U.S., Britain Double Forces at Chinese Port

Roosevelt Urges \$3,860,000,000 Loans Program

President Would Aid Business Through Self-Liquidating Projects, Low-Cost Housing

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Congress received from President Roosevelt today the administration's newest plan for stimulating employment, a seven-year, \$3,860,000,000 lending program for projects designated as self-liquidating, and \$800,000,000 more for the low-cost housing program.

In addition, Mr. Roosevelt told reporters he was considering a reduction in the interest on FHA-insured mortgages in an effort to induce more private residential construction.

The program was set out in a letter to chairman Byrnes (D-S) of the senate unemployment committee in which the president called for a "permanent policy" of federal financing of self-liquidating projects. Copies of the letter went also to senate and house leaders.

His reaction on Capitol Hill was mixed, ranging from fervid endorsement by administration supporters to forthright opposition by some Republicans and Democrats who have urged reduced spending.

Some who were inclined to look with favor on the proposed loan program were doubtful about a suggestion for \$500,000,000 of loans to foreign governments to finance purchases in this country.

Mr. Roosevelt stressed that the proposals for loans for self-liquidating projects would not cost the treasury a cent and that money repaid could be re-loaned to supply continuing stimulation to business. If it were needed.

Borrowed from public funds, which would be financed by money borrowed from the public without adding to the treasury's debt, the loan or direct debt, the president recommended.

At least \$200,000,000 of loans in two years for the new Federal Public Works Agency, Mr. Roosevelt said, would be authorized by July 1.

MAN HELD IN BURLEY JAIL FOR MURDER

Cassia Officer Reports Confession by Hitch-Hiker; New Jersey Authorities Plan Further Investigation

BURLEY, June 22.—After 14 days, a murder case at light, Deputy Sheriff George Bray of Cassia county said here today, announcing that Charles W. Quigley, 30, had confessed to the slaying of his mother in Mount Holly, New Jersey, in 1925.

Although Quigley was arrested Wednesday night after first confessing to a state policeman at the port of entry at Hamlet, Idaho, on U. S. Highway 20, Deputy Bray did not divulge the information until late tonight, when New Jersey officers verified a 1925 death by fire in which Quigley admitted guilt.

He told that he was taken to the Mount Holly police station where he was held for further investigation and informed Deputy Sheriff George Bray of the confession.

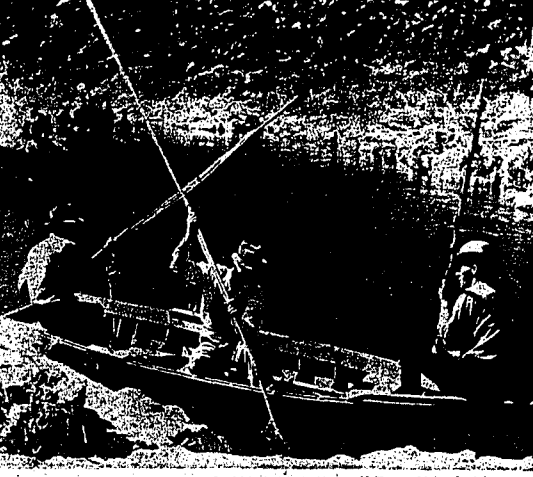
Quigley told a tale of filling a kerosene can with gasoline, hoping that an explosion would occur and burn his step-father to death as the attempted. Inside the room fire in his two-story Mount Holly home, Mrs. Mary Quigley died.

But Tuesday morning his mother arose to build the fire and was asleep in bed in an explosion and fire that destroyed the dwelling, "I had to tell."

"It was born on my conscience all these years and I had to tell someone," he told Dr. Barlow, the Twin Falls police officer who is in attendance to whom he first confessed. Quigley, said Deputy Bray, admitted the death in the case of Quigley and Polson parents in California for automobile theft.

"I don't know why one I was released from jail," he said. "I've been hitch-hiking across the country. Quigley is light complexioned and was comparatively well dressed at the time of arrest."

River Surrenders Body of Missing Hansen Schoolboy

43-Hour Search in Canyon Ends When Brother Lifts 16-Year-Old Daniel Wood From Water

Forty-three hours after he fell into the swirling rapids of Snake river at Twin Falls the body of Daniel Dale Wood, 16-year-old Hansen youth, was found by his brother, Duane, in six feet of water.

The body was found at 1 p. m. One and one-half hours later it was lifted by windsurfers from the bottom of Snake river canyon to the floor of Hansen bridge.

The youth disappeared about 6 p. m. Tuesday, while attempting to return across the Snake to join companions camping on an island.

Who recovered, the pants legs were rolled up and Sheriff Art C. Parker theorized that the youth was attempting to wade the channel, now shallow, and stepped into one of the many potholes eroded in the bed of the stream.

A hundred volunteer searchers lined the banks of the stream and one crew of three men probed the channels with grappling hooks from a bowhead.

Sheriff's officials said the youth had evidently attempted to ford the river at a narrow waist, but decided lined the timbers on the 300-foot canyon walls near the hunt scene.

Deane Wood, 18, was wading in water up to his neck, when he felt the body with his foot. His hands dove and made the recovery.

Deane Wood was born August 6, 1922, at Hansen, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Wood. The family came to Hansen from Berkeley, Ark.

Surviving besides his parents, are two brothers, Carl, 20, and Duane, 18, both students at the Twin Falls high school.

Battleships Bring Reply To Warning

American Destroyers Pillsbury and Pope at Swatow, Gunboat Asheville Sails from Hongkong

SHANGHAI, June 22.—The United States and Great Britain doubled their naval forces today in the Japanese-occupied south China port of Swatow in the face of a belated warning to the vessels and nationals of both to leave a zone of possible hostilities.

The United States destroyer Pillsbury, which stood by in the inner harbor yesterday to meet 43 Americans in Swatow, was joined by the destroyer Pope and the coastal gunboat Asheville will leave Hongkong tomorrow for the port.

Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, commander-in-chief of the United States Asiatic fleet, summarily rejected the warning which foreign officials said was not received yesterday until two days after the Japanese announced the fall of Swatow and cessation of hostilities.

From Senator Bridges (R-Ind.) came the observation that the president is currently moving in the wrong direction. The new Hampshire Republican said that the program "looks like as though he's laying the way for announcing his candidacy for a third term. Some Democrats however, quickly opposed the lending program. "I'd be opposed at all times to voting for any permanent lending program," Senator (D-Utah) said. "We don't know what the future holds." Similarly Senator Bailey (D-N.C.) chairman of the senate commerce committee, said "public borrowing and spending can never be a substitute for the normal annual principal payment of from \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000 annually." Senator Reed (R-Kan) said he had "no confidence in the financial judgment of Franklin D. Roosevelt."

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SCHOOLS STUDY TRANSPORTATION

Safety Stressed in New Appeal to Idaho Superintendents

BOISE, June 22 (AP)—To Idaho's city and county school superintendents went an appeal this week for cooperation in a drive to make more safe the transportation facilities for the state's public school students.

Included was a review of a conference here at which approximately 30 educators and city leaders went on record favoring legislation that would empower the state department of education to law enforcement to make and enforce "reasonable regulations governing specifications of buses and qualifications of drivers."

But, until such legislation is enacted state agencies must proceed upon a campaign of education. Boards have power. "Individual school boards have the power now to put such regulations into effect," observed C. E. Roberts, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, who acted as secretary of the conference and prepared the appeal.

"Our problem," he added, "is to acquaint them with the need in such fashion that they will see it for themselves and adopt the regulations for their own buses and drivers."

State Superintendent of Public Instruction John W. Condit and Law Enforcement Commissioner Harry M. Ragner joined in calling the conference.

Condit said approximately 19,000 youngsters ride to school daily in buses, many of which were in poor condition. If the regulations were in effect.

The conference recommended the appointment of a committee which would set up proposed regulations, and then available to city school boards for adoption.

The meeting was the third conducted in Idaho since that week's conference was called to call a new campaign.

"I feel we are making definite progress," Roberts said. "We had good representation at our meeting last week, including school people from several of the districts which are the biggest users of school buses."

"We are attempting now to point out educational program toward the eventual adoption of legislation carrying out our desires."

"We hope in the meantime that school boards will follow the suggested specifications in the purchase of new buses."

Roberts said approximately 85 new buses were purchased early last year in Idaho. During the past year approximately 425 were operated.

The proposed regulations would set up minimum mechanical specifications for the buses and require drivers to submit to examination as to their qualifications.

JAPAN'S LEADERS FACE PROBLEMS

Arm Chiefs Having Variety of Trouble in Inner Mongolia

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22 (AP)—Japan's army leaders have run into aggravating problems in their attempted economic exploitation of Inner Mongolia, Norman D. Hanwell asserted in a report to the Institute of Pacific Relations.

"Problems range from deprivations of gasoline to disappointments in quality of products, and on beyond that," Hanwell reported, to splits among the Japanese army leaders.

Hanwell is a research associate for the Institute. His findings are reported in the Institute's current Far Eastern survey.

"The Japanese, he said, are having particular trouble with transportation. The Chinese evinced most of the railroads rolling stock ahead of the Japanese advance, and as the Japanese brought locomotives and cars from Manchoukuo and abroad, guerrillas went to work.

The charter of the local lodge here was transferred to Boise when this community lost its population after the gold rush boom days of the 1860s but the Masonic hall and cemetery here still are preserved.

The ceremonies will be held in the two-story, white frame structure in which the grand lodge was organized a half-century ago.



VALUE OF PRISON SHOE QUESTIONED

Idaho Attorney General Suggests Other Task for Convicts

BOISE, June 22 (AP)—Benefits derived from manufacture by convicts at the Idaho penitentiary of commodities used in other state institutions "would seem to be rather doubtful," Attorney General J. W. Taylor commented today.

He made his observations in a legal opinion for John W. Condit, state superintendent of public instruction, who is in charge of vocational training classes at the state prison which provide instruction in the manufacture of shoes.

Taylor did not deny the fact that it would be hard to make shoes sale to other institutions, recalling that the 1937 legislature authorized the board of prison commissioners to sell shoes and any other goods or wares that the prisoners might manufacture to other state institutions.

"It would seem that it would be of more benefit to the state as a whole," he added, "that the convicts be employed in labor that would not prove competitive in manufacture and sale of goods especially in times such as these."

"Any sound measure to this end," Mr. Roosevelt added, "will receive my unqualified support."

NEED ASSEITED OF COMPTROLLER

Idaho Governor Expresses Disappointment Over Decision

BOISE, June 22 (AP)—Governor C. A. Botelton asserted in a press statement last night that passage of the 1939 comptroller law was "a political measure, but a fulfillment of campaign pledges to take additional steps to improve government."

This is a complete ignorance of the history of the matter."

"The governor reviewed the history of various bureaus shifted from the auditor to the comptroller and vice versa through executive order and otherwise over a period of many years."

Playground Safety Stressed In Governor's Proclamation

BOISE, June 22 (AP)—Governor C. A. Botelton proclaimed the week of June 25 to July as "playground safety week" in Idaho today and urged the state's residents to cooperate in this worthy endeavor. "This matter of playground safety," the governor said, "is of vital importance to all of us and for the future of our state and the promotion of safety measures and education is a highly important work, not only for children but for adults as well."

A program of playground instruction to impress upon the child the need for safety was worked out by the recreation division of the state Parks and Game Commission. "Public recreation programs are now operated in 40 Idaho communities and are offering instruction and supervision in physical activity, social recreation, arts and crafts, drama and music," said Willis M. Smith, former University of Idaho football star who is state recreation director.

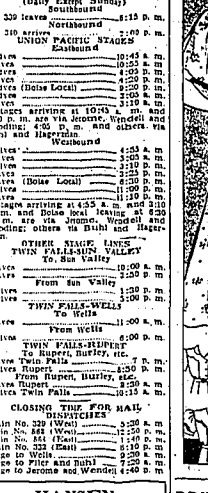
