Conversations between the British, French and Russian foreign ministers at Geneva next week were expected to bring the powers nearer an agreement. Russia's answer was to a British suggestion that she promise to fight... if asked for... if independence is menaced, and provided that Britain and France went to their aid.

State Employment Service Announces Merit System Examinations

MOSCOW, May 15.—The Idaho state employment service, a division of the state department of public employment, offers opportunities for a career under a merit system in public employment. The present personnel of this service holds positions resulting from merit examinations conducted in 1933 and 1937.

Open competitive examinations are being announced to establish new eligible lists for the positions of field supervisor and manager in public employment. The positions of senior and junior interviewers in the operating offices throughout the state.

The state employment service is the placement division of the Idaho industrial accident board. Payment of benefits to unemployed workers coming under the act started September, 1928, and was made through the Idaho state employment service offices located in different cities of the state. The board's activities of the service will result in a future expansion of the state employment service, and will include, in addition, as well as present vacancies, will be filled from the new eligible lists.

The examinations are open to men and women who have been recipients in the state for six months and who meet the minimum requirements and qualifications announced for the positions.

Minimum requirements in terms of experience and education vary in accordance with the responsibilities and duties of the position. A general requirement, however, that the candidates have had appropriate experience in the employment problems and practices.

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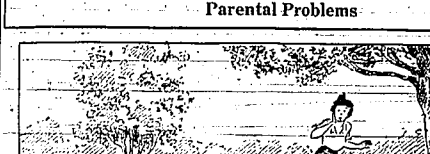
