

# U.S. Puts Panama Canal in New Military Area

## Game Commissioners Name Harold Harvey Department Director

Former Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Secretary Succeeds Dr. A. B. Hatch; Bailey Sent to Jerome Farm

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, May 1.—Harold R. Harvey, 37, formerly secretary of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, assumed his duties today as acting director of the Idaho state fish and game department, succeeding Dr. A. B. Hatch of Moscow, a former professor of game management at the University of Idaho. The state fish and game commission voted three to two Sunday to make the change, announcing it was in the interests of better cooperation.

Tonight the commission announced that Verce Bailey, superintendent of the Lapwai game farm, also would be appointed as game farm director, succeeding Jolly D. Plante.

Homer Wolby, Bailey's assistant, will be named as secretary of the game farm, George E. Booth of Burley, chairman of the commission, said.

Fin Examinations The commission also met the day working on plans for civil service examinations of employees of the department.

L. B. Lyman, superintendent of the unemployment compensation division of the Idaho industrial accident board, and Dr. W. D. Vincent, Boise superintendent of school districts, were named to the commission because of the presence of "other duties," they said.

C. T. Edgeman of Boise has been designated as chairman. Dr. F. C. G. O'Connell and M. J. Bottelstein of Kellogg favored the nomination of Dr. Hatch when the vote was taken.

Booth, clerk N. Hawley of Melba and Dr. R. H. Howell of Hite, favored Dr. Hatch.

Both replied to Cole. Commenting on a recent statement by R. G. Cole of Boise, president of the commission, Dr. Cole, who changed that politics had entered into affairs of the commission, said:

"I am chairman of the commission and I want to see the people of Idaho as long as I have any connection with the commission. The act will be carried out and neither Cole or any other politician will interfere with the commission."

K. C. Barlow, Cassia County Senator, Directs Sharp Blasts at "Our Million-Dollar Attorney General"

(By The Associated Press) BURLEY, May 1.—Attorney General J. W. Taylor, a Democrat, "should resign before the election of the state fiscal," Senator K. C. Barlow (R-Cassia) asserted in a press statement released here tonight. "The legislature authorized the attorney general to back right and left in legislation, delivering an amazing series of opinions, some of which were already promulgated by the program of a man (C. A. Bottelstein, Republican governor) who had just been elected by the people who elected him to head Idaho's government."

"It is the fact that the attorney general has received himself, on several occasions, but the only one which he apparently was looking for," Barlow continued.

"The legislature appropriated for his office \$48,000, which was \$2,225 less than the regular appropriation for the 1937-38 biennium. Yet he has been receiving ever since the legislative session of 1937-38 an additional \$29,000, which he requested."

"The state pays him \$4,000 a year," Barlow said.

Barlow said he had written Taylor a letter last night and would expect to see him in the office as mayor of Twin Falls at the city hall meeting, which would have replaced Harry Benoit as city attorney.

"But the issue is not dead with Koehler. Until this is done I shall renew this motion at every meeting of this council while I am mayor," he declared.

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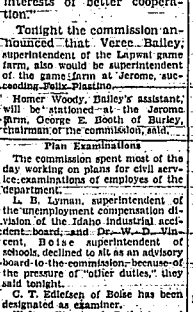
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HAROLD R. HARVEY... Former Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Secretary and Acting Director of the Idaho State Fish and Game Department.

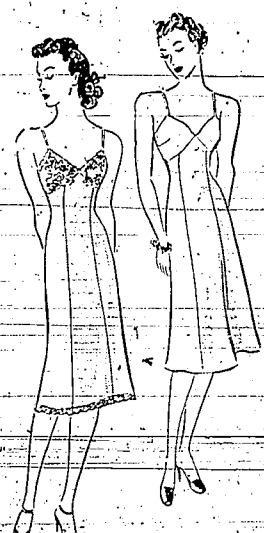
