# IDAHO LAUNCHES 1939 WEED WAR

### Campaign Director Assests \$1,220,000 Available For Campaign

BOISE, April 11 (AP)—Idaho's 1939 weed campaign is being launched today by Harry L. Spence of Boise, assistant director of the campaign, said tonight approximately \$1,220,000 would be available this year for the war.

He made the announcement after conferring with county weed supervisors from 21 of the 37 counties in which the campaign has been conducted for three years.

The program does not extend to Clark, Teton, Lemhi, Blaine, Adams, Valley, Blaine, and Shoshone counties.

**Larger Area.**  
During the past three years eradication activities, mainly by the county weed supervisors, have been carried on in 30,000 acres, said Spence, adding this year he plans to include a larger area with cultivating equipment, rather than chemical, because of the weather conditions most effective for conditions confronting us.

Spence said a special study of methods of cultivation and procedure and types of equipment, which will be bought by the counties.

"We expect to cover 20,000 to 25,000 additional acres this year," he said.

The federal program, through the works progress administration, will contribute approximately \$600,000, another \$300,000 will come from the counties and \$320,000 will be contributed by the state.

Spence said approximately 50 percent of the cost would be borne by government.

**Farmers Share.**  
"This will mean that the individual farmer's contribution will be about 10 percent of the cost last year," he explained.

Of the \$350,000 contributed by the counties in 1938, approximately \$300,000 came from individual farmers, he said.

The legislature authorized the counties to levy up to a mill for weed control.

It also authorized \$150,000 for use in 1939 on state lands.

"It is also objective for 1939 to coordinate the weed control activities of the various state and federal government units," said Spence.

He will be assisted by Paul L. Cabot of Boise, state weed supervisor, and the three district supervisors, C. H. Powell at Pocatello, E. M. Thomas at Coeur d'Alene, and F. M. Thomas at Boise.

The weed supervisors will meet here tomorrow with the advisory commission which is composed of W. W. Deal of Nampa, former state game warden; Harry Elcock of Twin Falls, state company executive; and G. A. Groat of Idaho, merchant; and C. H. Hine, Idaho director of the WPA.

## IDAHO FARMERS INSURING CROPS

### Federal Agency Accepts Applications for Spring Wheat Policies

BOISE, April 11 (AP)—John P. Mix, federal crop insurance supervisor for Idaho, said today spring wheat policies will be available here until April 29 to pay premiums.

He has received applications from 308 spring wheat growers in the state and expects a high percentage of them to take advantage of this protection against severe crop loss, Mix reported.

The average premium rate now being made by obtaining an advance on whatever agricultural conservation payments wheat growers have earned for all years in 1939.

The arrangement has been made effective this week, and will relieve the crop situation in counties which have had premiums will jump into large sums.

"Conservation" committees have instructions to make this plan available to applicants in their counties.

The average premium for the entire state, collected in actual wheat or in cash equivalent at the current both spring wheat growers, slightly above the established minimum of one-half bushel to the acre, Mix said.

"To date we have received 2,774 applications for crop insurance, from both spring wheat growers and winter wheat producers, last year."

Over 1,400 already have paid in premiums, protecting their crop from winter hail, and other natural hazards to the extent of 75 percent of their average yield per acre in recent years.

Mix announced that his office was ready to adjust losses on winter wheat policies which were in effect the federal crop insurance operation last fall.
