And we lost it, apparently, more willing to throw away our remaining resources on war and depression than are use them generally for the advance of human happiness.

MORE KNOWLEDGE, LESS SENSE

"Man now is first; but is he the last? Is he not too base?" So wrote Twain, the English philosopher, long ago. And the question is yet unanswered.

People probably have as good minds now as they ever had. And we have far more knowledge than any previous generation had.

But it seems as though the more power we acquire over natural forces and resources, the more we abuse 'em. The so-called civilized nations use their heightened power largely for destructive purposes, making the lot of mankind worse rather than better.

The result, of course not with science, but with man, who seems set for evil purposes rather than good. If he can't do that, today-to-rob-and-kill-other-men-were-made-to-help-them, this world might be a paradise.

This is such a plain truth that almost any individual can see it. But somehow nations as a whole don't seem able to see it and act on it. To the general community of nations or any international conference, such notions seem just so much rubbish.

Isn't it queer that nations in dealing with each other should be so much more stupid and perverse and hateful than are the individuals composing them?

EATING THE SURPLUS FOOD

The distribution-of-forth surplus to the needy through normal trade channels is expected to start within a month in Rochester, N. Y., first of six cities selected for the experiment. Arrangements have been worked out by the Federal Surplus Commodities corporation and representatives of state, county

and local welfare units and the wholesale and food trades.

"Two methods will be tested." Under one, WPA workers may request that an amount equal to \$1 or \$1.50 a week for each member the family be deducted from monthly wages of the corresponding amount, which may be used to buy any food. Blue stamps representing 50 per cent of the value of the orange stamps will be given free and must be used in exchange for foods designated as surplus. Thus the consumers will be expected to get and consume more food than usual without additional cost.

Under the other plan, any persons on general relief, or receiving old-age assistance, aid-to-dependents, children, the blind, and so on, may purchase weekly \$1.10-\$1.50 in orange stamps with which they may buy in blue stamps will be given free. The stamps will be used just as under the first plan.

The whole idea is to get the surplus food to the people who need it but who ordinarily can not buy it. It should help farmers and hungry city people alike. It should move the surplus foods without disrupting wholesale and retail operations. It is hoped that it will help all business.

Anyway, it looks like a better means of reducing food surpluses than that of destroying them.

TRIP PLEASANT FOR MRS. LUNDY

Salvation Army Cares for Patient; Arrives in Warm Springs.

Excellent care was accorded Mrs. Anna Lundy, 70, by the Salvation Army at the hospital here, who was a victim of infantile paralysis, during a "hyper" between trains at Chicago en route to the Warm Springs, Georgia, fountain, it was learned here last night.

Mrs. Lundy and her nurse, Miss Tracy Knappert, were met at the station by Adjutant Ernest Adams, Adjutant Amy Adams of the Chicago settlement, and A. Hergesler, Union Pacific railroad official.

The third time Mrs. Lundy was taken to the hospital, where she is confined to rest until train time.

Adjutant Adams, who spent a great deal of time with Mrs. Lundy, said that she was ready to resume her service to the patient.

Commissioner Ernest J. Pugnaire, Commissioner of the Idaho Army National Guard, was present to welcome the patient's arrival in order to prevent any slip up in ambulance arrangements, it was said.

Information on her arrival and treatment in Chicago came in a letter to Adjutant Elmer Ellis of Twin Falls, who was present to meet her from Lieutenant Colonel Julia Thiman.

In a telegram from Mrs. Knappert, Mrs. Lundy's nurse, it was learned that Mrs. Lundy had arrived in Warm Springs, with no mishaps or unpleasant incidents to mark the trip.

A complete rest will be given the patient before treatment starts, it was learned.

Idaho Milk Cows

Numbers Decline

HOUSE April 27—Idaho dairies counties had more milk cows on their farms April 1 than a year earlier but the state total was 2,000 less, according to the latest federal statistics, cut short by the war.

It listed the 1939 total as 102,000 compared with 104,000 in 1938 but the number of cows in the state of 103,700. High mark in the past decade and a half was recorded in 1934 when there were 214,000 cows, on which the state was then.

Canyon county retained its place at the head of the list with 21,000 cows, although the number was 900 less than the previous year.

A cow empty was second with 17,500, a decline of 1,000 cows from a year ago and Twin Falls county, with 13,800, was third.

Price of Sugar Trails in U. S.

NEW YORK April 27—The lowness of the retail price of sugar in the United States is contrasted with higher prices in other parts of the world, in this chart of the retail price of sugar in various countries, being distributed by Lamborn and Company.

The chart presents a display of retail prices of sugar in 42 countries, ranging from 30 cents to 100 cents of the world's consumption of sugar. In twenty-nine countries the price is lower than in the United States, which was 6.4 cents per pound, while in only 12 countries the price was lower.

Twenty-four countries have a retail price ranging from 8 cents to 15.7 cents a pound; for 7 countries the range was from 6 cents to 10 cents; and in 13 countries the range was between 2.5 cents and 5.4 cents.




