### POWER FACTOR IN PHOSPHATE FIELD

Spokesman for Bonneville Project Charts Path to Development

The path to development of Idaho's extensive phosphate beds lies through procurement of cheaper power, declared Carl D. Thompson, official with the Bonneville power development, in an address to Twin Falls Monday night.

T. G. Nicholson, Filre rancher who introduced the speaker, asserted that lower priced phosphate was needed for farm fertilizer, and expressed his theory that phosphate produced by electricity is of superior quality to that produced with the use of chemicals.

More than 100 interested persons attended the meeting at the city park to hear Thompson's address which he indicated had been approved by government officials as official information.

The speaker told his listeners that power from Bonneville could not be pumped because cities near the development were to be furnished with power first, and transmission lines into Idaho where phosphate plants are located would be costly.

He suggested that numerous undeveloped power sites in Idaho could be utilized to furnish electricity cheaply enough to warrant its use in producing phosphate from the raw deposit.
