NEW AERONAUTICS DIRECTOR NAMED

One Time Instructor of Lindbergh Chosen for State Post

BOISE, June 1 (AP)—Pete Hill of Caldwell, a war-time flying instructor for the United States army and a former instructor of Charles A. Lindbergh, became Idaho state aeronautics director today.

Appointed by Governor C. A. Bottelmann, he succeeds H. M. Bryan of Gooding, who was named director two years ago by then Governor Thurston H. C. Deway.

Hill is to fly at Dewey, Okla., in 1941.

He went into the United States army as a civilian instructor in 1917 and was at Dallas, Texas, in that capacity 19 months.

In 1921 Hill went to Lincoln, Neb., to serve as general manager of the Lincoln Standard. He later returned to Idaho and while there taught the famous trans-Atlantic aviator to fly.

TOURIST TRAVEL GAINS FORECAST

Golden Gate Exposition Expected to Turn Tide Toward Idaho

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1 (AP)—Idaho highway tourist travel will be boosted this year as a result of the Golden Gate exposition, Earl P. Bush, manager of the Idaho exhibit at the fair, predicted today.

He said U. S. highways number 10, 25 and 30 particularly are likely to be used to great effect.

"The eastern visitors at the exposition usually drive to San Francisco by the southern route with the thought in mind of returning via the northwest," he said.

"Idaho being located in the northwest will have many tourists during the exposition season."

He said fair visitors should not try to see the exposition too hurriedly, but the object of an exhibit, he commented, is to have attractions which will hold the visitors in town long enough to become interested in the tourist attractions, recreational facilities, and possibly permanent residence.

China Beats Off Japan's Warships

FOOCHOW, June 1 (AP)—A force of Japanese naval vessels withdrew toward the sea yesterday after a 24-hour artillery duel with Chinese coastal batteries at the mouth of the Miu river.

The Japanese were attempting to run the gauntlet to approach Foochow.

The warships made an earlier attack without success Tuesday and then returned with reinforcements, seeking to break further attempts to enter the river. Chinese "threw streams and clouds the mouth of the port."

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IDAHO STAND ON QUARANTINE TOLD

State Plant Industry Director Urges Uniform Legislation

BOISE, June 1 (AP)—Paul Howell, state director of plant industry, advocated today that quarantine laws that would be uniform among states, and which "won't build up barriers," be passed by the legislature.

He said he would present Idaho at a western plant quarantine conference at Berkeley, Calif., June 5 and 6.

"All Idaho wants," he said, "is to have the reasonable protection it should have. We don't want to prevent anything from coming in that we mustn't ship out but we want to protect our crops from disease threats."

"Some states have such barriers that we need as revenue producers."

U. S. Aids Japan, Assembly Charges

CLEVELAND, June 1 (AP)—The United States is a "partner with Japan" in the Sino-Japanese conflict, the 15th general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. asserted at its final session.

Protesting against "contribution of this partnership in action," the assembly adopted a resolution urging immediate legislation by congress to prevent sale of munitions and war materials to Japan.

The assembly of 225 commissioners dissolving in secret at Rochester, N. Y., May 23, 1940, voted "no action" on proposals to petition President Roosevelt to forbid "military demonstrations" during the visit of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth II in the United States, and to protest to Prime Minister Chamberlain the proposed creation of an Arab state in Palestine.

President Okels Idaho Projects

Tough Ex-Collegian Wins Title Shot by Stopping Max in 11 Brutal Rounds

Lou Scores Technical Kayo After Bloody Struggle

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, June 1 (AP)—Stubborn as an army mule and just as tough to handle, Lou Nova shook off Max Baer's "Sunday punches" tonight and beat the former heavyweight king in a bloody submission in 11 brutal rounds in this huge ball park.

His face dripping blood, his mouth and nose oozed, Baer, the madcap playboy who has floundered his way through the "chickens for a decade" came to the end of the trail with a technical knockout defeat at 1:30 of the 11th hour. Referee Frank Fullam halted the proceedings with the announcement that Max's cut mouth appeared to be closing him.

And Nova, shaken up in the early rounds, once so confused from Max's right hand punches that he walked to the wrong corner at the end of one round, successfully rechecked the victory in a shot at the heavyweight championship in September.

Takes Her's Best Punches

But it wasn't so much the fact that the victory shot him to the forefront of the heavyweight ranks that was most impressive, but that he eliminated the mere madman from the picture definitely and conclusively. Most of his gamblers in coming on from those fearful "Sunday" shots for which Max is famous, taking them and walking right in with both feet, fulling and empty, and determined that nothing, not even the awful Bar artillery, could stop him.

A dispossessing crowd of 16,738 cash customers, predominantly in favor of the 24-year-old Nova, turned out in cash, closely watching for the bout. The gross take of \$23,394, fell far short of promoter Mike Jacobs' \$100,000 hopes.

Lou, the Alameda, Calif., ex-collegian who has come a long way up the road in the past two years, largely through his defeat of Tommy Farr last winter, sprang the early-united lucky from 167 pounds to 207 pounds—he weighed 202 to Max's 207—and even that didn't stand in his way.

Nova Forces Fighting

He wanted in from start to finish, unconnected with the fight, left and a short right chop cut his face, and, even when hurt, continued to force the fight. At the finish, his left ear swollen from Baer's right hand smashes, his right hand injured, and his right eye cut, Nova was still coming on and pitching his punches.
