WASHINGTON, July 26.—The United States served notice tonight it was terminating its 1911 treaty of commerce and navigation with Japan, opening the way toward an embargo on the shipment of raw materials to that country.

Six months must pass from today before the abrogation can go into effect. They will be up on January 25, at which time congress will be in session and can discuss an embargo on raw materials shipments to Japan.

Federal Judge Rules Against Government in Anti-Trust Suit

WASHINGTON, July 26.—The department of justice suffered a major defeat today when a federal district judge ruled out of court an indictment charging the American Medical Association, three other medical organizations, and 21 prominent physicians with violating the anti-trust law.

Justice James M. McCreckin ruled that medicine is not a trade, but a profession, and therefore that the defendants could not be guilty of restraint of trade in their collective activities. The Group Health Association, the cooperative set up to afford medical care to its members, was held to be a player in the District of Columbia.

WAR PREVENTION - It is probably true, as many intelligent observers are saying, that the "only way for America to escape war is to prevent war."

A general war would almost certainly drag us in again. Intelligent public opinion should be directed with that end in view.

A great deal of public and private effort today is not being so directed. Some of the present attitude is blind pacifism.

If the world goes on fire again, the chances are, no matter how we feel or what we say now, that we shall be dragged into it as we were the last time.

If this reasoning is true, the foremost aim of Americans at present should be to prevent war and to join in the efforts to that end.

There are two ways suggested to prevent war. The first is the way of "appeasement."

That is, buying off aggressive powers by giving them at least some of the things they say they want.

There might be better results if Britain and her imperial allies, the "have" powers, would try giving away some of their "hot" property.

The second way suggested to prevent war, the imperial democracies refuse to do that. America could urge them to make such a gesture.

America could also offer an alternative. In case that appeal was refused by Hitler and Mussolini, America could supply arms to defensive democracies threatened by aggressive powers.

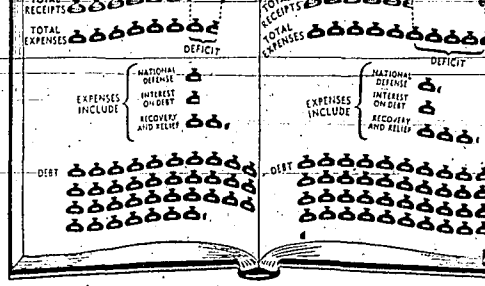
