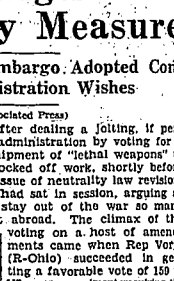

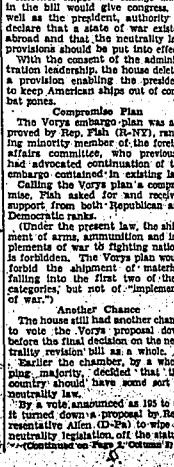

Many of the CCC youths are enrolled in correspondence courses sponsored by the state department of education. They may work toward graduation requirements of grade and high schools.

RELIEF LEADERS STUDY POLICIES

Idaho Public Welfare Commission in Two-day Huddle

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—Idaho's public welfare commission went into a two-day huddle over policies of the state department of public welfare today.

The press was excluded, but Emory Afton, director of the department, said he hoped to formulate a statement on accomplishments of the board some time next week.

The session is expected to conclude Saturday noon.

"We are discussing experiences of the board and department in relation to existing policies with a view to the elimination and expansion of them," said Afton.

He said a merit system for employees of the department would be discussed probably tomorrow.

Worst Drought in Centuries Savant's Prediction for 1966

PALO ALTO, Calif., June 29 (AP)—A prediction that the greatest drought in 17 centuries would come 27 years hence, and a suggestion that a "chemical evolution" theory might solve one of life's mysteries—the structure of protein—today highlighted meetings of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"The drought prediction was made by Hershert P. Gillette, geologist and meteorology researcher, who reported he had found evidence in the rocks that there was a 170-year rainfall cycle having sub-cycles of 507 and 189 years.

He said the year 1966 would be the bottom of all three cycles and should produce a drought comparable to the only other major occurrence of its kind in written history, in the year 263 A. D., "about which the Roman Empire began to crumble and when wars in China were chronic."

Gillette's prediction was based on a study of varves, which are layers of sediment deposited in seas or lakes by the annual runoff of streams. He said some of the varve computations went back to 2300 B. C. and could be followed for "millions of years."

"The maximum rainfall periods of the 17-century cycle were "notable," he said, "for their association with great periods of prosperity," particularly the Cretan Palace age about 2500 B. C., the second pyramid age; the Golden Age of Greece and the rise of Rome between 553 and 506 B. C., and also in 1115 A. D., which was about the time of the Viking age, the Norman conquest of England, the Crusades and the invasions of Ghengis Khan.

SLAYER SUSPECT BELIEVED DEAD

Suicide or Double Killing Suggested in Hollywood Hammer Murder

HOLLYWOOD, June 29 (AP)—Police tonight voiced a "strong possibility" that Campbell McDonald, 35, sought since that Sunday night in connection with the hammer slaying of his mother, Mrs. Margaret Campbell, 58-year-old former actress, is dead.

Capt. D. R. Patton, head of the police homicide squad, said McDonald's long absence is an indication that he has taken his own life or

also fell victim to his mother's slayer.

"The son had little money when he was last seen, Patton said, and had few friends in Los Angeles with whom he could be staying."

"Nevertheless we are still working 24 hours a day to locate him," Capt. Patton said. "Dead or alive, we feel that McDonald must be located before the murder of Mrs. Campbell can be solved."

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—During the 11 months preceding June 1 adjustments involving \$2,500,000 in farm debts in Idaho were made by the State Farm Debt Adjustment committee, T. J. Lloyd of Twin Falls, Idaho supervisor, said today.

The amount was \$2,000 more than for the 11 months ending June 1, 1938.

Lloyd said 217 individual farmers and 405 farmers in group organizations were benefited by the negotiations, adding:

"The committee is emphasizing a policy of no partition between the debtor and creditors and we are attempting to operate on the principle that the debtor must pay to the fullest extent of his ability; we are not encouraging debt repudiation."

AERIAL TRAVELERS LAND AT LISBON

All the passengers held the top as without incident. Whitney brought the United States minister, H. G. Pell unveiled a provisional plaque commemorating the flight, and the Touring club of Portugal presented a silver trophy and blue ribbon symbols of Pan American's supremacy on the Atlantic.

The clipper is to take off for Marseille at 8 a. m. tomorrow.

L.S.U. SCANDAL SCOPE SPREADS

Prosecutor Hints at Accomplices of Hunted University President

BATON ROUGE, La., June 29 (AP)—Louisiana state university's million-dollar scandal soon may involve several persons as accomplices of the school's fugitive former president, Attorney General David Ellison hinted Thursday today.

While the police of two nations hunted tall, bald Dr. James Monroe Smith, and a special grand jury in Louisiana slowly in the tangle disclosed by his flight, Ellison said:

"Every time we examine a witness new names are brought in for us to sum up."

It was indicated police already were standing by with a warrant for at least one of Smith's former associates who has been questioned by the jurors seeking to learn how the educator's \$100,000 advance, borrowed \$500,000 from three banks, and university funds and lost it in disastrous speculation.

While the grand jury went into a recess that will last until after the July 4 holiday, the university's board of supervisors met to examine school records which Governor Earl Long today said had been given more thoroughly "doctored" than was first supposed.

U. S. Attorney General Frank Murphy announced in Washington Smith's income tax record was under examination and dozens of rumors on the educators, whereabouts were received while FBI men stood by ready to enter the case here when ordered.

Latest, and apparently one of the most serious, reported of reports on the fugitive was from Detroit, where police were inclined to believe Smith and his wife fled into Canada Tuesday afternoon in a newly purchased car.

SOCIALISM SEEN AS LOANS' GOAL

Republican National Chairman Scores New Deal Lending Program

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—John Hamilton, chairman of the Republican national committee, accused the Roosevelt administration tonight of intending to feed the nation into state socialism through its newly proposed lending program.

President Roosevelt's idea, of huge government loans as part of a permanent policy, Hamilton said in an address prepared for radio delivery (CBS), was "conceived in deceit and brought forward with cunning."

Hamilton contended that such a permanent program of loans even in an address prepared for radio delivery would bring government ownership of virtually all production. To support this argument, he quoted from the testimony before the monopoly investigating committee of an administration aide, Assistant Secretary of State A. B. E.

"...if the government undertakes to create wealth by using its own credit at the rate of four billions or so a year, and if its work is well done, the government will be acquiring productive mechanisms at the rate of four billions worth a year or thereabouts," Hamilton quoted Berle. "Over a period of years, the government will gradually come to own most of the productive plants in the United States."

"There," Hamilton commented, "you have an honest analysis of this new deal plan by an outstanding and influential new dealer."

The leading program, Hamilton asserted, was "the vilest thing that has ever attempted to put over."

"Stripped of all its sugar-coating and plausible sophistry," he said, "it stands revealed as an unconscionable attempt to buy the 1940 election by securing our American heritage of individual initiative and free enterprise, our historic system of free economy, for an alien state capitalism which, of course, is what is meant by national socialism."

In Russia, Germany "Remember it was national socialism which brought ruin to Russia and Hitlerism to the Reich. If national socialism is all that the new deal has to offer the nation as a solution to the problems of stagnant business and 11,000,000 jobs, at least let the new deal leadership have the courage to come out frankly and say so."

JAPANESE SPOT CHINESE LEADER

Wang Ching-Wel, Ex-Premier, Slated President of New Government

SHANGHAI, June 29 (AP)—Wang Ching-Wel, ex-premier of China, was reliably reported today to have returned to Shanghai after visits to Japan and Peking for consultation on Japanese plans to make him president of a Japanese-directed "Federal government of China."

Reports from Japan through usually reliable channels add Wang, whose arrest as a traitor has been ordered by the Chinese government in Chungking for alleged long talks at an unnamed mountain resort in Japan with Prince Fumihiko Konoze, president of Japan's privy council and former premier.

Japanese leaders for some time have been seeking a Chinese of big reputation to head a government which would absorb the present puppet regimes at Peking and Nanjing and local organs in other cities and govern under Japanese direction Chinese territory conquered by the Japanese army.

According to Japanese estimates, that would include all of seven provinces and large parts of five others with a total area of about 400,000 square miles and a population of 170,000,000—roughly two-fifths of all China.

"The plan calls for Japan to make peace with the federal government," sections of a new official government of China and seek thereafter to keep it aligned with the "new order in East Asia" Japan has declared she would establish.

Many Japanese leaders believe Wang, who was one of the most famous of the Chinese Republic, still has sufficient influence to gather many influential Chinese into a government friendly to Japan.

Legislator Takes Newspaper Post
BOISE, June 29 (AP)—The youngest legislator in Idaho's 1939 legislature, Representative Kenneth Allen (D-Idaho), has relinquished his title to take the newspaper post at the seat of News in Salt Lake City.

His successor has not been named. Governor C. A. Bottelofen, the 27-year-old son of March 1932.

He was elected to the House of Representatives last fall while publishing the *Malley Times*.

He moved from Idaho to Pocatello after the legislature adjourned, and recently went to Salt Lake City.

He was born at McOannan, Idaho, in 1912.

THREAT CHARGED TO PROSECUTOR

Evangelist Says He Confessed in Morals Case to Protect Wife

LOS ANGELES, June 29 (AP)—Sauntchly denying any wrongdoing, Evangelist Joe Jeffers testified today the only reason he promised to plead guilty to immoral conduct charges was to protect his wife from prosecution.

Jeffers spent the day on the witness stand in superior court as state and defense attorneys peppered him with questions regarding the night he and his wife, Zella, were arrested during an alleged bedroom exhibition in the Jefferson apartment building.

Jeffers, relating he was taken before District Attorney Byron Pitts one day after the arrest, testified: "Pitts told me his investigators had been listening to my lectures and that I was preaching a gospel of hate against the Jews and Catholics. I told him, I am preaching against the Communist Jews who are trying to get a war with America."

Then Pitts said he would bring a charge against my wife accusing her of attempting to kill one of his men. So to save my wife, I said I would plead guilty.

The state, in its case, charged that Mrs. Jeffers threatened one of the raiding detectives with a gun. The trial will be resumed tomorrow.

BLUES SINGER'S LOVE REVEALED

Ruth Etting's Deposition Tells of Quick Moving Romance

LOS ANGELES, June 29 (AP)—Blues singer Ruth Etting declared in a deposition filed in court today that Meryl Alderman, her former pianist and present husband, never expressed or showed any marked affection for her prior to last July.

The deposition was offered in the trial of a \$150,000 allegation of affection suit brought against her by Alderman's former wife, Alma Alderman. Alma and the pianist were divorced in December, 1937.

"I was the first time you learned Mr. Alderman loved you," Miss Etting was asked.

"One day about the latter part of July in 1938, he told me he was in love with me and wanted me to marry him," she replied.

"It was not until the end of October, 1938, that I accepted his proposal. We agreed that we would be married as soon as his divorce was final."

Asked if she had given Alderman any presents, Miss Etting replied: "Sometimes during the summer of 1938 I gave him a small set of dishes, valued at about \$8. I gave him nothing else at any time."

She and Alderman were married at Las Vegas, Nev., last December.

She declared Alderman's associations with Dorothy Lamour, screen-writing motion picture actress, were strictly of a professional nature. She declared Alderman's association with George L. Roberts, a former club tender in a Hollywood night club, testified yesterday he saw Alderman kiss Miss Lamour several times in his bed during the summer of 1937.

In New York today Miss Lamour branded Roberts' testimony as "not only fantastic, but untrue."

IDAHO SHARES IN WHEAT INCREASE

Farmers Permitted to Boost Acreage 10.5 Per Cent Next Year

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—Idaho farmers will be permitted to increase their 1940 wheat acreage 10.5 per cent over this year's plantings, Millford J. Vaughn, chairman of the state agricultural adjustment administration committee, announced today.

The 1940 allotment was set at 692,000 acres compared with the 1939 allotment of 625,442 acres.

"The increase is Idaho's share of a 7,000,000-acre increase in the national allotment, set at 63,000,000 acres for 1940," Vaughn said.

"We have received the state allotment nearly two months in advance of last year. This fact will help Idaho farmers plan their operations better to take advantage of all phases of the farm program."

He said county allotments had been set tentatively and would be reviewed and established definitely within a short time. County conservation committees then will begin the task of calculating allotments for individual farms.
