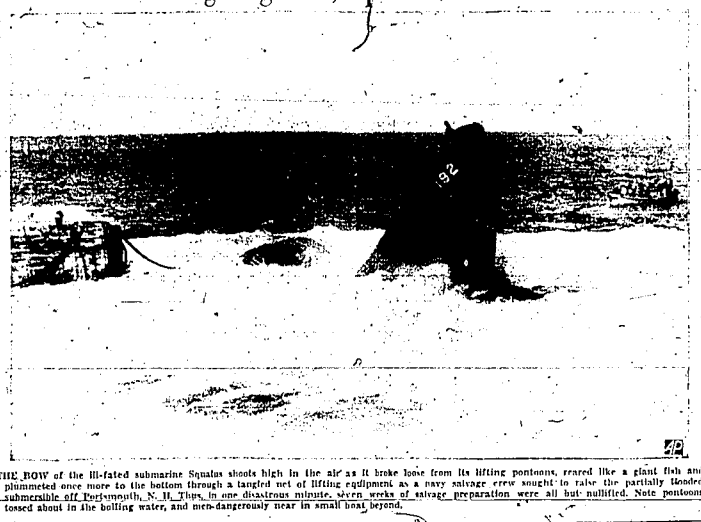

By HILL BONT NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—Hans-Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., showing more fight than any aroused Joe Louis and a better finishing kick than Glenn Cunningham, let loose with all the lead of the closing holes today to beat U. 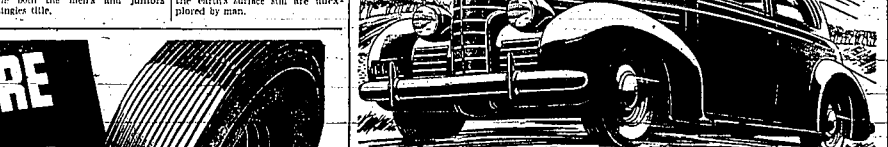

ENGLISH PREPARE FOR BOMB RAIDS

Defense League Estimates Extent of 'Lightning Blow' Damage

LONDON, July 15.—What will happen if war comes to England? Exactly how horrible will be the ravages of bombing? Of course, no one can forecast precisely. But there are theories, and here is the one of the air raid defense league, a government-approved but unofficial body charged with educating the public in methods of defense against an attack and with popularizing civilian air raid precautions.

Civilian defense, the league believes, is the "true answer" to the military. It is a "new strategy" of "air raid defense" which is "not a mere matter of technical details, but a matter of spirit and organization."

The league believes that lightning bolt strategy would call for launching in 1,400 planes in a continuous 24-hour assault on Britain in the first day of a war. That estimate is based on a belief that each of 100 bombers would be sent up to "move on the average five miles in every hour of the day."

The league argues that Germany would hit "vulnerable" areas in a "series of raids" to achieve immediate victory "by so undermining civilian morale as to induce a mass demand for peace at any price."

The league believes that "a force of three thousand or more bombers, each would probably be the largest that could be handled conveniently on a single raid. Hence the purpose of 'irregularities'—some raids might be made up to higher numbers than that."

Germany's total first-line air strength is placed by the league at between 1,500 and 1,700 machines. Germany's total raiding force, "readily" estimated by the league at between 1,000 and 1,200 machines, "could drop four times as fast on Britain," Berlin, Munich and Vienna.

The British air force is estimated to have the first day's raiding, of which, perhaps, one-third would be killed and two-thirds wounded. It would need very few days to bring the total to zero.

MARTIN FIGURES IN FORD SUCCESS

Motor Official Famous for Developing Labor-Saving Factory System

Detroit, July 15.—It has been said of the automobile industry that its rapid development has been due in no small degree to the fact the men who made it their life's work always sought ways to do it easier, faster and more efficiently.

The industry owes much to this respect to Peter E. Martin, the man who makes the wheels go around at the Ford Motor company plants. Smart, stocky and built like a wrestler, Martin is one of the few of the "automobile" industry developed. From his first job in a Detroit box factory when he was 12 years old, he has become first vice president of the Ford Motor company.

Martin has been credited by his friends and acquaintances with a large part of the success of the industrial empire that Henry Ford has built up in 1903 in a converted carpenter shop in Detroit.

The 58-year-old Martin has been called the world's greatest apostle of the conveyor as a labor-saver in the Ford Motor company plants. He supervised the installation of conveyor lines in the Ford plants and at present directs a system approximately 60 miles long at the parent plant of the Ford company on the River Rouge.

Martin is one of the four of the "big" men in the Ford organization who have regularly with Henry Ford at the daily "round table" in the executive dining room at the Rouge plant. It is at this daily conference that ideas are exchanged and not infrequently they soon materialize in practical applications somewhere in the vast Ford organization.

Martin's knowledge of the machinery that goes into an automobile plant is a little short of amazing. It is no exaggeration to say that he personally could run such machinery in the Ford plant.

When he first joined the Ford organization, his job was to put cars together and stamp other men's help to assemble each one of the men going inside the small factory and another out into the yard. He used to astonish his fellow workers by bending a hose step of steel with his hands after others had failed.

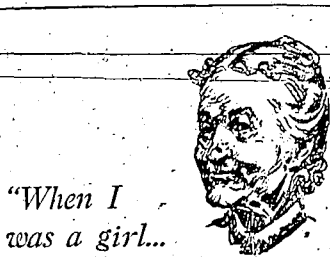

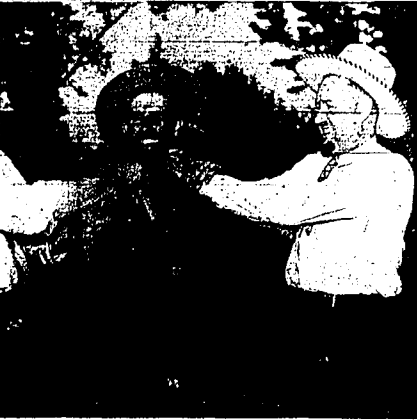
