MAJOR LEAGUE CLUBS COMPLETE BIG TRADE

Detroit Acquires Newsom From St. Louis Browns; Deal Involves 10 Players

Hurler Traded After Scoring Third Win Of Season

ST. LOUIS, May 13 (AP)—One of the biggest baseball trades of recent years, involving ten players, was completed here tonight between the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Browns.

The deal, announced by General Manager Jack Zeller of the Tigers, centered around Louis (Buck) Newsom, big right-hander St. Louis pitcher when the Browns play tonight for the first time. In addition to Newsom, Detroit also got Outfielder Roy Bell, infielder Heath Kress and Pitcher James Walkup.

In exchange the Tigers gave the Browns players: Pitchers Vernon Kennedy, Rosta Lawson, George Gill, and Bob Harris; Outfielder Clayton Kopp; and Infielder Mark Christman.

The trade was not unexpected, the Detroit management having openly admitted it was after Newsom when the team went into a tailspin that saw it slip from the top of the bottom of the American league standing. Zeller commended the Tigers on their trip to St. Louis and had been conferring with President Donald B. Barnes and General Manager William O. Dewitt of the Browns for two days.

At Detroit Center Wladimir O. Bragh of the Tigers disclosed that one of the major deals in the trade was the acquisition of Newsom with a number of major league clubs.

Newsom, 31, who has seen service with 20 teams and led off for St. Louis last season. He finished the Tigers 5 to 3 today for his third victory of the current campaign.

Kress, 32, and Walkup, 26, also are veterans. Kress has been in and out of the majors during the past decade, Bell, who is 30, batted spectacularly with the Browns in 1936 and 1937 but fell to a .265 average last season.

W. L. Brann's Bay-Colt Jumps Ahead on Sloppy Track to Rout Favorite; Gilded Knight Second

PIMLICO RACE COURSE, Baltimore, Md., May 13 (AP)—The mud-and-a-great-mud-runner caught up with Johnston today.

W. L. Brann's bay colt, Challedon, a mudder from 'way back, came on in the last three eighths of a mile on the track soaked by day-long rain to win the 40th running of the rich Freshness stakes, as William Woodward's top-heavy favorite, the

horse that had taken the Kentucky derby by six lengths only a week ago, ran fifth in the field of six.

For three quarters of a mile in this-mile and three sixteenths gallop, it was all Johnston. The big son of Janotown looked like a shoe-in.

But as they went into the stretch, the real "mud" started to close in. Jockey Jimmy Stout went to the bat for the first time since Johnston came of age, but it did no good.

First Gilded Knight passed him, then there was a rush, as all but little Challedon went by.

Heading into the stretch, Challedon poked himself in from behind and there he stayed. Jockey George Stribb, part of the 125 pounds on all the colts in this race, put the whip to him to save off-the-finishing.

Challedon has allowed one and a fourth runs per game and routing two runs. However, they must share the spotlight with Cleveland's Bob Feller, first major league to win five games. He has lost one decision. Feller also leads in strikeouts with 18 and has worked the most innings.

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Mel Mazzera and Mates Top League

Four St. Louis Brownsies Now Among League's First 10 Batters

CHICAGO, May 13 (AP)—Mel Mazzera, sophomore outfielder of the hard-hitting St. Louis Browns, supplanted Chicago's Joe Kuhel, first baseman last week as the leading batsman of the American league.

The 35-year-old gardener had gotten 10 hits in 40 times at bat through Thursday's games for a .475 average. Three other St. Louis regulars are among the circuit's first 10 batters.

Report Thompson, outfielder recently acquired from the White Sox, is batting .444. George McQuinn, 421 and Myrl Hoag, 376.

Ray Weatherly, Cleveland, is in second place with .467. Others in the first ten are Kuhel, now side with a .445 average, Alvin Dark, Boston, last year's hitting champion, .411, Bill Dickey, New York, .400, Jimmy Waddell, Washington, .396, and Lee White, Philadelphia, .370.

The Browns also top the league in team batting with a handsome 307, 20 points above the slugger in double plays with 21, one more than Washington.

Foxx replaced Hank Greenberg of Detroit as home run leader, the pail-weak with five. Hank has four along with Trammie Charley, Detroit, Ted Williams, Boston, and George Selkirk, New York.

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Medwick Paces National Hitters

Slugging St. Louis Star's Steady Swatting Boosts Percentage to .394

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—There's a familiar figure setting the pace for the National League hitters today — Joe Medwick of the St. Louis Cardinals.

The quiet slugging star, who led the senior circuit in batting in 1938 and 1937 and has topped all other runs batted in for the last three years, now has a mark of .394 based on 28 hits in 71 times at bat.

His steady swatting during the last week, in which he collected seven blows in six games, boosted his percentage while earlier leaders began slipping to lower levels.

Ranked behind Medwick in the bracket of ten top hitters are Morris Aronoff, Philadelphia, .387; McCormick, Cincinnati, .377; Lonnie Frey, Cincinnati, .364; Buddy Hatter, Boston, .358; and Ed Delaney, Philadelphia, .354; Debs Garms, Boston, .352; Zeke Bonura, New York, .350; and Billy Meyer, Cincinnati, .340. Myers topped the list at .330.

The batting of Medwick and Johnny Mize, his slugging teammate, was largely responsible for the Cardinals climbing into first place during the past week. Mize hit two long triples yesterday to give his team a 5-1 win and share with Loup Cimino of the Brooklyn Dodgers in the home circuit.

Other hitting honors in the league are well distributed. Ira Goodman and Alvin Dark of the Red Sox are in the Armory of the Phillies are first for batting in the most runs, 20, while Aronoff also has the most hits, 10, with McCormick's 23 placing him second.

Other players cash from different club have hit seven doubles while the four-trifles of Chicago's Billy Hornum and only one more than five other players have accumulated.

Mel Ott of the Giants has scored 15 runs, one more than the total of Garms and Bonura.

Pitchers have been getting cutted around. Finally, rookie Wladimir Yast of the Brooklyn Dodgers along has a record of three victories with one defeat and only one loss. The Cubs has won two without losing.

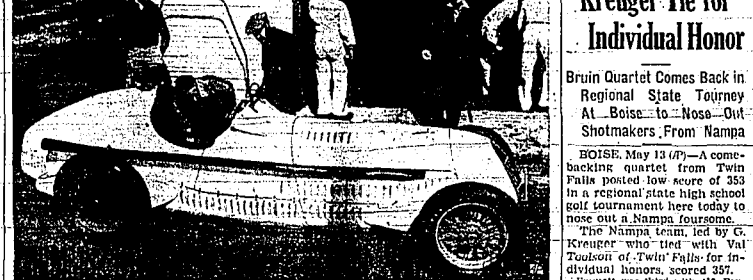

ATTORNEY RAPS SALE OF STAMPS

Idaho's Legal Chief Rules Against Claim of Postal Department

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Attorney General J. W. Taylor ruled today that state departments were under no obligation to accept federal postage on inter-office communications or material transmitted from one state department to another.

He advised John W. Condit, state superintendent of public instruction, who requested the opinion, not to heed demands by federal post officials who he said had requested that all state communications be transmitted through the postoffice.

The ruling was contained in one of several opinions handed down today. Others provided:

1. That 1922 legislation requiring wholesalers of beer to obtain certificates of approval from the state is not a law enforcement measure, but a regulation, and therefore does not include all wholesalers without discrimination.

2. A justice of the peace may not prepare legal forms for compensation but may fill in blanks in instruments which have been legally prepared.

3. A 1935 law which provides that a court may suspend a registration certificate for a truck owner's violation of weight limitation prescribed in the act does not affect a 1937 law which provided that foreign lands were to be held subject to judgment in certain instances.

4. Property of a public utility should be considered an operating property and that such utility should be a county if it was intended for that use and the probability was that it would be used "at a time not too remote."

5. Creameries and cream buying associations are not subject to the Idaho statutes, less for buterfat delivered in small quantities than for those delivered in large quantities.

6. The state department of agriculture may not furnish, at state expense, brand inspection certificates to inspectors employed by county commissioners.

7. State departments or bureaus cannot contract for and pay for advertising unless authorized by statute.

English Audiences Loyal to Favorites, Actress Declares

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—From the lanes of Shakespearean comedy that Louise Brown, the actress whom America was wont to call "very own," has become a British subject by naturalization.

IDAHO QUOTA FOR BEETS INCREASED

AAA Spokesman Explains Allowance Given for Production

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Idaho's 1939 sugar beet acreage allotment will exceed that of any previous year, largely as a result of the state's large production last season.

Such an allotment gives Idaho full benefit for her large production last year and tends to even up the allotment restrictions on Idaho sugar with those of such areas as Colorado, whose acreage showed a reduction last year.

He said Idaho's acreage allotment would be "above the 71,000-acre figure in 1938."

National acreage allotment for the 1939 crop is 1,000,000 acres, he said, or compared with 800,000 acres planted in 1938 and 850,000 harvested.

He said those figures "prove that the United States sugar beet industry is not being curtailed by the 1939 sugar program changes he said were made after marketing allotments to sugar companies first were announced."

Turner asserted the federal government's sugar beet program "completely has given the producer a higher percentage of the sugar beet return than the records show he has received in years when there was no program."

He said growers received 55, 52 and 56 per cent of the returns in 1934, 1935 and 1937, when federal programs were in effect and 48 and 49 per cent in non-program years of 1932, 1933 and 1936.

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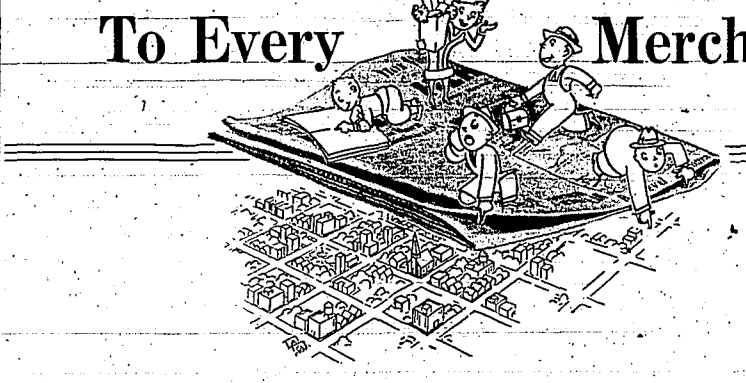

FENCE REPULSES CRICKET INVASION

Fin and Wood Structure Effective Protection Against Posts

SUNDANCE, May 13.—The mile-long tin and wood fence with which Sundance residents have fought the onslaught of millions of Mormon crickets for two summers is being prepared to repulse what may turn into an even more severe attack this year.

Additional fencing material has been purchased and will be used in other sections of the county where infestations become heavy. The fence has been found to be the most satisfactory way of fighting the pests. The first barrier was made of eight-inch boards stood on edge. Nailed to the boards were strips of tin four inches wide and curving outward.

The crickets, marching in seemingly endless battalions, are unable to climb over the slippery tin and

fall back into ditches dug close to the fence. As fast as these pits fill with crickets, oil is poured over the posts and the insects die.

Farmers in many sections of Crook county fear the hatch of crickets will surpass that in other years.

The work of spreading poison over eye-batching areas has been delayed until additional dust guns can be obtained.

Ranchers and farmers in the county are divided in their opinions regarding the efficiency of poison. Some contend the method is the most effective, but others claim that the only way to the destruction of these "pests" and ever live stock.

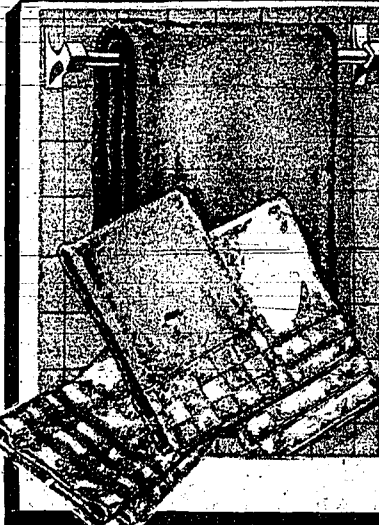
