Martial Law Proclaimed In Colorado Strike Zone

Second Gun Battle Between Union Forces and Foes at Federal Dam Leads to Action by Governor

GREEN MOUNTAIN DAM, Colo., Aug. 2.—Gov. Ralph L. Carr proclaimed martial law tonight in the Green Mountain dam strike zone immediately after a second shooting clash between union sympathizers and strike foes in which three were reported wounded.

Three others were shot, one critically, and another man was cut during a battle near the \$4,000,000 federal reclamation bureau project at 5 p. m.

Gov. Carr announced his martial law proclamation at Glenwood Springs, as soon as he received word of the second shooting clash two miles south of Steamboat.

President Endorses Bar to Political Activities

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The Hatch bill barring federal employees from political campaigns became law with President Roosevelt's signature today, and immediately legislators fell into disagreement as to whether the bill would prove a bar to a third term candidacy.

One school of thought, as typified by Senator Charles McNary (D-Ind.) was that the measure would tend to obstruct any third term drive by making it impossible for federal officials to be delegates to party conventions.

Another, as represented by Senator Murray (D-Miss.), contended that the act would have no bearing on the question of a third term, since such a movement depended little on the activity of federal office-holders.

No Word from F.O.R. While Senator Bridges (R-N.H.) interpreted the act as a bar to a third term, there was still no word from the White House as to the president's 1940 intentions.

However, some interest was created by a conference which Mr. Roosevelt had with the chief officers of the Good Neighbor League, Democratic party officials and others.

The word was given that the conference reviewed the status of the Good Neighbor League, which was formed in 1935 to battle for Roosevelt's principles.

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In signing the Hatch bill, Mr. Roosevelt adopted the unusual procedure of sending a lengthy message to congress, in which he expressed approval of the measure.

He said that he had his "General" in a recommendation he made to congress in January, asking for legislation to prevent political manipulation in connection with the Hatch bill.

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PREMIUM BOOKS FOR FAIR READY

Awards Total \$6,000; Manager Announces New Divisions

First copies of the premium list of the Twin Falls county fair were distributed yesterday with additional copies to be sent out by mail the latter part of the week. Tom Parks, secretary-manager of southern Idaho agricultural and livestock exposition, announced last evening.

Fairs will be held on the county grounds at Filer September 5, 6, 7 and 8, Premium awards total \$6,000.

Prizes in several new departments were noted by Parks, who pointed out \$50 in prizes in graded draft horses.

Trains will be exhibited in harness and driven by the exhibitor or his helper. In the team class, 50 per cent will be counted on draft horses, 20 per cent on draft horses, 15 per cent on draft horses, 10 per cent on draft horses, 5 per cent on draft horses.
