Blazing Guns TAKE LIFE OF HARLAN MINER Officer Seriously Wounded, Four Others Felled In Kentucky Battle; Governor Sends Additional Troops

(By The Associated Press) HARLAN, Ky., July 12—Blazing guns of pickets and national guardsmen killed a miner, seriously wounded a militia officer and felled four others today in the most serious of recent outbreaks of strife in "bloody Harlan's" soft coal fields. Two others were beaten.

While the troops were bringing to jail 250 men arrested at the scene of the clash between pickets and soldiers, a second volley of bullets from the weapons of the soldiers wounded Hubert Green, a high school miner, and his mother, Mrs. Katie Green, on a Harlan street.

Governor A. B. Chandler, at Ashland on a tour of the area there, had been ordered to send immediately 200 additional national guardsmen here, doubling the strength of the troops. The governor's order included tanks and machine gun companies.

ENGLAND TO INCREASE WAR PREPARATIONS

Chamberlain Regime Requests More Funds for Home Defenses, Credits to Allies for Armaments

(By The Associated Press) The British government advanced its greatest peacetime preparation program another notch yesterday, asking parliament for more funds for home defenses and by extending credits to two Balkan allies for armaments.

The Chamberlain regime requested more than \$300,000,000 to supply the new conscript army of 20-year-olds and the territorial army, and to increase the Royal Air Force's national guard.

This increase for the army raised the total defense outlays to more than \$3,000,000,000 in a budget already the empire's largest in peacetime.

Rumania and Greece were the first Balkan allies to get credits for armaments. The British parliament last week provided about \$224,000,000 for this purpose, adding to about \$400,000,000 arranged for last February. The Chamberlain government will get more than \$400,000,000 and Greece \$110,000,000.

George Grebe of Kuna, who was named by Governor C. A. Bottinell recently to replace D. N. Harvey of Melba, voted with Bottinell and Pizarro.

George Booth of Burley, chairman, and A. W. Howell of Elsie opposed the changes.

Reliable sources informed the Associated Press that D. C. (Oy) Price of Malad, commander of the Idaho department of the American Legion, was being considered as a permanent director to succeed Harold Harvey of Buhl, but no action was announced.

Booth and Howell voted for appointment of Harvey, while A. W. Howell and Pizarro were removed several weeks ago.

The commission carried on its business behind closed doors with the press barred.

Grebe, secretary, announced the commission would meet again on July 20, at which time it would determine fishing and hunting regulations for next year. It will meet after spending several hours on budget problems.
