Registrar Lists Causes of Death

BOISE, April 20.—Local registrars were responsible for 128 of the 462 deaths recorded in Idaho during the past year, according to a report which shows that pneumonia ranked second in the case of death, claiming 42 lives; cancer took 48, cerebral hemorrhage, 23; heart's disease, 14; tuberculosis, 9; appendicitis, 5; silicosis, 4; and diabetes, 3.

There were 22 accidental deaths, seven of them in automobiles; three persons died of burns; there were eight suicides and one homicide.

Deaths totaled 117 for males and 145 for females; a five per cent increase over March 1938. There were 11 more deaths than in the same month of 1937.

Deaths reported from 115 families of about 30 per cent in the last 15 months.

Gold, as anyone will agree, is a pleasant commodity to have. But economists have been contending for some time if it is possible to have too much of it. Much has been said that there is a danger of it becoming increasingly valuable.

The case in point is the United States government. For years ago we had a little more than 100,000,000 ounces of gold. Today we have over doubled that amount—420,000,000 ounces. And the yellow metal is still coming into this country from abroad at an accelerating rate without a diminishing supply.

If this gold were melted down into a single ingot, it would be as imposing a spectacle as you might imagine. It would make a bar of gold the size of a football field, and it would have the incredible value—at our artificially established gold price of \$35 per ounce—of over \$15,000,000,000.

More important than the mere money value of our gold is the fact that it represents pretty close to 60 per cent of all the monetary gold in the world. Almost equally important, as the United States News points out, is the fact that the remaining forty-odd per cent is extremely badly divided. England, and France have the bulk of it. Germany, Italy and Japan have practically none—no more than four per cent of the total.

How is it flowing into this country for a variety of reasons. One is that under our law, the treasury must accept every ounce offered and pay \$35 for it in our currency, whether it can be used or not (and today, our gold is practically completely useless for all our requirements, figuring on the most conservative basis). Another, increasingly potent, reason is that European capital is frightened over the possibility of war, and wants to get its money out of Europe as fast as it can.

It is not only the gold that is coming in, but also the dollars. It is coming in at the rate of \$100,000,000 a week—and if that rate were maintained, it would mean that we would have every ounce of monetary gold in the world.

And that's what has the economists puzzled. It is, obviously, possible, especially in the case of war, that we may find ourselves with practically complete corner on gold, with no other country worth mentioning to be worth mentioning. And in that event, they would have to tie their monetary systems to some other standard of value. Already that is being done in the Fascist countries with their artificial and arbitrary standard. Germany, for example, has virtually announced to the world that it can and will get along without gold. And by the use of the barter system, "banded marks," etc., it has gotten along so well. Whether it is a good idea or not is without further impeding its more or less lottery economic structure—a matter of conjecture.

It is hardly a matter for conjecture, however, that if all the world were to find themselves without gold, gold together and decided to revise their money and trade to fit some other standard, it could eventually be done. And then we would find ourselves with about \$25,000,000,000 worth of gold which was useful for ornament, and far almost nothing else. But that, of course, is not an imminent possibility—France and England, which still are the great financial powers, have thrown good money after bad and has been the symbol of sound value and security to the human race for tens of centuries would likewise make its abandonment as an instrument of international trade and the minting of currencies, extremely difficult.

Some talk is going the rounds about the possibility that this government might use its 60 per cent of the world's gold for certainly court business. It is a very cautious, non-experimental attitude in the present condition, there's small danger of any significant inflation occurring soon.
