Police Officers Guard 'Riot Zone' as Fisher Strike Tension Eases

Tie-Ups in Three States and Nova Scotia; CIO Workers in Detroit Area Pelt Non-Strikers, Escort

(By The Associated Press) Industrial production was hampered Tuesday by strikes in three states and across the international line in Nova Scotia, but there was violence only in the Detroit area.

There, 50 policemen, escorting 35 non-striking workers from a General Motors Fisher Body plant, were stoned in the late afternoon by several hundred CIO tool and die workers. It was the third skirmish of the day at that point, but there was no report of serious injuries.

Altogether, 2 General Motors units were involved in the CIO United Auto Workers' demand for a 10 percent agreement covering skilled tool and die workers. The picket line, dated in 1937, encompasses only production employees.

U. S. Accuses Japan Of Baiting Foreigner

New Protest Delivered at Tokyo Following Series of Recent Assaults

(TOKYO, Aug. 2 (Wednesday).—A United States protest against a series of recent assaults by Japanese in China upon Americans was relayed reported today to have been made by Eugene H. Dooman, the chargé d'affaires.

Dooman was said to have told Seijiro Yoshizawa, chief of the American section of the Japanese foreign office, that it was a "reasonable assumption" that Japan's anti-British movement in China was being converted into a general anti-foreign agitation.

Simultaneously it was reported that the British ambassador, Sir Robert Leslie Craigie, had threatened to break up the British-Japanese conference in Peking unless the anti-British movement in China was placed under control.

GRATIS SEND DEMANDS TO YUGOSLAVIA

Leader Threatens to Pull Country Out of Kingdom 'Even Though it Probably Will Mean a War'

(By The Associated Press) KUPINEC, Yugoslavia, Aug. 1.—Dr. Vlada K. Klobučar, threatened today to pull Croatia out of Yugoslavia—even though "it will probably mean a world war"—unless his people are quickly granted complete independence.

A lieutenant of the stooped, 60-year-old leader said that 450,000 Croats "incensed" foreigners are supporting his demands made on the Serb-constituted government at Belgrade.

Macelj declared that Croatia would secede from Yugoslavia unless its autonomy demands were met. Asked if such a move would mean revolution, he said: "I don't know."

(FREE CITY OF DANZIG, Aug. 1)—Polish tension in Danzig, over the return of the city to German rule, has increased today, according to reports from Danzig.

Nazis seized upon the Polish action as an argument for "going home to the Reich." One inspired commentator said that if the exclusion of Danzig from Poland does not cease, "the free state will direct its trade to the German market without regard to the economic frontiers broken by Poland."

House Refuses to Consider Measure

Fight for WPA Suffers Setback President Asserts Balking of Administration Program Will Cost Taxpayers Millions

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—In a swift, unexpected debate, the House today rejected a bill which would have amended the president's strike back with a declaration that the action was a blow to industry, the unemployed and the taxpayers.

With a jubilant coalition of Republicans and Democrats in command, the chamber refused, by a vote of 193 to 166, to take the \$1,950,000,000 measure up for debate. This action followed Senate passage yesterday of a much-reduced, \$1,615,000,000 version of the same program.

After witnessing the dramatic scene, President Roosevelt received reports at his press conference in Camp White, he said, that the legislators for something they had a perfect right to do, those who would be adversely affected had a right to know where the responsibility lay, and the names of those who voted against his consideration of the measure.

A large number of industries would have their production increased as planned, he said, and a large number of relief clients who would have lost jobs would have to remain on relief. This, he said, would mean a loss of \$1,000,000,000.
