. Last year there were 462 students, and the record for the most recent total of cap-and-gown wearers at commencement have come annually occurrences at the university's graduation platform in the month of May.

To date, the university has conferred 1000 degrees, and the senior class' bachelors' degrees, 413 are master's degrees, 10 professional, and 56 honorary.



MCNUTT'S PLANS CLAIM ATTENTION

'Mail Order' Campaign for Nomination May Lead to Personal Drive

WASHINGTON, April 1.—It is thought that former Senator Paul V. McNutt of Indiana will be the "fast" aspirant for a 1940 presidential nomination. That field, however, has caught Washington political attention.

It came in the form of an announcement from the state of Indiana that a "mail order" campaign had been initiated. In his behalf, reports have long been current that the 1940 presidential nomination to the Phillips would return to the United States this coming summer to take over the campaign of the former senator. Indiana supporters to rally support for him at the 1940 Democratic convention.

The "mail-order" plan is circulating among Democratic state leaders of letters calling attention to McNutt's "extraordinary qualities" behind whom were some new Deal Democrats who might be another incentive.

Speaking Invitations
The communications could result in many invitations for him from more states and from other appearances might easily give his candidacy "more substance" than Washington political analysts attribute that purpose to the adoption of the mail-order plan. There is no question, however, as to whether that alone was the main reason for bringing out the plan at this time, so far in advance of 1940. Vice President Garner might be another incentive.

Whatever it involves, the McNutt campaign has been well-organized, political precedent herefore. They paraded their man during a year ago, in March, 1938, during the campaign to take up far eastern affairs with President Roosevelt.

No Hints Given

Reports were then current that McNutt's 1940 hopes had been taken up in consideration with President Roosevelt. Neither said anything publicly as to what that might mean, but it was in that connection. There was no hint of any commitment or intimation from the President as to his own 1940 plans.

Developments in the subsequent months have changed the political situation, however, to make renewal of his hopes in 1940 even more significant circumstances. Democratic defeats in gubernatorial races last November have thinned the number of Democratic governors, dates, particularly in the middle west. That has potentially improved McNutt's chances of winning upstate, in the midwest, and in other states with no favorite son material of their own.

Some political analysts here consider it possible that, whatever his attitude, he might welcome active delegating seeking at this stage of the campaign to represent and collect the Garner drift with its New Deal implications.

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

HISTORIC CHURCH PLANS MEMORIAL

Worshippers Take Steps to Honor Memory of James Madison

WASHINGTON, April 1 (7)—Worshippers at the famed Church of Presidents hope to create a unique memorial in this monument-dedicated town to "The father of the constitution."

To honor the memory of James Madison, who offered in the library the "bill of rights" guaranteeing freedom of speech, the amendment to the constitution, there would be set aside a free pew in St. John's Episcopal church for public use.

"At least in many historic churches of the east, most pews of St. John's are held by prominent families who have been here for generations,"

The memorial movement started after the St. John's Mortar Club, led

by Justice Roberts of the Supreme Court, and the American Legion ("March" 16) "passed unopposed" and that only a stained glass window in the church now commemorates the author of the "bill of rights."

Although eight presidents have been members of St. John's congregation, and the church has

been used by the White House as the little brown stone structure that stands across the street from the

White House.

The club, which had a bad accident, suffered by the Madisons

complicated the movement to build a church in the early 1800's.

When Madison was president in 1809, the only church in Washington, D. C., was located in Georgetown and Catonsville—located four miles away beyond the capital.

James and Dolley Madison often

attended services at the

Episcopal church in Georgetown.

was built in 1792.

Madison, who died in 1836,

was buried in the church.

Madison's wife, Dolley, died in 1849.

She was buried in the church.

The church was dedicated in 1801.

Madison's son, James, Jr., died in 1848.

He was buried in the church.

The church was rededicated in 1850.
