

FARMER KILLS FUGITIVE MAN, WOUNDS SELF

Rodney Allen, Son of Once Prominent Idaho Family, Shot Through Heart; Rancher Attempts Suicide

(By The Associated Press) EMMETT, Idaho, May 26.—Rodney Allen, 23 Emmett millworker and distant relative of America's sheep king, Andy Little, was shot to death on a ranch near here tonight.

Sheriff Boise Riggs, Jr., of Coeur d'Alene county, said the 22-caliber rifle shot that passed through Allen's heart was fired by Robert O'Neill, 65, a farmer who attempted to commit suicide when officers came to arrest him.

O'Neill was placed under arrest and brought to the Mary Secor hospital here for treatment of his self-inflicted bullet wound in his chest.

O'Neill is a son of Mrs. Ed Emmett, widow of one of Emmett's once most prominent residents.

His father and an associate 20 years ago constructed the first road between Idaho City and the mining town, and Lewman.

Besides his mother, Allen is survived by a sister, Mrs. Walter Little, who is a sister-in-law of Andy Little, the sheep king, and next door, here, by another sister, Mrs. Wesley Wickham of Montana.

Allen was shot in the house at 11 o'clock.

"Preliminary investigation disclosed that O'Neill walked to the house at 11 o'clock, took his rifle and fired several shots at the two men were climbing into their truck."

"One of the bullets struck Allen in the back and passed through his lungs."

SENATE GROUP WOULD REPEAL BONDING LIMIT

Treasury Wins Committee Approval for Measure to Grant More Leeway in Big Borrowing Operations

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 26.—A bill giving the treasury more leeway in its big borrowing operations was approved by the senate finance committee today.

After hearing Secretary Morgenthau explain the measure, the committee voted unanimously to recommend the repeal of the maximum limitation of \$300,000,000 which presently restricts the amount of government bonds which may be outstanding at any time.

The bill, which already has passed the house, would leave undisturbed the present limit of \$1,000,000,000 for the elimination of this limit might be expected at the next session of congress.

Present Limit As the committee member explained, the \$300,000,000 more than it now allows without exceeding the limit set for the total of five years.

Throughout a period of several months in which there were numerous borrowings, the treasury has had to be careful of the tax schedules, Morgenthau has consistently refused to do so.

AUTOMOBILES OF FUTURE PICTURED

Motor Cars to Be More Like Homes Than Vehicles, Engineers Told.

NEW YORK, May 26.—(AP)—Automobiles of the future, as visualized by a motor expert, will appear more like homes than vehicles—with movable chairs, sun-bath roofs, conditioning beds and washstands.

Edwin L. Allen of the Standard Products company told the World Automotive Engineering congress: "In the not-too-far distant future, we will walk up to our car, push a button and the door will open, the seats will be light movable chairs and the floor will be wide and flat."

"A portion of the roof will be made of a curved translucent material which will admit the health-giving rays of the sun, at the same time removing the glare. A series of buttons will regulate the temperature and humidity to any desired condition of air."

"Pressing of another button will unfold a concealed bed from 'out of the partition between the passenger and engine compartments. Many little passenger conveniences will be installed, such as toilets and lavatory facilities."

Allen said the driver also would be able to carry on a two-way conversation with home or office. Movable controls, he said, would make it possible to drive the car from any seat.

"Part of this will be done," he added, "without increasing the width or height of the car at all and the length only slightly."

He didn't say how much the cars would cost or how soon they will be on the assembly line.

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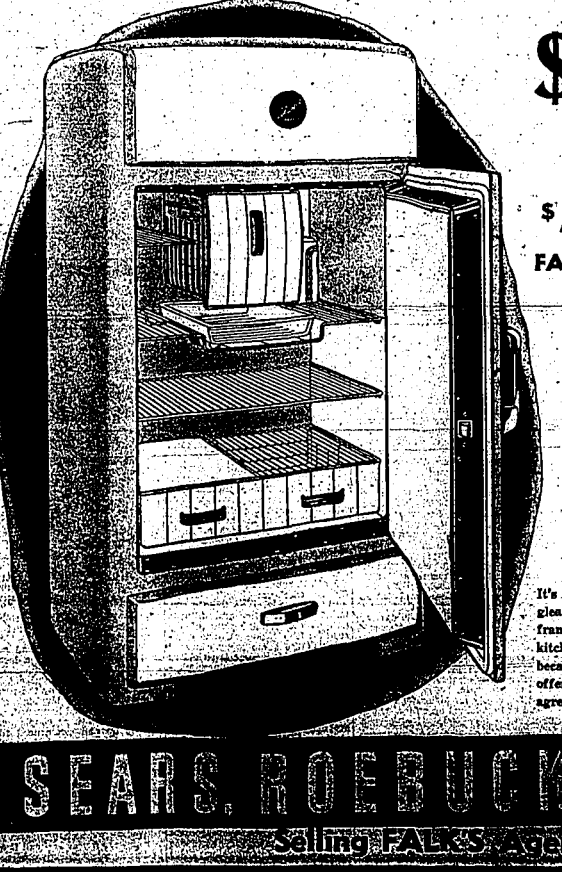

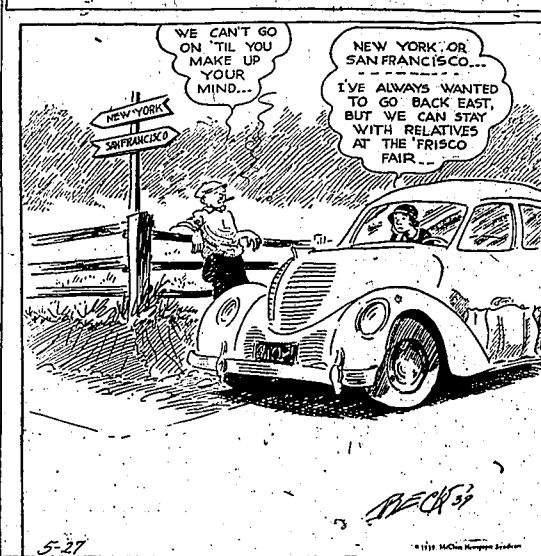

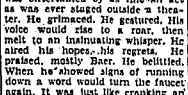

DISASTER TOPIC FOR RED CROSS

Organization Assumes Full Financial Control in Crisis

American Red Cross assumes financial control in supplying and disbursing funds during disasters and does not use federal, state or municipal money because of "red tape" and complications involved, L. Schaefer, San Francisco, Red Cross manager in the Pacific area, declared in Twin Falls yesterday.

Mr. Schaefer was principal speaker during morning, luncheon and afternoon sessions of the Red Cross disaster preparatory institute here at the Park hotel yesterday.

His noon luncheon address covered the place, plan, procedure and principles of the American Red Cross in disasters.

Importance of organized committees to answer questions that pour into stricken areas inquiring about the welfare of relatives was stressed by Mrs. Edith M. McCallister also of San Francisco. She is executive director and case work supervisor for the Pacific branch.

The importance of case work or on the scene of a disaster cannot be measured, Mrs. McCallister stated. It is the most important contact with the people in the stricken area.

"The most reassuring victims that the Red Cross can provide them and even supply furniture, if necessary, for rehabilitation."

The Red Cross tries to help victims of disaster to help themselves," she said.

Disaster preparedness institutes, such as held in Twin Falls yesterday, are designed to train members of Red Cross chapters throughout the nation in organization should disaster befall a community.

"After preliminary work, intensive training by the staff in time of emergency is less difficult," Mrs. McCallister said.

In the absence of Mrs. A. J. Peavey, Twin Falls chapter president, Mrs. D. L. Alexander, vice-chairman presided.

Attending the sessions was Forrest Stewart, Idaho field representative.

Mrs. H. M. Glouchek, national committeewoman from Idaho for the Republican party, was also a guest.

Regarding the financing of disaster contingencies, Mr. Schaefer pointed out that national headquarters has a fund of \$5,000,000 available to any chapter at any time. All army equipment is likewise available, but only through the recommendation of the Red Cross in its obtainable.
