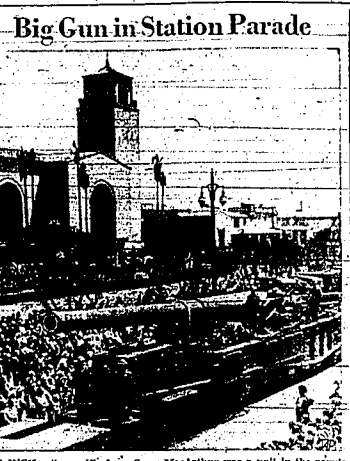

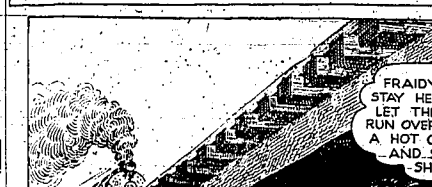

### PALACES RETURN TO FORMER KING

#### New Government Restores Seaside Properties to Alfonso

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A story that rivals those of competing chambers of commerce in the United States is recalled by the recent announcement from Spain that the new government would restore to former King Alfonso XIII his palace properties. The properties, not principally of the two palaces at Santander and at San Sebastian, and the island of Cortegada, off the Galician coast. All of these communities once competed actively for the royal favor.

In the early years of the 20th century, the royal family usually spent the summer at the famous resort of San Sebastian, near the French frontier, the Monte Carlo of Spain, says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society. The most magnificent and the most habitable resort, frequented by the grandees of Spain. There were two sets of bathing houses, the houses and motor cars, yacht rentals, tennis tournaments, golf matches, concerts and theatrical performances for the amusement of the aristocracy.

The royal family's palace at San Sebastian, the Palacio de Miramar, a "red brick" structure on a rocky promontory jutting out into the Bay of Biscay. It was designed by an English architect more than forty years ago, and was the favorite summer residence of the Queen Mother.

#### Restored for Royal Favor

"About a hundred miles west along the coast in Santander, is the island of Cortegada, which was owned by the king. When there was talk of erecting a palace on the island, the city council of Santander presented the king with the Palace of the Magistrate, named for the cathedral near Santander, from which the palace windows command unusual views. The large grounds include a polo field. This palace became the summer favorite of King Alfonso and his queen, while the Queen Mother chose to remain at San Sebastian, usually only following the king to Santander and other Spanish resorts from South America built his villas there, with a love of pomp and to the other resorts of San Sebastian.

The island of Cortegada, now to be restored to former King Alfonso is in the northern part of Cantabria, and at low tide is connected with the mainland by a reef of rock and sand. The island is only 3,500 feet long and half a mile wide, rising to a height of 25 feet. The village of Cortegada is on the south side at the foot of the high central crag.

Exiled from Throned

"Monarchs of Spain abdicated or were forced from their thrones on four occasions during the 19th century and once during the present century. Charles IV stepped aside in favor of his son, Ferdinand VII in 1808 during the Napoleonic wars. Ferdinand was imprisoned, however, by Napoleon's forces and Joseph Bonaparte was placed on the throne, to be forced off by the English under Wellington.

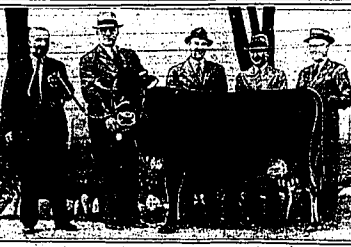
Isabella II, who succeeded her father Ferdinand VII, in 1833, was expelled from the throne in 1868, after a long reign with the Carlists. The next year the Cortes selected as king, Prince Amadeo of Savoy, an Italian, whose nominal reign lasted until 1871, when he resigned.

"For two years Spain had no king, after which Don Alfonso, the son of Queen Isabella, was enthroned as King Alfonso XIII in 1902. He was born six months after his father's death, and became king in 1902 and died from his throne and Spain in 1931."

CAPITAL TALKS EXTRA SESSION

Better Than 50-50 Chance Seen for New Call on Legislators

By WALTER R. BOTCHER, Boise, May 4 (AP)—One of the most interesting discussions here today is there or an extraordinary session of the legislature? Largely the answer lies with the courts.

But there is better than a 50-50 chance that there will be such a session on the basis of the most recent decisions during which the law breakers have been called to those sidewalks on short notice to consider cases.

Here's the record: There was one such case in the year 1912, 1922, 1923, 1931, 1932 and 1937 and two in 1935. There were none in the preceding 22 years, or the first half of Idaho's statehood.

They have come alike in Republican and Democratic administrations. The outcome in the courts on another important question—constitutionality of the 1939 legislative act diverting \$1,000,000 in gasoline taxes to the counties—will be one of the factors determining factors in the present legislation.

If the courts should decide it is unconstitutional, the legislature will be forced to amend it. There are other equally important legal questions that must have a bearing on a special session.

There are some Republicans in administration here who would welcome an extraordinary session.

They have what they believe is a pet cause—the wholesale gasoline companies' interest along the pipeline station operators and those to the public a one-tenth of a cent gasoline tax levied to raise \$500,000 for purchase of the Twin Falls-Jerome intercounty toll bridge.

Whether that could be done in a special session is something else, but any number of other emergency nature which are specified in the formal call signed by the governor can be considered.

There are some Republicans and some Democrats who believe that if the \$1,000,000 law should be declared unconstitutional some other measure—possibly the sales tax—would have to be amended to provide additional revenue.

That would come only if they could, only if they had time to do so. It would have to be a law of Idaho voted only two days ago to remove such a law from the statute books.

Anyway, talk of extraordinary sessions is a never-ending topic of interest in Boise, and a lot of other places in Idaho.

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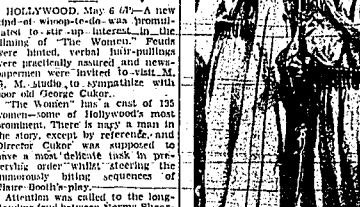

### RULING TO HIKE TAX COLLECTION

#### Idaho in Line for \$75,000 Levy on Federal Employees' Income

BOISE, May 6 (AP)—A ruling by Attorney General C. W. Taylor paved the way today for the collection by the Idaho state government of an estimated \$75,000 tax on federal employees' 1939 income.

Taylor held that new legislation was not required for Idaho to take advantage of a recent federal supreme court opinion but ruled that the tax could not be collected on income prior to 1939.

He based his ruling on a recent federal supreme court opinion which he said held in effect that "the federal government may tax any and all state officials and employees for income tax on salaries and that the states may likewise tax the salaries received by federal officers and employees resident within the state so taxing."

Russell Speelman, income tax bureau collector, estimated that the ruling would result in an approximately \$75,000 increase in Idaho tax revenues in 1939. Federal employees, however, must pay federal tax on their state salaries.

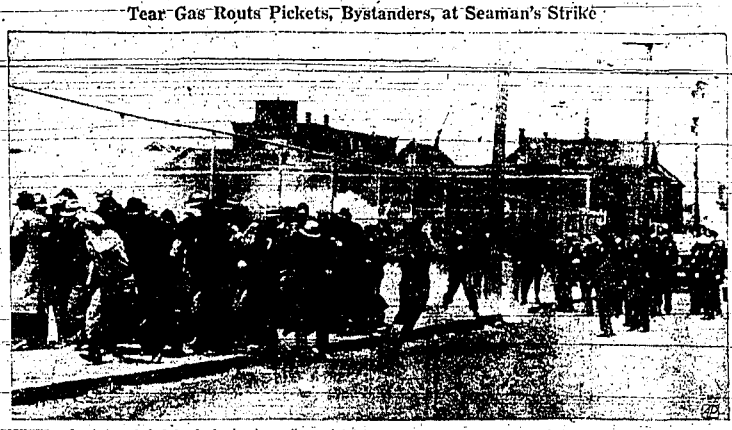
Taylor held that no limitation at this time upon the state of Idaho assessing and collecting income taxes from federal employees resident in this state derived from salaries paid to them by the federal government.

"The only limitation there has ever been in Idaho in the United States supreme court decisions holding that federal officers and employees are immune to state income taxes and hence under the wording of Idaho statutes these individuals were not subject to the provisions of the Idaho income tax law."

Taylor said he based his ruling that the tax could be retroactive on federal legislation passed at the present session of congress.

"If this policy is adopted by the state of Idaho," he said, "it will relieve all state officials and employees from paying federal income taxes based on their salaries retroactively for years past."

"I do not believe that where the law has been established over a period of many years and citizens have been lulled into the security of relying upon the law as established by the decisions of the supreme court of the United States, that they should be suddenly exposed to the hardship of paying taxes retroactively imposed upon them by a decision which with one stroke takes away the security thus long established."

### RESOURCES GAIN IN IDAHO BANKS

#### Finance Commissioner Sees State in 'Unusually' Sound Condition

BOISE, May 6 (AP)—Resources of Idaho's 22 national and 10 national banks increased \$2,342,212 in the nine months ending March 30, a condition that Finance Commissioner G. L. Jenkins said today indicated the state was in an "unusually sound financial condition."

He placed resources of the 32 state banks and their 16 branches at \$32,205,981, compared with \$29,863,769 on June 30, 1938.

Resources of the 10 national banks and their 16 branches raised from \$40,200,641 last June 30 to \$30,595,018 on March 30.

The number of national banks was one less than on June 30, Jenkins said, resulting from the purchase by the First Security bank at Joliet, of the Hailey National bank.

"Demand deposits of the state banks totaled \$21,163,496, an increase of \$640,821 in the nine-month period, and time deposits gained \$200,430 to \$13,896,005.

National banks had \$20,947,757 in demand deposits, an increase of \$991,224, but time deposits decreased \$1,922,234 to \$14,707,012.

### ENDOWMENT FUND SURPLUS MOUNTS

#### State Treasurer Reports 'No Place' for Nearly \$1,000,000

BOISE, May 6 (AP)—Nearly \$1,000,000 of uninvested endowment funds were held in Idaho's monthly treasury report today because, Finance Commissioner C. L. Jenkins said, there was "no place to put them."

State Treasurer Verlie P. Ekeblad, report showed uninvested endowment funds total \$929,942 on April 30 compared with \$654,744 a month earlier. The increase resulted principally from the maturing of obligations which had been held by the fund.

"Money goes into the endowment fund from the sale or lease of land, grant lands and other earnings of the endowment fund can be spent."

"There just aren't any desirable securities available and now for investment," said Jenkins, who returned today from a visit to Washington, D. C., where he conferred regarding operation of the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation.

"We can use it a little later for state financing, including the purchase of bonds and treasury notes authorized by the 1939 legislature." Funds may be invested in government securities and farm mortgages but the 1939 legislature adopted a resolution prohibiting a constitutional amendment which would prohibit farm mortgage loans in the future.

Investment holdings said the state would not approve real estate mortgage loans.

Mrs. Ekeblad reported that total assets of the state April 30 amounted to \$4,441,081 compared with \$2,992,723 a month earlier and \$2,770,129 on April 30, 1937.

The state's net debt was \$1,742,237 compared with \$1,161,672 a month earlier and \$1,946,839 two years ago. The general fund declined during April from \$79,310 to \$70,927.

### Soy Beans Record Year's Top Price

CHICAGO, May 6 (AP)—Soy beans are an increasingly important middle west farm product—today commanding a record price in a year-on-the-board of trade.

A consistent advance during the past week has revealed good export demand and a considerably short interest in the commodity.

Beans for May delivery closed yesterday at 95 1/2 cents a bushel, up 1 1/2 cent from the previous close and 10 cents higher than the price a week ago. The July contract was up 1 1/4 for the day at 82 1/2, and new crop October beans were up 1/4 at 82 1/2 cents. Cash premiums have followed the advance of futures and No. 2 yellow beans sold yesterday at 80 cents a bushel, best price in a year.

Miss Jane Douglas presented the special card to Mrs. H. G. North, sponsor of the Girls' League.

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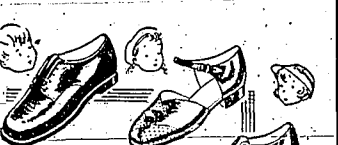
