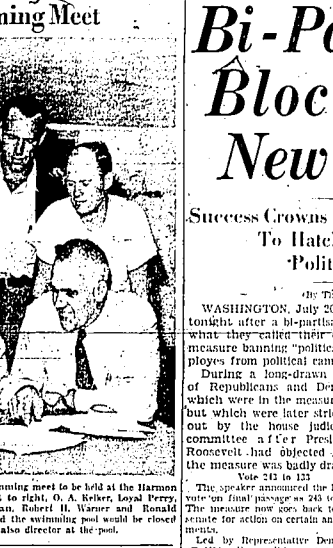

IDAHO LAUNCHES NEW TAX SYSTEM

Marketed Potatoes, Onions to Carry Advertising Stamps

BOISE, July 20 (AP)—The potatoes and onions Idaho growers put out to market this year must bear a special advertising stamp, part of a half-cent-a-hundredweight tax that has been paid on them.

The stamp method of collecting the tax was decreed by the Idaho Advertising Commission which on July 1 took over functions previously performed by the Idaho Fruit and Vegetable Advertising Commission.

The new commission replaced the old one under provisions of 1939 legislation which continued the advertising tax only on potatoes and onions at a rate of that of the 1937 law, and eliminated apples and prunes from provisions of the act.

Stamps will go on sale July 24, the commission said.

In explanation of their use, L. E. Sargent, commission secretary, issued these instructions:

"Before any railroad can issue a bill of lading, they are required to demand that shipping documents be furnished by regulation are attached in the railroad's copy of all bills of lading.

"Clearance tickets for the railroad for all truck shipments. These clearance tickets will be made available through the railroad's office with each trucker with the original copy of his clearance ticket properly filled out.

"Before such clearance ticket is delivered by the commission to growers who are loading cars or railcars, where stamps are not readily obtainable, with a supply of advertising tax stamps, so as to insure any delay in the movement of potatoes or onions."

The tax stamps will be bound in book form and furnished in denominations of 1 cent, 5 cents, 10 cents and 25 cents. Advertisers' stamps will be returned on all potato and onion shipments. The commission said.

"Potatoes and onions shipped out of Idaho must bear a stamp of lading."

"Seed potatoes and onions grown outside the state of Idaho and shipped in packages branded other than Idaho."

Huge Dust Cloud Sighted on Mars

BOISE, July 20 (AP)—A huge dust cloud rising 10 to 12 miles above the surface of Mars was reported today by Dr. G. P. Kuiper, planetary researcher of Northwestern university.

Mars, who has been photographing Mars at the University of Arizona's Steward observatory, said other pictures showed the brilliant blue-white dust cloud, 600,000 square miles became visible July 12.

At its maximum the dust cloud measured 800 miles long and 700 miles wide, Kuiper said, and bulged from the planet's side. Few dust storms clouds have ever been on Mars, the astronomer explained, and the color of the present one indicates it is composed of dust.

The earth's cumulus clouds rise only five or six miles above the surface, and dust clouds less than that.

BOISE, July 20 (AP)—Chief Justice James P. Alshie observed today in a supreme court opinion, "Cupid is not influenced by court orders."

RULES EXPLAINED FOR WPA SHIFTS

2,000 of 8,400 Relief Workers on Idaho Rolls to Be Discharged

BOISE, July 20 (AP)—Federal legislation requiring discharge of persons employed continuously 18 months will affect approximately 2,000 of Idaho's 8,400 relief workers on work projects administration July 1, Director G. K. Hite said today.

He said the discharges, to be completed Aug. 31, would be made "as rapidly as possible in order to minimize project suspensions."

"The workers will be replaced on projects by several hundred persons awaiting assignment," Hite explained.

"These persons who are dropped because they have had 18 months of continuous employment, a mandatory federal law, can regain eligibility for employment on WPA work by being reemployed by the Idaho division of public assistance."

"Veterans are not included in the discharge order," Hite said.

"Reassignment will be made on the basis of the individual's present qualifications for performing essential duties on a project on which there is a vacancy created by the discharge of relative need, as required by the relief act."

"Persons who leave left WPA for private employment will receive preference in reassignment over those removed by requirements of the law or over those making their own applications."

Hite said the legislation required extension of work on all projects to 180 hours per month, reduction of administrative expenses and general curtailment of the entire work program.
