Legal Snarls Grow As Attorney General Rules Against Acts

J. W. Taylor Brands Defective Appropriation Measure and Printing Resolution

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, April 3.—Legal snarls in the Idaho capital increased in complexity today as Attorney General J. W. Taylor brands as unconstitutional more major pieces of legislation enacted by the 1939 legislature.

In two opinions written in response to inquiries from State Auditor Calvin Wright and Secretary of State George Curtis, he ruled:

1. That a \$350,000 appropriation act designed to permit liquidation of an asserted deficiency in the state department of public works was "invalid." The bill, which had been passed by the legislature, was not "sufficient authority to constitute a contract for printing the session laws."

Previously, Taylor held that the 1939 law intended to create the office of controller was unconstitutional, but Governor C. A. Bostwick declared tonight:

"I am not calling a special session of the legislature to consider any need-for-solving-a-special-situation."

COMPROMISE MOVE MARKS RELIEF FIGHT

Sub-Committee Votes Down Amendment to Raise Sum To \$150,000,000, as Requested by Roosevelt

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 3.—An effort to obtain a compromise agreement to appropriate \$100,000,000 for relief, instead of the \$150,000,000 insistently requested by President Roosevelt, was in progress in the Senate tonight.

Word of this move spread soon after an appropriations sub-committee had voted down, 6 to 5, an amendment to increase the higher amount and postponed until tomorrow the consideration of proposed legislation to appropriate \$100,000,000.

The purpose of the compromise was to get administration floor leaders to accept the \$100,000,000 appropriation.

Two senators, one a senator from the 1937 crop, would not reduce the figure further.

The purpose of the compromise effort would be to propose independently that amounts increased to the presidents figure.

The row over how much should be appropriated goes back to the beginning of the present session.

Mr. Roosevelt's proposal, \$150,000,000, would be available to carry WPA from early February to June 1, and to the end of July.

The House accepted \$125,000,000, and the senate approved the reduction by a one-vote margin.

That president requested that the bill be restored in a new appropriation.

Senate leaders voted last Friday to appropriate \$100,000,000.

GOVERNOR CHARTS CITIZEN TRAINING

Idaho Parent-Teacher Congress Opens Boise Sessions

Boise, April 3.—(UPI)—Governor's office executive told the state's parents and teachers today that citizenship was "something to be instilled and cultivated, not something to be expected."

"You and I have the best material in the world to use in constructing a better citizen," said Governor C. A. Botsford, principal speaker at the opening day's session of the thirty-fourth annual convention of the Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers.

"We have boys and girls in our schools—schools ready and waiting when you come to the program. If we let the opportunity for building fine citizens to us, we are guilty of the most gross neglect."

"Far too often we recognize the state only as the governing unit, which has a much greater duty than merely carrying out the duty of governing wisely and attempting to guide as well as regulate."

He suggested the state could accomplish the fulfillment of its educational responsibility for citizens by doing the following:

"1. Provide an extensive curriculum of civics, sociology, social studies, arts and training in the history of our country."

"2. Give to the student through an applied study of current events a greater conception of the demands of democracy and the responsibilities he achieves maturity in the affairs of the nation."

"3. Encourage students in the ways of self-help and guide him so his efforts toward self-help are con-

structively used."

STRIKERS HELD LIABLE TO PAY

Court Assesses \$237,310

Damage Bill Against

Hosiery Workers

PHILADELPHIA, April 3 (UPI)—A verdict of \$237,310 was returned in federal court today in favor of the Apex Hosiery Company in its suit against the International Union for a sit-down strike in 1937.

Branch 1, the American Federation of Hosiery Workers, and its president, James M. McElroy, were jointly responsible. Others named by the Apex company in its suit were not mentioned in the verdict.

U. S. district court ruled that the damage verdict must be trebled under the Sherman Anti-trust Act.

The court held, and directed the jury to decide whether the CIO union authorized a 48-day sitdown strike, as it did the Memphis plant, and whether it, the union, did any things in violation of the law they were doing, with an intent to restrain.

The company originally claimed damages of \$1,712,231 and asked triple that amount.

When the CIO union said immediately the verdict would be appealed.



G-MAN TELLS OF LIQUOR-RACKET

Torrio, on Trial for Tax Evasion, Rated Boss Rum-Runner

NEW YORK, April 3 (UPI)—A British-born undercover agent for the United States government today pictured little Johnny Torrio, who is on trial for income taxation, as a powerful and subly influential boss rum-runner during the Prohibition era.

The witness, Thomas W. Murray, put Torrio high in the old coastal highway trade, as the course of plain speech, in stories and colorful array of his own experiences as an agent of espionage. As he related his incendiary pictures of past misdeeds, he was seen in a slightly amused expression.

Summed up he and he had been a man more popular for a period of time than Al Capone, who was then in prison.

He was asked if he had ever written a book about it; that this job was concurrent with his work for the government, he replied.

He remained in the liquor conspiracy "with the consent of the United States government"; that his subsequent trial was due to his "political participation" in the Prohibition era.

STOCKS FAIL TO HOLD NEW GAINS

Market's Early Upturns Cut Down or Replaced With Declines

Markets At A Glance

NEW YORK. April 4 (AP)—Stocks lower; profit selling strong rally. Bonds: Investors U.S. government bonds. Industrial stocks: Steady. **CHICAGO.** April 4 (AP)—Stocks: Lower; profit selling strong rally. Bonds: Moved up slightly. Cotton: Strong trade and local buy. **MILWAUKEE.** April 4 (AP)—Stock market, early gains falling, rising to 2 or more points were finally cut down or replaced with declines.

Prices were at the worst-in-the afternoon, but some support was evident for many leaders at the close.

The Associated Press average of 50 stocks was off 1 of a point at 45.7. Transfers—total 147,400 shares and 1,000 bonds had been sold.

With the latter speech, which came after the capitulation of the preceding session, less belligerent trading followed, with the market seemingly stronger than at the British-French entente in the matter of eastern European "agreements."
