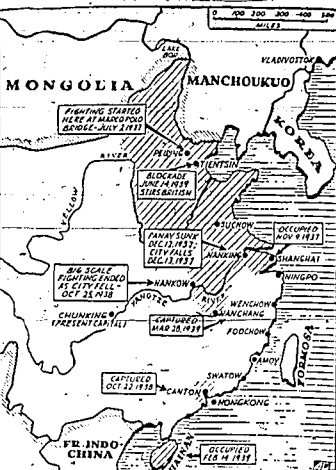

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END OF PRIVATE BANKING SIGHTED

Economists Predict Federal Control—Dissipation of Savings

By HENRY PAYNTER.—NEW YORK, July 22.—Some nationally known economists connected with leading Wall Street banks today have believed their ideas already launched, or about to be launched, by the federal administration...

The effect of these policies, they said, would be to put forward a radical step already taken in this direction, they said, possibly could not be undone even by a contrary-minded succeeding administration...

Although these policies, they said, were in their opinion, aimed primarily at the financial community and its eventual elimination from American economic life...

Administration officials have publicly expressed no inclination to concede with these, and the economists, but have indicated their interest as the opinions of Wall Street economists...

Some of the economists have been studying of current and proposed federal policies.

The economists' views were sought on the pending federal lending program designed to permit them to be published in the institution with which they were connected.

In addition to being widely known, some of them were formerly associated with the Federal Reserve Bank, by the present federal administration.

Some viewed as menace. They said responsible government officials, including cabinet members, the chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, and economists associated with the administration in various capacities, have publicly expressed the view:

"That accumulating savings in the privately owned banks represented a national economic menace.

"That the present privately owned and controlled banking system of the country has failed to put these savings to work, and consequently...

"That 'deficit' spending and 'deflation' resulting from a large part of the money in the hands of the government would correct the economic consequences of the failure of private banks and banks to invest.

"That the government would be able to manage the economy more effectively than the private banks and banks could.

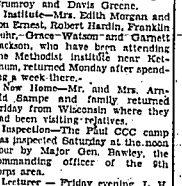

CROP CONDITIONS FAIR IN CASSIA

County Agent Reports Crops Better Last Year; Price Outlook—Good

BURLEY, July 22.—Crop conditions in Cassia county are only fair this year, stated W. W. Palmer, county agent, as compared with conditions found at a similar time in a year ago. Drouth and a late spring with several frosts are responsible for this condition, Palmer said.

Yields of dry farm wheat and winter wheat are only about one-half of that of last year and fields that will yield 20 bushels per acre will be few, while last year the average yield may have been better than 20 bushels per acre.

# CHALLENGED, KAYAK II WIN \$50,000 RACES.

## Johnstown Third In Biggest Turf Upset of Season

\$34,597 Wagered on Favorite to Take Arlington Classic

CHICAGO, July 22 (AP)—When the Maryland horse, Challeon, conquered Johnstown in the muddy Freshness steeplechase, the explanation was made that "Big John" winner of the Kentucky derby, didn't like mud.

Today, before 40,000 spectators and a summer special crowd, Challeon repeated his victory over Johnstown on a track that was dry and lightning fast, in winning the \$50,000 Arlington classic.

Johnstown didn't even finish second. He was a tired, straggling 1 1/2 lengths back of Sun Love, which landed a head behind Challeon.

It was the most startling upset of the 1939 racing season. Johnstown, victorious in seven of his eight races this year, was flouted to lead in the minds of the bettors, a fact which was his first as \$34,597 was wagered on him to win and \$23,100 to place.

Challeon, a winner of the Kentucky Derby, Dwyer, Blake, and the Belmont, Winters, Wood Memorial, Paumonok, Hurdston and other steeplechase races in New York, was ready to return today's defeat, to be proclaimed a record champion of the American turf. Now that honor is very much in dispute, with Challeon considered the winner.

Challeon ran the mile and a quarter in 2:04, just four-fifths of a second slower than the track record set by Discovery. The winner returned \$220 to win and \$40 to place. There were no show mutuals.

## George Woolf Rides Howard Speedster To Victory

INGLEWOOD, Calif., July 22 (AP)—Powerful Kayak II rumbled across the finish line on schedule and won the \$50,000 added Hollywood gold cup handicap.

Marking the second successive race, highlight of the Hollywood park season, has been the Sportsman Charles E. Howard of San Francisco, the flashy Argentine, pumped the mile and one quarter on a new track record time and left his nearest challenger, Tom-Tom-R, Martin's Cavalry, five lengths behind.

Just as Howard's handicap king, Kayak II, won the inaugural gold cup in 1938 in track record time, so he won it with a group of 10 horses in the 1939 race.

In many ways it looked like they were up to the task. Kayak II ran the distance in 2:02 1/2, but his nearest challenger, Tom-Tom-R, Martin's Cavalry, was 5 1/2 lengths behind.

Howard, owner of the Kayak II, said he had given the National League club until tonight to accept or reject his offer to sell Dominic.

## Left-hander Joins Twin Falls Club

Frank Kendall, 21-Year-Old Southpaw, Arrives from Portland

A southpaw pitcher moved into the Cowboy country yesterday, marking the arrival of Frank Kendall, the Twin Falls baseball club.

Kendall, who batted at a heavy 500 clip a week ago, dropped 20 points for the seven-day period ending with Friday's game. He hit .408. He got only eight hits in 30 times at bat for the week, at one stretch getting only six hits in five games.

Even so, he has a 45-point margin over the next best pitcher, who has given him second place by 20 points. The second worst slump of the week among the pitchers was suffered by Boston's Roger Cramer who dropped from .375 to .286 and hit only one home run in five games.

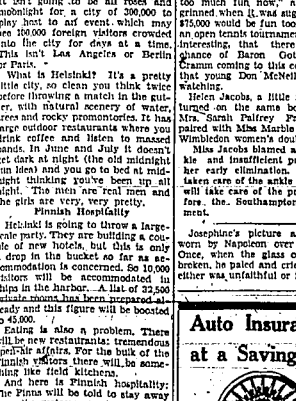
