### BENEFITS SHOWN IN HOME LOANS

#### Federal Agency Reports Majority Well on Way to Ownership

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—Nearly 300 original loans made by the Home Owners' Loan corporation in Idaho have been fully paid, according to a report from the Federal Reserve bank here.

The corporation is observing its first anniversary this week.

"With more than \$2,000,000 of their principal indebtedness repaid, a great majority of the borrowers of the HOLC in Idaho are on their way to debt-free ownership of their homes," said William.

The present situation presents a striking contrast with the situation only a few years ago. The average HOLC borrower, when refinanced, was two years in arrears on both principal and interest and between two and three years on taxes.

The outstanding debt of the HOLC was able to allow his enabled thousands of sincere home owners to enable themselves.

The HOLC's lending period ended in June, 1936, and the average loan has more than 11 years to run, said William, adding:

"Notwithstanding this fact 2463 per cent of the original loans advanced by the corporation in the state have been repaid.

"Of the relatively small percentage of homes which the corporation has been forced to acquire, more than half have been sold to other people on the same easy payment plan afforded the original borrowers.

"Nationally the figures are equally satisfactory.

"The HOLC went to the aid of more than a million distressed home owners, but utterly without private credit. Nearly 45 per cent of those borrowers now own their homes or are well on the way to complete ownership. More than 100,000, or 19 per cent, of the principal indebtedness has been repaid and nearly 50,000 of the original loans have been fully liquidated."

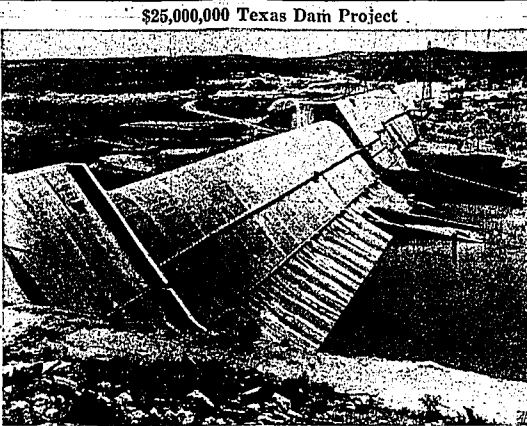

### KING, QUEEN NEAR CLOSE OF VISIT

#### Britain's Rulers Express Hope to Return to Canada

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., June 14 (AP)—King George and Queen Elizabeth, who neared the end of their Canadian tour with a four-hour visit to Prince Edward Island today, expressed the hope they would be able to come to Canada again "at some future time," accompanied by their two daughters.

The daughters, 12-year-old Princess Elizabeth and 8-year-old Princess Margaret Rose, were left at home for this trip, which was their longest separation from their parents.

The hope of another visit to Canada was expressed in the king's address replying to Prime Minister T. A. Campbell, in these words:

"We have much enjoyed our visit to your beautiful province whose capital has been proud distinction of being known as the 'cradle of confederation.' We share your hope that at some future time we may be able, accompanied by our daughters, to visit you again."

Tonight the royal couple sailed for Picton, Nova Scotia, and tomorrow at 2 p. m. M.T. they will for home from Halifax aboard the liner Empress of Britain, concluding the tour of Canada and parts of the United States begun at Quebec on May 17.

Afternoon 2:00-3:00: Discussion and explanation of morning's work, pupils, reading, library work, opportunity for participation by teachers in fine and industrial arts workshop, study of individual classroom problems, theory of child improvement.

The demonstration group of children will be composed of 9-11 year olds in and around Gooding. Parents who wish to enroll children to take part in the morning's work may do so by communicating with Superintendent M. W. Tate. A fee of \$1.00 will be made to defray the expenses of library books and art materials, and not more than 25 children will be admitted.

The demonstration teacher will be Miss Josie Hulley, graduate from Texas university and Columbia Teacher's college, now elementary supervisor at Downswate, Michigan.

Mrs. Minnie D. Benn, state elementary supervisor, will aid in organization. It is expected that at least twenty will take part.

### TORTURER FACES GRUESOME DEATH

#### Spanish Military Prosecutor Demands Execution by Strangulation

BARCELONA, June 14 (AP)—A Yugoslav architect, 12 times sentenced to death by Spanish republicans, faced possible execution by strangulation today by nationalistic forces who charged he built and decorated world cells in which prisoners were tortured to blindness and insanity.

The military prosecutor concluded the trial by asserting the court will hold sentence pending approval from Gurgos, General Franco's capital.

The prosecutor declared it had been conclusively proved Cif directed the construction of little odd-shaped concrete cells four feet high and "decorated" them with diagonal yellow lines and black and white cubes in such a way that the figures changed shape before the stares of prisoners dazed by light-powered rays from multicolored lamps.

"Never in all the history of Spain has there ever been such refined devices of the most horrible torture," declared Col. Jose Magria, chief of the nationalist secret service, who estimated that at least 2,000 had been held in such cells in a few months before Barcelona was captured.

The prisoners were stripped of their clothing and flogged, and steel rings were placed in their eyes to keep them open, nationalistic papers said.

Others told of raised cement blocks placed in cell floors so the prisoners could not walk about, and combat chairs and beds built at a slant so the prisoners could not sit or lie down with comfort.

There was one cell built like a drum, it was declared, so that prisoners' steps echoed as they were forced to walk in circles for hours.

In an impassioned 90-minute plea for his life, Cif declared, "I am innocent. I ask only justice."

"I had no participation whatsoever in the construction of the torture cells," he told the tribunal.

#### Modern, Fireproof County Building Nearing Completion at Jerome

JEROME, June 14.—The Jerome court house is nearing completion. A two-story building with a full basement, about 80 by 40, it was designed by Sundberg and Sundberg, architects of Idaho Falls and one of the finest modern buildings in the state. The foundation to the height of the first floor is constructed of footed concrete and the other two stories are finished with a vitrified brown capacity brick and are trimmed with cream colored terra cotta.

The building is very solidly constructed of reinforced concrete. It is finished with a full basement and a full second floor. The interior of the structure is arranged according to the most modern methods with the architectural and color schemes situated on the basement. The counters, desks and shelving room in the various offices are constructed of enameled steel.

The brick work of the building is nearly completed, the roof being put on this week. The lathing and plastering is going forward at a rapid pace so that the contractor, Paul R. Kartze, hopes to have the building ready for acceptance by the board of county commissioners by August 10, 1939.

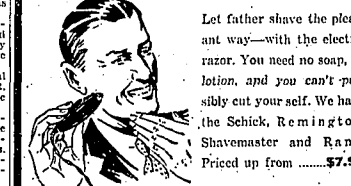

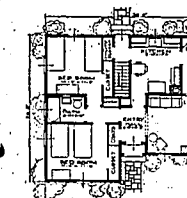

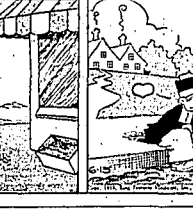

# CROPS REPORTED FAIR TO GOOD

### Showers General Over State Except in Lower Snake River Valley

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—A federal expert, H. G. Carter of Boise, asserted today the Idaho crops "generally made rather slow advance and continued in fair to good condition" during the week that ended yesterday.

Carter, U. S. department of agriculture weather bureau meteorologist, said the week was generally cool, with frosts in many of the higher elevations.

Temperatures ranged from 23 degrees at Hill City in Cass county to 92 at Kama in Ada county. Good showers generally occurred over much of the panhandle and over the eastern and southwestern parts of Idaho, but over much of the Snake river valley in the southwest and south precipitation was less than a quarter inch. Only a trace or none was recorded elsewhere.

Winter wheat is generally good, while spring grains are fair to good; some fields of winter wheat, spring wheat, and barley are heading.

Carter added: "Early potatoes are fair to good, light frost damage being reported locally."

Some late planted fields of potatoes are germinating poorly. "The first crop of alfalfa is being cut and stocked, with occasional small damage reported."

Pastures and ranges show improvement where rains occurred, but in some areas in the south are still dry and short.

"Truck crops and beans are mostly in satisfactory condition."

"Cherry harvest is active, with but little or no rain damage reported."

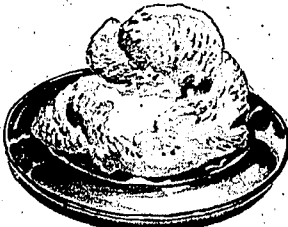
