### FEW ARRESTED AT WORLD FAIR

Only Five Misdemeanors Reported in World of Tomorrow

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)—The world of tomorrow, take it from the police and hospital authorities, is a peaceful sort of place where nothing much ever happens in the way of crime, and illness is practically unknown.

Although 13,000,000 persons have passed through the World Fair gates since the April opening, only five have been arrested and only 37 have required hospital treatment.

The arrests, said Chief Inspector Richard Sheridan of the fair police, were all for misdemeanors, such as those of the unshowered gentleman who stripped and went swimming in the fountain pool and of the flight flyer who clambered up the parachute-jumping tower after closing hours of access, and had to be helped down.

None of the arrests has been for drunkenness, however, and if there are any, we intend to sober 'em up," remarked the chief.

### ONCE LINDBERGH COACH NOW IDAHO'S AIR CHIEF

BOISE, Idaho, July 6 (AP)—To the Col. Charles Lindbergh's first flying instructors has fallen the task of moulding Idaho's aeronautical future.

Known nationally as the "father of aviation in Kansas," he is W. H. (Pete) Hill, Idaho's new director of aeronautics, and former manager of the Traveler Transportation company of Wichita, Kan.

He taught Lindbergh the rudiments of flying at a civilian aviation training school at Lincoln, Neb., in 1917 and 1918.

Without a Crash Hill, born at Nolia Station, Ky., Aug. 12, 1890, took up flying at the age of a century ago, accumulating ratings—without a crash—more than 1,000 hours in the air as a test pilot, navigator, stunt-flier, and commercial pilot.

The 25 years brought him many honors in the aviation world, and saw his only son, Harold Hill, of Wichita, now 29 years of age, set two national junkie air records for speed and altitude.

When Hill became manager of Traveler, a Kansas City, Mo., newspaper editor wrote:

"A dozen years ago Pete Hill was just an automobile mechanic. But now he is a mighty good one, and he had a vision of the time when airplanes would be as common as auto-

mobiles. Pete laughed at Pete and said the plane was but a fad. . . . But Pete Hill just smiled his quiet smile and went on working and dreaming. Today Pete Hill is a high official of the Traveler company of Wichita, and one of the foremost men in aviation. . . ."

He learned to fly at Dewey, Okla., in 1914, but 11 years after the Wrights made the first successful flight with a heavier-than-air plane.

Long Years' Climb During the long years' climb to success, Mrs. Hill, who, before 1910, was Miss Eva Preater of Buffalo, Ind., furnished much of the inspiration, even helping Pete to repair his planes in the earlier days.

A mass of yellowing newspaper and magazine clippings and pictures, she has faithfully recorded.

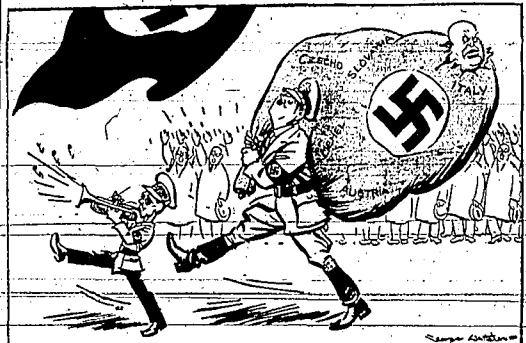
