RESCUED AS  
PLANE SINKS**

Student, "Bound for Mars," Falls Into Water on Georges Banks; Returns to Boston on Fish Boat

(By The Associated Press)  
NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., June 6.—After a short flight his intended destination—the Planet Mars—Chester L. Eshelman, 22, Carlisle, Pa., student flier, who was fished from the water on Georges Banks, was bound for Boston tonight on the trawler Villanova, with about 10,000 pounds of cod and haddock.

Capitan Astor Bjarntzen, the trawler's Icelandic skipper, rescued the distressed flier, and the young man was rescued as his rented plane sank after he was forced down near the Villanova, approximately 175 miles east southwest of Boston at 7:30 a. m. today. The young man was uninjured, but his plane sank but under treatment for shock and exhaustion.

At Night in Fog  
In another radiogram to F. J. O'Hara and Sons, operators of the Villanova, Capitan Bjarntzen said Eshelman refused to divulge his true destination—"repeats bound for Mars." He reported that "few birds all night in fog" and that vibration caused a break in the engine which pumped the fuel from pumping reserve gasoline to the main tank.

Supporting the expressed belief that Eshelman was attempting a trans-Atlantic flight, it was learned that after taking off from Nantuxet, N. J., he had an engine failure and was forced to land. Eshelman, who was wearing a life preserver, was rescued by a fish boat.

Cuban Government Refuses for Second Time To Give Asylum to 907 German 'Jews Aboard Liner'

MIAMI, Fla., June 6.—The German liner St. Louis informed tropical radio at 11:40 o'clock tonight that she had set her course for Europe, bearing back to Germany the 907 Jewish refugees who fled that country for Cuba and were denied entry.

Their hopes of landing in the new world dashed by the Cuban government's refusal for the second time to grant them asylum, the passengers tonight were bound back up the Florida coast from a point approximately 100 miles north of Havana.

The big ship had wandered up and down the coast since Friday awaiting the outcome of negotiations by welfare agencies with President Roosevelt's office for permission for its downcast passengers to land.

The government said it would consider no further attempt to obtain entry temporarily landing permits for the refugees and inform the steamship companies that no more Jewish refugees would be admitted to Cuba.

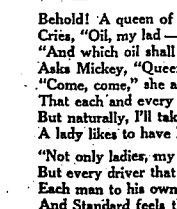

### WOMEN'S BIRD WALK SUGGESTS NEW PARK

Birds, and lots of them, took two Twin Falls women on a walk last Sunday from the heart of Twin Falls to Mary Alice park. They declined to bare their names, published in connection with the story of their experience. Entering through a skylight, the burglars had taken \$200 in merchandise, \$1207 in checks and \$39 in cash. First report of the burglary revealed.

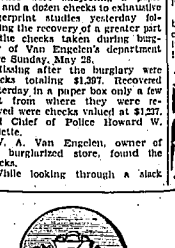

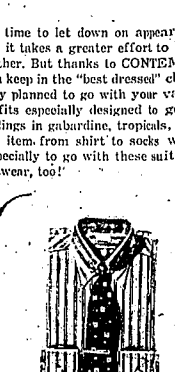
