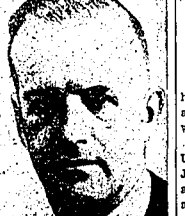

JAPANESE AGGRESSION: The Japanese government is getting ugly. It starts kicking around its old allies, Britain, France and the United States, and virtually tells them to get out of China.

It is easy to understand why Tokyo imperialism is acting as it is. It is a democracy. The Japs want to shove us all out and grab and keep China for themselves. They would exploit it under shadow-governments directed by them, or frankly annex it.

It makes a troublesome problem for Uncle Sam. We want to save China, and the Orient has no interest in what we do. It is determined not to go over to them. Japan is increasingly rash and insolent. Sooner or later we may have to "put up or shut up."

Another speaker urged, as an improvement on the present bicameral system of our state legislature, that the "lower house" should represent vocational or occupational groups of the state.

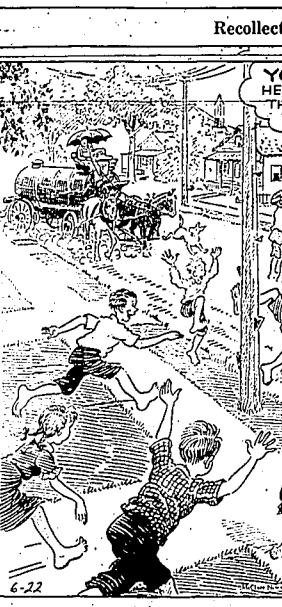

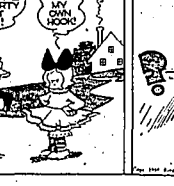

Paralysis Ends Playing Career Of 'Iron Horse'

Veteran Retires to Executive Position With Yankees
By WHITNEY MARTIN
NEW YORK, June 21 (AP)—The 'Iron Horse' was consigned to the baseball roundhouse today to stay. Infantile paralysis, slowly undermining the marvelous physique which had carried Lou Gehrig through 210 consecutive games as New York Yankee first baseman, had paved a dramatic ending to his playing career.



ONE of baseball's greatest ballplayers ended dramatically yesterday with the announcement that Lou Gehrig was suffering from infantile paralysis. Told that his playing days were over, the Yankee veteran said "if this is my finish, I'll take it."

Today Ed Barrow, Yankees president, after conferring with Dr. George A. Mayhew, a physician, a statement which marked a term of service as a Mayo physician, a statement which marked the end of baseball's most brilliant career. "Mr. Gehrig will be unable to continue his active participation in baseball play inasmuch as it is advisable that he conserve his muscular energy," the statement read in part.

He declared the 36-year-old Gehrig was suffering from amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, a type of illness involving the motor pathways and cells of the central nervous system and known in lay terms as chronic poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis). Afflicted for two years, Barrow added that he believed Gehrig had been afflicted for about three years, but he hesitated to notify everyone that the disease was checked, Gehrig himself said he would start treatment immediately under the direction of his personal physician.

Barrow said Gehrig would remain on the payroll under his present contract for the balance of the season at least. The doctor's statement said that Lou could continue to play one game this season.

He led the American League batting in 1924 with an average of .340. He scored 100 runs and drove in 130 runs in 134 games for 13 years, and shares with Babe Ruth the record for driving in more than 100 runs a year over a 13-year span, leading the American League.

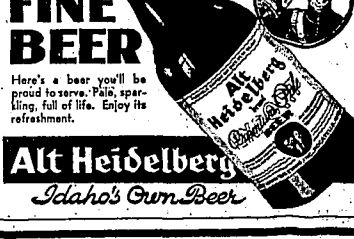
