## NEVADA FIRE COSTS LIVES OF FOUR MEN

Wind-Swept Brush and Timber-Blaze Traps CCC Envoies; Fifth Youth Missing and Feared Dead

(By The Associated Press)  
OGDEN, Utah, July 29—Vast sections of western timberland, under dry rain from rain and gusting winds, were threatened tonight by fires which killed four in Nevada and caused unestimated damage in several other states.

In addition, lightning storms which brought little rain killed two, one in Oregon and one in Kentucky.

Four children, conservation corps enrollees, burned to death when a brush and timber fire was fighting shifted under a high wind and cut off their retreat. A fifth youth was missing and feared dead.

The fire was in the rugged Santa Rosa mountains of northern Nevada. It was brought under control this morning after an all-night fight and a search started for the missing youth, Frank J. Vitale, 20, Brooklyn, N. Y.

The badly burned bodies of Ernest R. Tiplin, 31, Oswego, Kas.; George A. Kentucky, 22, New York; Walter W. Barker, 20, Brooklyn, and Walter James, 18, Ridgeview, N. Y., were taken to Winnemucca, Nev., where they were buried. A search for the regional forest service office has been announced.

Although the Nevada blaze covered a large area, little valuable timber was destroyed.

Pacific northwest fires, 85 of which started by rainless thunderstorms, spread over thousands of acres of timberland, but for the most part were under control.

Temperatures which this week soared as high as 117 moderated, but the fire spread continued as clouds of smoke hung over the area.

Much of the west was listed as "dangerous" for forest fires. They said, only heavy rain would alleviate the situation.

Two hundred men fought a grass and scrub timber fire near Spokane, Wash. A 400-acre fire east of Spokane, Ore., was fought, and the Eden Valley fire in the Sierras forest was controlled after 2,000,000 feet of timber was destroyed. Approximately 1,000 men were called to fight flames which broke out in three other areas near Eugene, Ore. They were brought under control.

In North Idaho several fires raged in north Idaho forests but in the southern section, Unit states, lightning-set fires were brought under control.

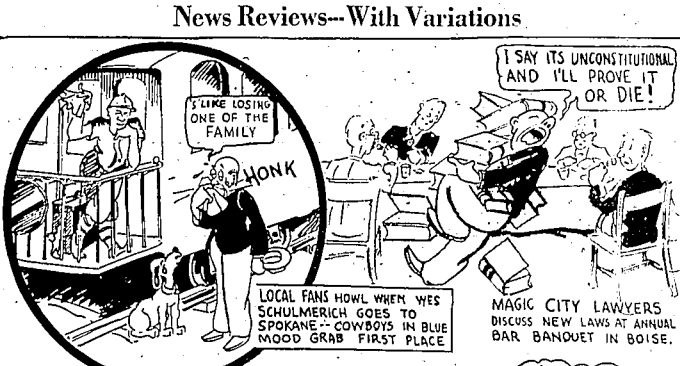

## Line Drawn To Protect Enterprise

O'Mahoney Amendment Adopted 45 to 21. Lays Restriction on Use of Curtailed Lending Program

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—The Senate approved tonight, 45 to 21, an amendment to the administration's \$1,610,000,000 lending bill designed to prevent government interference with existing private enterprise.

Soon after adopting this proposal by Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), the chamber agreed to limit debate on the lending measure and recessed until Monday.

The agreement, limiting senators to 15-minute speeches, was obtained by the administration leadership after many previous attempts to hasten a vote had proved futile.

Sentiment for reduction of the lending program spread from the Senate to the House banking committee during the day, beginning with a \$500,000,000 reduction in the amount at that group's hands.

The banking committee recommended passage of a curtailment bill carrying a total of \$1,250,000,000.

Senate leaders

The bill before the Senate already had been cut down by a coalition of Republicans and Democrats to \$1,610,000,000. When first introduced by administration leaders, the legislation carried \$2,600,000,000.

North Carolina

Acceptance of the O'Mahoney proposal came after hours of debate, during which Senator Norris (R-Ore.) charged that its practical effect would be to make it absolutely impossible for a munitions manufacturer to construct a munitions plant.

The O'Mahoney amendment provides that none of the proposed \$1,250,000,000 of public work loans could go for projects in any field except the construction of a munitions plant.

# KIMBERLY YOUTH TRAINS AS ARMY FLYING CADET

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 20.—Among the group of new air corps flying cadets training at the army aviation training center at the Ryan school of aeronautics, San Diego, is Ralph H. Michaels of Kimberly, who arrived at the southern California air school on July 1 along with 15 other flying cadets.

After three months of intensive instruction under air corps supervision at the Ryan school, which will include 60 hours of flying and 20 hours of technical aviation study, cadets who have successfully completed the course will be advanced to Randolph field, "West Point of the Air" for basic flight instruction.

From there they will be sent to various flying fields for specialized instruction in the essentials of formation, advanced instrument, night and cross-country flying preparation to graduation as second lieutenants in the air corps reserve and assignment to the various tactical air corps units throughout the continental United States, Hawaii and Panama.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Michaels of Kimberly, the new air corps student pilot, was graduated from Kimberly high school in 1934 and has since had college training at the University of Utah, graduating from there in June 1935.

Michaels has had previous military experience and holds a commission as second lieutenant in the 35th field artillery reserve.

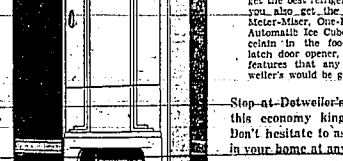
